During adoption and Juvenile Court hearings in the custody case, the suit charges, Richmond testified that superficial bruises found on Jody's body were evidence of child abuse when she knew they resulted from the massive internal hemorrhaging.

The suit contends both Stein and Richmond violated Illinois statues requiring them to deliver complete autopsy findings to the state's attorney's office within 72 hours of the exam.



DRAFT OF A LETTER TO BOB FRIESE

Dear Bob:

Thanks for your letter of May 27. I appreciate the fact that you shared with me some of the thoughts and reflections which grow out of your painful struggling with the important decisions about your future. The words of your letter reflect the inner debate first leaning in one direction, then in another. This must have been a very challenging time for you. I want you to know that I have tried to support you with my prayers during this period when, as you said so well, "I am in neither world, cleric or lay."

Concerning some of the specific points you made, let me contribute these observations:

First, I understand you apprehensions about having the past be dragged into the present if you return to the priesthood. However, have you considered the possibility of returning to active ministry in another Diocese? Then, after a period of solid work, you could return here to Chicago with no cloud over your head since you would have a proven record of effective ministry. I have been able to make such arrangements in previous situations. Other bishops have been most cooperative and it has generally worked out well. If you are interested in pursuing this possibility, please let me know.

Concerning your observations about the laicization process, your remarks are correct. Currently it is a lengthy process and in most cases the Holy See is reluctant to grant a decree of laicization. Here in the Archdiocese we try to be as helpful as we can in assisting resigned priests who wish to apply for a laicization, but, as you can understand, our effectiveness is limited. Should you wish to begin the process, I would recommend that you contact Father Ken Velo at 751-8213. I'm sure you will find him very knowledgeable and helpful.

Again let me say that I understand the tension and turmoil under which you have been trying to make these very important decisions. If I can be of further assistance to you, Bob, please don't hesitate to contact me.

May the Lord continue to be close to you.

A 33-year-old priest Tuesday denied charges he initiated a sexual relationship with a 15-year-old ward of Maryville Academy in Des Plaines.

Robert D. Friese, 2118 Freeman Court, Inverness, testified at his bench trial in front of Cook County Circuit Judge Lawrence A. Passarella that he was friends with the boy, but the relationship was not a sexual one. He is charged with criminal sexual abuse and two counts of indecent liberties with a child.

Friese testified he became close to the boy while working as a surrogate parent at Maryville, a home for dependent and troubled children, but had had no sexual contact with him except for an occasional kiss on the face or neck. He said that a written confession he gave Chicago police after his arrest in August 1984 is false. He acknowledged making statements to police but testified he did so only to

mitted having a sexual relationship with the boy in an interview at his office at the University of Illinois in Chicago, where he worked in the child development program. She said he later repeated the admission at the police station.

In the written statement, Friese is quoted as saying he started a friendship with the boy during the boy's treatment for emotional and behavioral problems at Maryville. Friese was on leave from his duties as a parish priest for St. Juliana Church in Chicago. The relationship became "an adult concern" he is quoted as saying.

WHILE ONCE on an outing together, the boy called him "dad," Friese purportedly said. In early 1983, the court document says, Friese said he told the boy he would adopt him and made an initial contact with Lutheran Family Services. The adoption never went through.

Friese testified he continued to see Nov. 14.

Friese reported the boy's drug use and prostitution to police. In August 1984, after the boy discovered Friese had talked to authorities, the boy told police he had been sexually abused by Friese, the priest testified.

An Inverness priest on leave from he Archdiocese of Chicago is expected to testify today in his defense against charges he sexually abused a 15-year-old former Maryville Academy youth.

Defense lawyers said Robert D. Friese, 2115 Freeman Court, will take the witness stand in his trial on one count of aggravated criminal sexual abuse and two counts of taking indecent liberties with a child.

Friese, 32, who took a leave of absence from the archdiocese more than four years ago, is accused of sexually abusing a boy he met while working as a surrogate parent at Maryville, the Des Plaines-based home for dependent and neglected children. `. * .

THE INCIDENTS OF sexual abuse allegedly took place after Friese left Maryville and after the boy ran away from the facility. Friese is charged

with molesting the boy on July 31, 1984 at the North Avenue Beach in Chicago.

Rev. John P. Smyth, Maryville's executive director, testified Monday he hired Friese in March 1981; shortly after Friese quit his duties as a priest.

Friese's first assignment was as a family counselor in one of the academy's group homes, Smyth testified. Friese counseled a group of girls and their surrogate parents, adults who try to simulate a home atmosphere for Maryville youths.

In late 1982, Friese asked to be transferred to one of the group homes for boys to work as a surrogate parent, Smyth said. One of his charges was the 15-year-old boy he is accused of later molesting. The youth, whose father had died and whose mother had failed in caring for him, had emotional and behavioral problems, Smyth said.

Friese began taking the boy on weekend outings, which was a typical and with some one breaking

FRIESE'S FATHER, Robert, testified his son often brought the boy to their Inverness home on holidays and for special family occasions. The boy occasionally would stay overnight.

Smyth said Friese left his job at Maryville in May 1983 to pursue studies at the University of Illinois at Chicago. He also was employed by the university's child development program at the time of his arrest in August 1984, according to police records.

In February and July 1983, the boy was charged in separate incidents of burglary and attempted burglary and sentenced to 30 days in the Audy Home. Last April, the youth was arrested for unlawful use of intoxicating drugs and sentenced to 24 months of probation.

Smyth said the boy also has been involved in prostitution since he left Maryville. He is currently assigned to a state-run home in Bloomington.

Home for tough kids takes its lickings, keeps on ticking

looks times are no stranger to "litutions dealing with tough and Maryville Academy in Plaines has seen its share.

The century-old home for 200 wised, neglected and homeless mildren, the largest of 76 such omes in Illinois, has weathered a a ur-closing for lack of funds, wes, an on-campus riot between adents and members of the surrunding community, a severe re-rection in the size of its operation and generations of difficult, often colent youths.

As often as not, when Maryvilie's name is in the news it's an side in a story about a former tudent who has been killed on the sircets or committed a crime. More recently, Maryville came up when a former priest and counselor there was convicted of sexually abusing a 14-year-old boy at the school.

"That hurt," said Rev. John Smyth, the former collegiate basketball standout who, as director, saved Maryville from the wrecking ball 15 years ago. "Was I betrayed? Yes. Was I disappointed? Hell, yes. But Maryville will sur-

The negative publicity surrounding the molestation charges was ironic in that Maryville has placed an emphasis in recent years on the care, counseling and rehabilitation of victims of sexual abuse, prostitution and child pornography. Such children are frequently housed at Maryville as part of witness-protection programs administered through law enforcement agencies.

"Pimps tell these kids that no one cares for them and no one will take them," said Rev. David Ryan, Father Smyth's assistant. "But we will,"

All of Maryville's youths, from runaways to throwaways, reside in "family living" units that consist of eight or nine youngsters and a married couple who act as surrogate parents. Father Smyth, who borrowed the idea in 1979 from Boys Town in Nebraska, uses it to simulate the everyday family life that many of the children have never known.

The house parents, who earn a rather spartan annual salary of \$18,000 a couple, stress a combination of academic skills, home economic skills and social skills.

The children learn to cook, sew, shop for food and keep themselves and their clothes clean. They are extremely well-drilled in the art of the firm handshake, and a visitor can gct some sore hands on a sevcral-hour tour.

In this regard, the kids are pro-teges of Father Smyth, the priest whose hands, in their glory days, pushed and shoved under the boards so often that he still claims the Notre Dame University varsity record for fouling out of basketball

Father Smyth's hardwood legacy is well-known around Marville. A burly 6-foot-5-inch football and basketball standout at Chicago's De Paul Academy, he made the Notre Dame basketball team as a walk-on and became the captain and leading scorer his senior year. as well as making honorable mention All-American.

The old St. Louis Hawks chose him in the first round of the 1957 professional draft, but he decided he had a higher calling. He entered seminary training and, five years later, ended up at Maryville.

The academy then was an aging. prison-like facility that had been totally rebuilt by the Roman Catholic Archidiocese of Chicago after an 1899 fire destroyed all but one building. It housed 1,000 troubled youths in large dormitories that Maryville historians liken to aprison.

In 1971, John Cardinal Cody appointed Father Smyth, then in charge of Maryville's elementary and high school programs, director of the financially ailing academy. He was given a year to turn its fortunes around.

He immediately razed most of the huge, rattletrap dorm buildings and put up smaller, modern residences.

Father Smyth also helped organize an interscholastic sports pro-

gram with similar child-care institutions. In the program, state championship trophies for sportsmanship are bigger than those for winning games.

The youths who are referred to Father Smyth's care by the state are often violent, troubled children who have been in and out of other homes and have histories of antisocial behavior. The student population is more than half black and Hispanic.

In the last three years, Maryville staff members have applied for workman's compensation benefits more than 75 times as a result of physical attacks by residents.

Father Smyth has never been the victim of a beating, as much because of his size as his cleric's collar, though he has suffered three mild heart attacks since coming to Maryville.

In the summer of 1976 when Smyth was away, 10 carloads of young adults from neighboring areas droye onto Maryville's isolated, 70-acre grounds to fight an ugly, racially motivated battle with academy residents. "They were gonna take over," says Father Smyth, "but our kids demolished them."

On Jan. 15 of this year, Robert Friese, who worked at Maryville from 1981 to 1983 and was fired for "erratic" behavior, was sentenced in Cook County Criminal Court to four years' probation for the sexual relationship he had with a boy whom he met at Maryville.

Father Smyth said the academy "acted quickly to remove Friese when it became apparent that he was getting too emotionally involved with the youths" in his charge, though there was no evidence of sexual abuse at the time.

Maryville has come through these and other difficulties and is solvent, independent of Church financing and ranks as the 3d-largest facility of its kind in the country, behind Boys Town and St. Johns, a New Jersey school. It has branched out in recent years and now sponsors a summer camp in Wisconsin, the Paulina House emergency shelter for youths in Chicago and several foster parent training programs.

Father Smyth says his goal is to reduce the statewide population of homeless youths. That population was estimated last fall at 21,000


by a gubernatorial task force, of which Father Smyth was a member.

The task force reported that nearly 7,900 youths had been rejected by their parents, 7,000 had been pregnant and 9,000 had been sexually exploited while on the streets.

"It's a horrible situation," says Father Smyth, drawing deeply on a Marlboro Gold. "Sometimes you hear things so awful you almost have to laugh."

But Father Smyth has never regretted choosing the pulpit over the pros: "Did I agonize over it? Oh, for a moment, I suppose. But I realized in my senior year that I wanted something permanent and meaningful.

"And I got it. We're really creating new lives here."



- Story of intransigence all the way. Now a year that people have talked to me about you.
- The important thing is not how I know, it's what I know.
- Your whole world is shriveling up. Your whole world now is hardly more than hanging around house.
- You're too sick to be reassigned. The Cardinal has ordered a leave of absence. You're out of an assignment for 6 months.
- Get out and get a job. Broaden your world. Get out of River Grove for good.
- When you get good and ready to throw yourself totally and sincerely into therapy, we can start talking priesthood again.
- Most of the poeple who have talked to me about you in the last year are not your enemies. They're concerned about you.

 They ask: "Can't anyone get to him? Can't anyone help him?"

Victim Statement Abstract

This abstract supplements a report prepared by the Chancellor of the Archdiocese of Chicago, Very Rev. John R. Keating, dated September 9, 1980, summarizing the report of Victim KT concerning inappropriate behavior and sexual misconduct by Fr. Robert Friese. According to the summary, Friese spent a great deal of time with a group of boys, including Victim KT, providing them with alcohol and drugs. Friese also massaged the minors and engaged in "what appeared to be anal intercourse once." This conduct occurred at the St. Cyprian rectory between 1978 and 1980.

Today, at my request, Fr. Friese came to the Chancery. He was dressed in clericals (the first time in a year I have seen him so dressed). Our meeting, in my office, lasted from approximately 10:40 to 11:40AM.

I reviewed the history of the turmoil at St. Cyprian's parish... the many meetings during 1979, lasting 6 months, between the Urban Vicar, Fr. Jakubowski and Friese and/or priest staff and parishioners. Fr. J clearly had recommended to Friese that he ask for a transfer. Friese refused.

Next step was the unanimous confidential recommendation of same made by the Personnel Board on Oct. 26, 1979, relayed to him by me on Oct. 29th, with a deadline of December 1. On December 1 he wrote me (cf. file) refusing. I then had him in at St. Louise, repeated that it was now the wish of the Ordinary that he move. He demurred and refused.

January 29, 1980, we had the confrontation in my office of Frs. Friese, Still the battle raged; Friese refusing to budge. The upshot was my order that he leave, terminating his assignment at St. Cyprian and transferring him to St. Juliana on March 17, 1980. It was a temporary assignment

I used the exmample of the diocese dealing with an alcoholic priest. Only when the man finally admits his alcoholism and allows himself to sincerely undertake professional therapy is there any chance of rehabilitation. And when rehabilitation takes effect, it reproduces our very best priests.

Applied to Friese I described, as above, his continuous pattern of denial, denial, intransigence, intransigence. The question was how will he begin to believe me that he needs help, serious help. When will he finally admit his own need for help, for emotional survival? I indicated sporadically that I knew many details of his inappropriate behavior and attitudes...e.g., his disproportionately close association with the camping trip even the day before, the smoking of pot, the rages and tears, the events of the village hall meeting of 1979, etc. He never denied any of these things and was quietly surprised that I knew so much.

He insisted that he was tired of this hassle for so many months and wanted to get the thing "cleared up once and for all," as though it were a court case to decide innocence or guilt. I calmly stated that since all our months' of trying to help him have failed, there is only one thing left to do. "We've decided to let you go, Bob...a six-month leave of absence." He seemed genuinely relieved, anxious that it take place by letter, with copy to St. Juliana. October 1 seemed perfectly acceptable to him. October 1 to March 31m 1981.

He said he certainly would do this.

Now that this was settled, apparently to his complete satisfaction, he said:

"Now that that's over, I'd like to talk to you as a fellow priest, not the Chancellor. I'd like your advice. You see, my parents are livid about the way you've treated me and they intend to sue for psychological damages. Now, I'm trying to dissuade them, but I doubt if I can be successful. How do you think I should handle this problem?"

Showing absolutely no surprise, I told him that this obviously is a well-intentioned expression of his parents' deep love for him and his welfare. He should thank them for the accolade but premixe make an added effort to reassure them of his love for them.

He seemed thankful for the advice. We parted, gingerly shaking hands. Incredibly, he appeared contented and at peace for the first time in my acquaintance.

Of course, my parents returned home to an immediate long talk. In fact, that talk has been going on now for a few days. Their summary of the m in points of your discussion is being sent to you.

I'm sure you understand that my priority is to clear my name. What twimpers that is I am essentially a quiet person. Having been thru the diocesan seminaries, I know very well the value of a healthy positive PR. And the effects of a negative PR as well. So the reluctance to use legal court means to clear up this mess is decidedly mutual. It could hurt the diocese, yourself, and my future. As you yourself suggested to my folks.

I understand from my folks that you have offered to help clear my name. I know that you cannot muzzle the laity, but the clergy are another question. Today I learned that I was again slandered in River Grove, but this time by the associate at St. Cyprian. I trust my source completely, since they have nothing to gain by this report.

This incident happened during a phonecall, where this priest described me as a manic-depressive, and "had worked with this kind before." To the best of my knowledge, he does not have a psychology degree; the classic description of a manic-depressive doesn't fit. And aside from the moral question of gossipping slander, there are certainly professional questions about a priest volunteering any such information to a parishoner. Even more amazing, he said this to a person who wanted to again be active in the parish, and turned them off. And incredibly, this person had just inferred their lack of involvement was due to their friendship with me and pain at seeing both myself and many parishoners hurt by the actions of the pastor diocese and other parishoners. Talk about lack of tact!

Legally I could cry Lawsuit! But all I'm looking for is a written retraction and personal apology. And the same to be given to this parishoner.



It is good to see the Church taking positive steps toward a hopeful solut on. It is unfortunate that the laity have to push us around into doing our work. As long as these steps are obviously being taken, and the solution is coming closer, that is all I can ask.


I have known Bob Friese as a close friend and confident for a little over three years. In this time I have observed many characteristics which will be an asset to Bob as he works in your program.

Such was the strength of his recommendations.

As our Associate, Robert shared fully in our commitment to the needs of the youth in our home. He would apply himself dilligently to teaching programatically the curriculum of social and academic skills to our youth. In order to work as effectively as he did in his teaching capacity, it was necessary for Robert to adopt his professional set of techniques, tolerances and expectations to those of our home without qualification, a task he did enthusiastically without reservations. One of Robert's most appreciated traits was his ability to give, receive and share feedback and in so doing create a truly caring and pleasurable atmosphere for all of us. This made it possible not only for a great deal of technical growth to be had by Robert while he was with us; but also ensured that all available resources could most effectively be directed toward the children in order to foster their growth. Robert possesses a unique quality in assessing and judging character strengths, weaknesses, peculiarities and other facets of human personality which made him an invaluable resource in dealing with youth, parents, teachers, and all others who impacted the lives of our youth. We were able to set together and formulate strategies which would not have been as robust were it not for his unfettered input. We were able to qualify his insights without fear of cutting them back altogether and we, many times, turned to Robert for inspiration when our own faculties were dimmed. If a mistake were made, Robert would in such case ask what could be done to correct it. Robert was quite open during strategy sessions, but in every case would support group decisions after such were made.

Robert worked in the total capacity as a Family Teacher while in our home. As such, he was a great asset in developing relationships with teachers, parents, administrators, counselors, police officers, case workers, youths and any number of other types of individuals who were many times, if not hostile, down right difficult to come to terms with. In fact, there were many times he averaged 60+ hours/week for weeks on end. He would stay many times for an hour or more on his own after his schedule to recap and strategize.

In addition to Robert's unflagging support and committment to the Teaching Family Model exemplified by the development while in our home of his low tolerances, high expectations and ability to perceive opportunities to teach the youth and outside consumers about the youth's needs; Robert brought with him a very high degree of administrative and managerial skills to our home. He is a fastidious vote taker, is extremely well organized (and helps to organize others) and is able to converse with persons of any and all stations in situationally appropriate idiom and veraculor.

In closing, a personal word must be inserted in support of Robert. He is one of the warmest most gentle hearts we have had the occasion to meet in all of our years both individually as well as together. His sense of humor has a vast range and depth. Robert has been and continues to be a trusted colleque and source of inspiration both professionally and personally. 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



Dear Bob:

I have now had an opportunity to reflect on your request to return to the active ministry. I have also had an opportunity to review the situation from the perspective of those who worked with you before you went on a leave of absence. I am prepared, therefore, to sahre with you my own perception of the situation and how we should proceed.

I am willing to receive you back. As a priest ordained for the Archdiocese, I want to do everything I can to facilitate your return. At the same time, I cannot — for your sake and that of the Archdiocese — be completely oblivious to the past. The comments which follow, however, should be seen in a positive light, that is, as a genuine effort on my part to resolve any difficulties which might stand in the way of your serving the Archdiocese well and of your own personal happiness and well-being.

Since it would be very difficult for me to evaluate the complaints made against you and your own response to them, I shall simply state in a positive way what I would expect of you as an active priest. You would have to live up to the expectations of the Church and the people in terms of your personal life-style and your ministry. It is not necessary for me to spell this out in this letter but I would be pleased to clarify it further in a personal visit.



I hope, Bob, that what I have suggested sounds reasonable to you. After you have reflected on this, please let me know what your reaction is to this. I also encourage you to speak with Father Bob Heidenreich of the Personnel Board. I have discussed your situation with him.

Be assured, Bob, of my concern, affection and prayers for you. I shall do everything I can to help you.

Archbishop Bernardin,

I have taken your advice tp spend some time reflecting before answering your letter from November 9th. Please be assured that the delay is because I had to identify a need I was feeling, not because of your letter.

Among other things, I need to re-establish my trust in the diocese, a process which has begun thru your warmth and concern. Thanks for showing such trust in me, an almost totally unknown person to you at this time.

Your sentence about lifestyle and ministry struck a chord I didn't identify until this last weekend. While my faith is relatively intact as I told you at our meeting, I needto re-evaluate my expressions of that faith. First, because I haven't been able to express my faith publicly presidentially for the last two years. Second, because if I am not consistant with the Church at this time, I must be before assuming active ministry. I need a spiritual director, but I really don't know whom to ask. Possibly you could make a recommendation. I would feel more comfortable knowing I was in effect dealing with a person who is almost an extension of your vision.

I need to know however how financing will be handled. I guess that sounds trivial and mundane with the topic we're discussing, yet it is germaine. I do want to return, and I realize it will take my time and effort.

Please send a copy of this letter to Fr. Heidenreich. I would be glad to make my contacts thru him.

Cardinal Bernardin,

I hope this letter is not too abrupt. Please remember I am talking from the position of my feelings, and not necessarily facts; so I do not intend to "place blame" on anyone.

I have made a decission, and it's not an easy one. I've re-written this letter more than five times, more than five different ways. I know that I don't yet trust the diocese enough to believe I'll never go thru the pain and abuse of three years ago, once again. I can't see any change in the results or conditions of the summer of 1980 if I spend my time and money when nothing has significantly changed in the diocese yet. I'm sure I don't want to come back to a situation where rumors and gossip prevent me for from recieving a fair treatment—which to me means I'd rather feel needed than tolerated. And most importantly, I can't subject an already bruised vocation to possible if not certain re-abuse, which would certainly destroy it.

I don't regret my decision. I know I need time to let the trust and confidence grow in me while the diocese needs time to earn that trust. And the diocese must learn to trust me as well. Of course, I will have a lot of questions from people. My family is already upset. But I feel comfortable inside, more peaceful with this decision. Probably the best explanation is that I never caused the original abuse, I sufferred it. But if I went back right now, I'd be abusing myself.

I am very sorry that so much of the past happened. But I cannot be sorry about my choice. I am willing to talk about it if you would like. Hopefully, in five years or so, things will be different. But not now.





Dear Archbishop:

I have spent some time with Bob Friese's file. It is difficult to sum it all up in just a few pages. I hope you have some questions, because I'm sure that my summary and recommendations have not touched on all the points.

This report and the material in Bob's file can be broken into four categories:

I - Letters about Bob from St. Cyprian, Nov. and Dec. 1979.

II - The Archdiocese and Bob Friese

III - Letter by Bob Friese.

IV - Letters in support of Bob Friese by Priests and others

I have also spoken to (Part V). In Part VI,I have added my own tentative recommendations.

I - Letters about Bob Friese - Nov and Dec. 1979

Can be broken in 3 categories - 9 letters asking for his transfer, 8 letters asking he be left at St. Cyprians and 3 letters asking for help in Settling the issues and turmoil at the parish.

Friese apparently had a confrontation with the school principal, who resigned. He also had a confrontation with the "old guard" of the parish where it is alleged that he threatened physical violence. Friese also had a confrontation with Fr. Tom Dore, the resident, where he told Dore to get more involved or move.

Whatever good Friese was doing, it's also obvious that his style was upsetting many people. He was involved in a power play. His pattern of behavior seems

to indicate that he was not in touch with how he came off in relation to others. He had no idea that he was causing problems.

I feel an accurate conclusion of the letters comes from letter.

"We have lost a fine educator in our past principal, who I feel was driven out by a new, highly ambitious but insensitive DRE, a young and earnest by unfortunately temperamental Assistant Pastor and a genuinely interested buy indecisive Pastor. Moods have become embittered and relationships strained due to alignments. In spite of this, we have tried to carry on, but new various members of the parish have become victim to personal attacks both verbal and physical".

II - The Archdiocese and Bob Friese

- Bob was ordained a deacon in 1977 and stationed at Mary, Seat of Wisdom,
 Park Ridge.
- Bob was ordained a priest in May, 1978 and assigned to St. Cyprian, River Grove.
- Bob was "temporarily assigned" to St. Juliana's parish, March 17, 1980
- Bob was given a temporary leave of absence, September 25, 1980.

This section of the file includes (1) official assignment letters and seminary background (2) Vicar Ted Jakubowski's letter of recommendation that Bob be moved from St. Cyprian's and (3) Dick Keatings records of his dealing with Bob.

I suggest you read Keatings summaries - I've marked them "A" and "B". From my involvement in the developments concerning Friese, I know they are accurate.

Some personal observations: Dick's records indicate and refer to Friese's behavior and his suspicions that Bob's behavior was not always "normal". Although it might be too strong to say that Friese is sick, it seems that Bob's behavior indicated that he needed professional care.


The problem seems to have been that Dick had a difficulty relating to Bob. Sometimes Dick is not sensitive to people in pain. But also it could be that Bob's psychological trauma can be most aptly seen in his relationship with authority figures.

Another note. Cardinal Cody seems to have been pressuring Dick to resolve the problem. His note on one of the complaint letters (Note to K.) was "What can we do about this by Sunday?"

III - Letters by Friese

There are 10 letters that Bob has written included in his file.

The First letter Jan. 15, 1980 was written to parish organization heads about a newcomers fair to be held at St. Cyprian. The main problem at St. Cyprian can be seen in this letter. Bob Friese was assuming the pastor's authority and speaking for the staff.



The rest of the letters are written after Bob's leave of absence. They are addressed to Keating or to the Cardinal. They are angry letters. Some threaten legal action.

One letter to the Cardinal asks for a private meeting, but with Father Don Ahearn (Pastor of St. Juliana) to come with to Clarify what Bob is saying. Ahearn, the letter goes on to say, bas not been informed about this request.

The rest of the letters deal with extensions of the leave and Bob's desire to return to active ministry. Also included is a letter to Tom Murphy about Bob changing Diocese. The Cardinal's reply to Bob's letter of March 30, 1982 is interesting. 'I feel like telling him to find another diocese where his condition will be unknown.".

Personal Observations: The letters by Bob I feel show his disturbed state. He speaks for the staff without their knowledge, he is angry with Keating and the Board. He is unable to accept help and counseling.

IV - Letters of support of Bob

From Fr. Don Ahearn, Fr. John Smyth (Maryville) and Bob's co-workers at Maryville) and Bob's parents.

Bob's problems are not seen by everyone. He might have worked through some of the anger and problems while at Maryville.



VI - Recommendation

It seems to me that Bob is a disturbed person.

Robert D. Friese May 27th, 1984.

Cardinal Bernardin.

As you probably have suspected, this letter has been coming for a long time. I suspect it really began when I met with Fr. Heidenreich at your request. At that time, I was told that any repercussions which were a result of the situation I have lived through would just have to be lived with,

While I have no reason to doubt your sincerity in wanting me to return to active priesthood, I have serious reservations about the feelings of my brother priests in regards to myself, the actual support and assistance which the diocese will offer, and my own satisfaction and ability to function effectively within a non-supportive environment. I cannot see myself once again putting all of my energy and effort into something which already has a built-in high degree of failure or risk. There is no way I can begin again in say five years to build another life.

Yet I don't want to make such a decision at a time when I am feeling frustrated. Priesthood (or not priesthood) should be a choice made entirely in freedom; freedom which must have options that are real and viable. More and more I am seeing that priesthood is not viable for myself, and that is the reason I am writing. At this time, I am in neither world: cleric or laity. As such I am in constant tension as to which world I belong. One world, the lay world, does not understand why I am not married, don't date, and decides their own derrogatory conclusions. The other world looks at me like some form of fallen degenerate person. The time has come for a final choice.

I cannot return to priesthood. There is no chance of me being effective or successful. I would constantly run into the past being dragged into the present. And I would be of little value to this church.

Yet I don't want to be separated from the church which I believe in so much. If by some chance I do decide to someday get married, I want that marriage to take place within the Catholic Church, with the full rights and responsibilities of a Catholic. I want any children of mine to be practicing Catholics, and not to wonder why their father won't be participating in a church about which he knows so much.

I know that the process for laicization is long and difficult; and that the Pope has been less than quick to grant such decrees. Yet I cannot stay in this present state. While I cannot see myself requesting any release from priesthood on spiritual or mental or psychological pre-conditions, I cannot in justice stay as I am now.

I would like to hear from you soon by letter as to what I should do. Please understand that this is no comment on yourself or the church in Chicago; it is simply a fact that must be faced in order to move foreward.

Thank you for your patience with me, your understanding and gentle support. I look foreward to your letter.

I have just received a letter from Bob Friese stating that he now has decided to leave the priesthood and asking about the laicization process. It does not surprise me that he wants to leave and I doubt that there is anything you or I can do to change his mind. Still, there is much about Bob and his reason for leaving that perplexes me. I am enclosing copies of the letters we have exchanged since I arrived in 1982.

The point that he constantly makes is that he does not receive the needed support from other priests. Apparently he has been deeply hurt by someone or some group.

How would you respond to his last letter? The easiest thing is to acknowledge his letter, thank him for his past service, and ask him to discuss the laicization process with Ken Velo. But somehow, this case seems to need more. I would appreciate your counsel in this instance.

Dear Bob:

Thank you for your letter of May 27. I appreciate the fact that you shared with me some of the thoughts and reflections which grow out of your painful struggling with the important decisions about your future. The words of your letter reflect the inner debate, first leaning in one direction, then in another. This must have been a very challenging time for you. I want you to know that I have tried to support you with my prayers during this period when, as you said so well, "I am in neither world, cleric or lay."

Concerning some of the specific points you made, let me contribute these observations. First, I understand your apprehensions about having the past dragged into the present if you return to the priesthood. However, have you considered the possibility of returning to active ministry in another diocese? Then, after a period of solid work, you could return to Chicago with no cloud over your head, since you would have a proven record of effective ministry. I have been able to make such arrangements in other situations. Other bishops have been most cooperative, and the arrangements have generally worked out well. If you are interested in pursuing this possibility, please let me know.

Concerning your observations about the laicization process, your remarks are correct. Currently it is a lengthy process, and in most cases the Holy See is reluctant to grant a decres of laicization. Here in the Archdiocese, we try to be as helpful as we can in assisting resigned priests who wish to apply for laicisation, but, as you can understand, our effectiveness is limited. Should you wish to begin the process, I would recommend that you contact Father Ken Velo at 751-8213. I am sure you will find him very knowledgeable and helpful. You may be sure that I shall do all I can to facilitate the process.

Again, Bob, let me say that I understand the tension and turmoil under which you have been trying to make these very important decisions. If I can be of further assistance to you, please do not hesitate to contact me. May the Lord continue to be close to you.

1. I saw Bob on September 18, 1984. He gave me a long, rambling account of his relationship with the young man, who has accused him of sexual abuse. Here is a summary:

Summer 1982: Bob first met then 13,

June 1983: Bob left his job at Maryville. He says that he quit.

After June 1983: Bob would like to adopt him, but Bob could not make any headway on this. Evidently the social agencies blocked his efforts. Bob would meet quite often and talk with him,

c) realizing that this case may put the Cardinal and the Church in a difficult situation, Bob would like to respond to any questions or concerns the Cardinal may have.

3. In discussing Bob Friese, you had asked me to discuss his previous communication to you in which he criticized priests for their lack of effectiveness. Here is the gist of his response. (As he spoke he seemed to focus on his former pastor.)...Some are harmful to people... They may have been effective priests at one time, but they have not kept up their skills, their theology...As a result they don't serve people well...They alienate people, they avoid confronting difficult issues...The Archdiocese doesn't get them the help they need, it doesn't support them or deal with them effectively...they leave such priests and their people in the lurch.

IN SUMMARY: Bob was very intense, very talkative. I had to focus him again and again to bring order to the story. He seemed to cast himself in the role of "saving"

At times I wondered by Bob persisted in what seemed to be a hopeless case. I was surprised that Bob was not more upset about his own fate. At times it almost seemed that he was an observer rather than a participant in the story.

I WOULD RECOMMEND that you see him, but set a definite time limit (e.g., one half hour) which you announce clearly at the outset, and have someone buzz you at the end of that time.

I'd further recommend that you open the meeting with a statement that you had read my report and felt you had a good grasp on the background. I'd also advert to the fact that you that, whatever the outcome of the case, You might also say that you are not worried about excessive harm to the Church in this case, but that your main concern is a) that justice be done by a good, fair legal process and b) that Bob eventually be a happy, effective person.

Then I would ask him what he would like to discuss in addition to these matters. Good luck.

I met with Father Friese on October 24. He was very frightened, nervous. He did not ask for anything; he simply wanted to apologize for any embarrassment he might have caused and to explain personally what had happened.

Basically he told me what he had told Father Ventura. I told him he would probably have a difficult time convincing people that he lied to help the young man in question — but he swears that his story is true.

I tried to give him moral support, indicating that I could do nothing about the trial, etc. He understood this.

In terms of his priestly status, he will not decide definitely until after the trial is over what he wants to do. I thought he was pretty determined to leave but this does not now seem to be the case. So we will just have to wait and see. My own opinion is that — aside from the present crisis — he has serious emotional problems. I doubt that he will ever return. At least now he feels a little better toward the Archdiocese and me.

Today, I spoke with Bishop John R. Keating, to ask for a clarification of the memorandum dated September 9, 1980 of a meeting between then Father Keating,

Bishop Keating informed me that and that when he mentioned certain allegations about Friese, told him that they should talk with Father Keating. During this conversation, there were no allegations of pedophilia. The reference in the 9/9/80 memorandum to a sexual act was to a simulated sex act. The parties were all dressed and it was in the context of rough-housing.

Bishop Keating stated emphatically that he knew nothing about Friese's employment at Maryville, that this was done without his consultation, and that when he learned about it, he "hit the ceiling."

Bishop Keating said that Friese was a severely disturbed individual. Despite the psychological disturbances, there was no evidence at that time of pedophilia.

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bling when he placed a Roman Catholic priest on probation after he was convicted of sex charges involving a teenage boy he met while working as a counselor.

Prosecutors, often upset when they feel a sentence is too light, had argued for a prison sentence for the priest, the Rev. Robert D. Friese, 33, of Inverness. But Passarella ordered Friese to undergo psychiatric treatment at a residential facility and to volunteer 11 hours a week in community service during a maximum probation period of four years.

He gave 30 months' probation to a man who stole an airplane and threatened to dive it into a restaurant where his estranged wife worked. The pilot, Frank Moore, 36, of 5105 N. East River, was directed to get treatment for alcoholism.

Passarella, 49, has been a Circuit Court judge for six years. His first assignment was at the Maywood branch, and he has been assigned to the criminal division since 1982.

He attended Fenwick High School and was graduated from Northwestern University Law School in 1961.

Colella record shows 18 arrests, few convictions

When Michael A. Colella was acquitted last week in the brutal beating of two Chicago police officers, he walked out of the courtroom with a smile on his face.

The 225-pound weight lifter had won acquittal once again. Although he has a record of 18 arrests, according to police, he has few convictions.

Police say Colella, 27, a bakery worker, seems ready to fight at any time.

In fact, he has another battery charge pending against him from an incident that occurred last Sept. 26 in a tayern at 8540 W. Lawrence in Norridge.

Norridge Police Chief Medard Zabratanski said Patrick Nelson, 31, of Niles, was knocked to the floor and kicked numerous times after a quarrel over a bowling game. Nelson was treated at Resurrection Hospital and released.

Colella, of Elmwood Park, was charged with battery and is free on \$10,000 bond. He will appear in court April 2 in Harwood Heights.

Zabratanski said it was Colella's second arrest in Norridge. On July 12, 1980, he knocked a 39year-old man to the sidewalk in the 8500 block of West Lawrence after accusing the man of tooking at Colella's girlfriend.

This man, too, was treated and released at Resurrection Hospital.

Colella was charged with battery. He was fined \$150 and given a year's court supervision.

Although most of Colella's arrests have been for fighting, he also has been picked up on charges of theft, possession of drugs and resisting arrest, police records show.

He has been arrested in River Forest, Elm. wood Park, Lombard, Schaumburg, Addison, Stone Park and Schiller Park, as well as in Chicago and Norridge.

Police Chief Dewey Paoletti of Elmwood Park said Colella was arrested in his suburb July 1. 1980, after a fight in the street at Grand and Harlem.

But none of Colella's many fights equaled the beating on New Year's Eve, 1984, of Chicago police officers Cathy Touty and James Semmler. Police said Colella attacked them with a metal bar at 5646 W. Augusta after being stopped for a traffic violation.

Touhy, 33, suffered a broken nose, fractured facial hone and cut lip, while Semmler, 27, suffered cuts on his right knee, face and arm.

A former priest from Inverness was sentenced Wednesday to four years probation and ordered to undergo psychological counseling for sexually abusing a ward of Maryville Academy in Des Plaines.

Robert Friese, 33, of 2118 Freeman Court, must stay in psychotherapy until his therapists certify "the need for treatment no longer exists," ruled Cook County Circuit Judge Lawrence Passarella, who presided over Friese's trial in November.

He also ordered Friese to contribute 10 percent of his salary to a college or vocational school fund to be established in his victim's name. Passarella said the victim will be eligible to receive the money after Friese's four years of probation are over.

Friese is unemployed and will not be able to work until he completes treatment at the House of Affirmation, a Chicago area residential counseling center for priests. Passarella said therapists must certify Friese's mental health and the court must approve the certification before Friese can discontinue therapy.

Friese was on leave from active duty from the Chicago Archdiocese when he was arrested on sex charges on Aug. 28, 1984

hours a week of public service during his probation, working part-time for the Royal Elm Nursing Home in Elmwood Park and Recordings for the Blind in Chicago.

Passarella could have sentenced Friese to a maximum of 15 years in jail for taking indecent liberties with a child and up to seven years for aggravated sexual abuse. Friese has no prior criminal record.

He was convicted of molesting a 15-year-old ward of Maryville Academy, where he once worked as a counselor and where he befriended his victim.

The academy's executive director, Rev. John P. Smyth, testified at the trial he fired Friese in May 1983 after other staff members complained about Friese's erratic behavior. The boy ran away from Maryville and become a street prostitute in Chicago's largely homosexual New Town neighborhood.

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Priest gets probation for child sex abuse

A former parish priest, now on leave from the Chicago Catholic archdiocese, was sentenced to four years' probation Wednesday for sexually abusing a 14-year-old boy.

"This is a very difficult type of case," Asst. State's Atty. Robert Cleary told Criminal Court Judge Lawrence Passarella.

"The key thing is the betrayal of the trust of a 14-year-old boy. They had a father-son type relationship. The defendant was a priest, he was a teacher."

Cleary asked Judge Passarella to sentence Robert Friese, formerly a parish priest on the North Side and in River Grove, to prison.

But defense attorney Ron Bredemann argued that Friese already had been through "pain and suffering as a result of going from a position of deep respect in the community at large, to one of scorn."

The judge approved a strict probation plan suggested by the National Center on Institutions and Alternatives. It requires Friese to live at the House of Affirmation, a residential treatment center for priests; to continue psychotherapy once he leaves the center; to do community service work at an Elmwood Park nursing home and at Recordings for the Blind; and to put 10 percent of any salary he makes into an account to pay for the victim's education.

Trial evidence showed that Friese, 33, of Inverness, began abusing the boy in October, 1982, when the boy was living in Maryville Academy, a home for troubled youths.

Judge Lawrence A. Passarella convicted the Rev. Robert Friese, 33, on charges of taking indecent liberties with a child and aggravated criminal sexual abuse. Friese, 2118 Freeman Court, sat motionless at the defense table as Passarella announced his finding after a six-week bench trial.

However, Bredemann contended, the teenager falsely accused Friese of sexual abuse after Friese discovered he was working as a prostitute and using drugs.

A spokesman for the Chicago Archdiocese said Friese had been ordained a priest in 1978 and served actively for only a year. Since then, he has lived as a layman, without authority to administer the sacraments, and is not expected to return to active ministry, the spokesman said. The state of the s

Catholic priest found guilty of sexually abusing boy, 14

A Catholic priest was found guilty Friday of sexually abusing a 14-year-boy who a prosecutor said thought of the priest as "the father he never had."

Criminal Court Judge Lawrence Passarella found Rev. Robert Friese, who is on leave from the Archdiocese of Chicago, guilty of aggravated criminal sexual abuse and taking indecent liberties with a child.

Father Friese, 33, admitted when he was interviewed by police after his August, 1984, arrest that he had abused the boy. But on the witness stand last week, he said, "I lied to the policemen." The boy had told police of the abuse, and Father Friese said he thought he would help the youth if he told police what the boy said was true.

Assistant State's Atty. James Comroe said that explanation "de-Jies' logic."

In announcing his verdict, Passarella said that there's "been deceit by other people . . . throughout this whole matter."

He said the Department of Children and Family Services got custody of the victim when he was 2 years old and "they shunted him about . . and really have given him very little chance."

According to trial testimony, the boy, now 17, has had 15 different placements during his 14 years with DCFS. In October, 1982, when the abuse began, the boy was living in Maryville Academy, a home for troubled youths, in Des Plaines.

Father Friese was a counselor there, but his initial concern for the boy "degenerated ... into abuse," said Assistant State's Atty. Robert Cleary. Father Friese continued to see the boy after he was transferred to a group home, according to testimony.

Father Friese became a priest in May, 1978. He was first a parish priest at St. Cyprian Catholic Church, River Grove, and was transferred in 1980 to St. Juliana's on Chicago's North Side. He will be sentenced Dec. 16.

Robert D. Friese was ordained a priest for the Archdioese of Chicago on May 10, 1978. He left the active ministry October 1, 1980. In a letter from the Chancellor dated September 25, 1980, his faculties were withdrawn and he was dispensed from the obligation of clerical garb and the Divine Office. He has complied with the regulations.

On September 13, 1984, he was arrested and charged with sexual misconduct with a minor. On November 15, 1985, he was found guilty of this offense and on January 15, 1976 was sentenced to four years probation

Canon 1395, #2 provides that a cleric who has committed such an offense should be punished with just penalties. In this case, such an action would be pointless since the individual has not been allowed to function as a priest for over five years. He has indicated that he will seek laicization.
