Rosary Rally

WASHINGTON — 75,000 men, women and children packed the hillside at the Washington Monument grounds here at ceremonies of the local Family Rosary Crusade to pay homage to the Mother of God and to witness the dedication of the Archdiocese of Washington to the Blessed Mother by Archbishop Boyle, 60 Monsignori, 2,000 priests, Brothers and Sisters, Catholic laymen prominent in local political and diplomatic circles were in a vast throng that heard Father Patrick Peyton, C.S.C., founder and director of the Family Rosary Crusade, ask that 10 minutes each day be given to saying the Rosary to bring peace and blessings to the world.

Acquitted But Denied

MANCHESTER, N. H. — Dr. Herman N. Sander, who was acquitted after a widely publicized trial of a murder charge in connection with the death of a woman cancer victim last year, has been denied readmission to membership in the Hillsborough County Medical Society. He has also been denied the privilege of serving at four hospitals in the area.

Methodists Release

GREENWOOD, MISS. — The local Methodist church released its allotted hour of broadcast on Station WGRM here in order that Immaculate Heart of Mary church could make a two hour broadcast. The occasion was a three-fold celebration for the parish. It was the golden jubilee of the dedication of the church; the solemn inventiture of the pastor as a Domestic Prelate, and the administration of the Sacrament of Confirmation.

Same Tune We Hear

LONDON—The communist government is decidedly opposed to the appointment of Gen. Mark W. Clark as Ambassador to Vatican City State, according to the tenor of their official broadcasts heard here.

Radio Moscow noted that President Truman "made this appointment in defiance of the Constitution of the United States, which calls for the separation of Church and State and forbids the United States to have an ambassador at the Vatican."

The Prague Radio charged that General Clark's appointment meant "a closer tie between American imperialism and the highest sphere of the Catholic Hierarchy."

Father F. L. Kaiser

Father F. L. Kaiser, pastor of The Assumption parish, Canton, The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin, Harmony and St. Mary's, Preble, has resigned his charges due to ill health. His Excellency, the Most Reverend Edward A. Fitzgerald, D.D., L.L.D., Bishop of Winona, in accepting the resignation has set the effective date as November 28.

Father Kaiser was born in Waseca county on July 18, 1910 and attended the parochial grade and high schools of Sacred Heart parish, Waseca. He attended Creighton University, Omaha, Nebr., from 1928 to 1932 completing there his classical and philosophical studies. One year of theology was completed at St. Paul Seminary, St. Paul, and three years at Kenrick Seminary, St. Louis, Mo. He was ordained by the late Bishop Francis M. Kelly, in the collegiate chapel of St. Mary's of the Angels, College of St. Teresa, Winona, on June 5, 1937.

From ordination until March 1938 he supplied at St. Agnes parish, Kellogg. From 1938 to 1941 he was assistant pastor of St. Felix parish, Wabasha. He then spent one year as assistant pastor of St. John's parish, Caledonia. He was assistant pastor of SS. Peter and Paul's parish, Blue Earth from 1941-1943. From 1944 to 1946 he was pastor of St. Mary's parish, Geneva. In July 1946 he assumed the duties to which the present state of ill health forces his resignation. He was appointed an Advocate of the Matrimonial Tribunal in 1948.

The prayers of his people, as well as those of the readers of The Winonan, go with him in beseeching God for a complete and speedy recovery of health that soon he may return to active service in the Priesthood of Jesus Christ.

As announced in the OFFICIAL column of this week's issue, Father Aloys J. Quillan will succeed Father Kaiser in his charges.



1 THE COURT: Have you had an opportunity to discuss the
2 matter with Mr. Gallagher so that you are aware of your
3 rights?

4 THE DEFENDANT: I had that opportunity, your Honor.

5 THE COURT: Do you understand that you are entitled on a
6 plea of not guilty to be tried by a jury of 12 people?
7

8 THE DEFENDANT: I understand that fully.

9 THE COURT: And in that event in order for a conviction
10 to be obtained, the state would be required to prove you
11 guilty beyond a reasonable doubt?

12 THE DEFENDANT: I understand that, your Honor.

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8 BY THE COURT:

9 Q In view of the hour, gentlemen, might it be understood
10 that the Court's intention is to order a pre-sentence
11 investigation and that any statements you might wish to
12 make would be taken at such future time as we have the
13 benefit of that examination and investigation?

14 MR. PATTON: That is satisfactory with the state, your
15 Honor.

16 MR. GALLAGHER: It is agreeable, your Honor.

17
18 Q The information charges you with the offense of carnal
19 knowledge, in substance, sodomy, on on or
20 about the 16th day of November, 1967. Is that so? Is that
21 correct?

22 A Yes, your Honor.

23 Q And did this happen in a cabin at Reeds Lake?

24 A I don't recall, what is the date?

1 Q The date alleged in the information is the 16th of
2 November, 1967.

3 A That might be it as far as I know.

4 Q Well, is there some question about that?

5 A There is just a question about the date, your Honor,
6 not about the event.

7 Q I expect it would be reasonable for your memory to be
8 hazy on a particular date.

9 A Yes.

10 Q But otherwise other than that the offense did occur at
11 that place and with , is that correct?

12 A That is right.

13 Q I have got to have certain information for the record.
14 Would you give me your residence address, please?

15 Q You live in that place with your sisters?

16 A Yes.

17 Q Would you give me your date of birth?

18 A July 18, 1910.

19 Q It is the Court's intention to refer you to the Rochester
20 State Hospital for examination and report. Do you find
21 anything in that procedure that would be contrary to your
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1 wishes?

2 A I desire it and it is the desire of my superior I learned
3 from a letter I viewed this morning.

4 Q All right. Anything you wish to say about this matter now
5 at this time before we proceed further?

6 A There is nothing, your Honor.

7 Q Would you step over here, please?

8 A Surely.

9 Q On your plea of guilty it is now the judgment of this Court
10 that you are guilty of the offense charged in the information.
11 Further proceedings in connection with sentencing are stayed
12 until further order of the Court. It is the order of the
13 Court that the Sheriff of Waseca County transport the
14 defendant to the Rochester State Hospital for examination,
15 confinement and report to the Court. Is there anything
16 further for the state, Mr. Patton?

17 MR. PATTON: Yes, sir, your Honor. I would hope that that
18 order would also include for treatment also. Dr. Tyce
19 asked specifically to have that included, for examination,
20 report and treatment during the time.

21 THE COURT: Very well, it is so ordered. Anything further for
22 the defendant?
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MR. GALLAGHER: Nothing further for the defendant.

THE COURT: The record may show that pursuant to the Court's
order the defendant was transported to the Rochester State
Hospital. The Court now has and has had since June 10th or
thereabouts a report from the Rochester State Hospital concern-
ing this matter. Are you familiar with that, Mr. Patton?

MR. PATTON: Yes, sir, I am, your Honor.

THE COURT: Mr. Gallagher?

MR. GALLAGHER: Yes, your Honor.

1 THE COURT: Anything further for the state at this time, Mr.
2 Patton?

3 MR. PATTON: Nothing at this time, your Honor.

4 THE COURT: Mr. Gallagher, for the defendant?

5 MR. GALLAGHER: Yes, your Honor. The defendant pursuant to
6 the Court's order did go to the State Hospital at Rochester,
7 Minnesota and did submit to the examinations and studies as
8 were required at that institution and as the Court has said
9 appears here today upon completion of that examination and
10 submission of its report to the Court. This defendant is a
11 man who is afflicted with an illness. He recognizes this but
12 he also is a man with good intellectual powers and a man who
13 can contribute in some manner to the betterment of society
14 and in accordance with the report which was made stating in
15 effect that this man could best serve in some type of an
16 institutional environment; he does accept the findings of the
17 report and is willing to serve in whatever capacity he can
18 and to the very best of his ability if the Court affords this
19 opportunity to him. The defendant on his first appearance
20 in this Court did enter a plea of guilty being fully aware
21 of his constitutional rights as to a jury trial, as to burden
22 of proof, as to degree of evidence and as to the fact that
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1 there are certail rules of evidence relating to admissions
2 of evidence, certain evidence which may or may not be admissibile
3 but the defendant being aware of his illness and wanting to
4 do whatever is right in accordance with it has submitted
5 himself to the mercy of this Court and does ask in accordance
6 with the findings of the Rochester State Hospital report
7 and in accordance with work which has been done by his bishop
8 and by others that there is an institution located in New
9 Mexico. The name of the institution is Via Coeli. It is
10 located near the city of Jenez Springs, New Mexico and it
11 is operated by the Paraclete Fathers and they are equipped
12 to handle the type of situation which is presented to the
13 Court by this defendant and this defendant, speaking on behalf
14 of this defendant, I pray the Court and entreaty the Court
15 that it consider the opportunity of giving this defendant
16 an opportunity to serve in the best capacity possible by
17 giving him the opportunity to go to the institution of Via
18 Coeli which I have just named and identified because I feel
19 this is an institution which is geared to the needs of this
20 defendant and the best chances of rehabilitation and develop-
21 ment in the personality and possible cure for the illness
22 do lie at Via Coeli rather than by imprisonment or any other
23 penalty which may be imposed.

1 THE COURT: Would you be sworn, please?

2 F. L. KAISER, sworn.

3 EXAMINATION

4 BY THE COURT:

5 Q As far as you know is there anything wrong with your health
6 at the present time, that is physical?
7

8 A My physical health is perfect. I have been fully checked
9 for that.

10 Q For the record, the Court certifies from outward appearances
11 the defendant appears to be in good health and fully understands
12 these proceedings. Now, you have heard the remarks made by
13 Mr. Gallagher?

14 A I have, your Honor.

15 Q Is there anything you wish to say in that regard?
16

17 A No, there isn't.

18 Q Anything that you would like to say in any respect concerning
19 this matter?

20 A Well, I was somewhat disappointed in the psychiatry that I
21 found at the state hospital. Of course, my presence there was
22 rather unique and I think they were more or less on the
23 defensive. I saw the clinical psychologist once in conference
24 and then he turned me over to an individual who was a
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1 Dominican priest who had been ordained two years. He came
2 from Ireland. It was quite difficult to understand him and
3 I did not regard him as qualified, as a qualified psychologist.
4 There was no effort by way of psychiatry whatsoever. However,
5 I should like to let the record know I was treated very well
6 at the state hospital and the physical part could not be
7 paralleled, I think even at the clinic. Perhaps I received
8 more physical attention than I would have at the clinic. Other-
9 wise I have nothing to add, your Honor.

11 Q Are you satisfied that you are guilty of the offense charged
12 by the information filed with the court?

13 A That is right.

14 Q Are you also satisfied that Mr. Gallagher has adequately
15 represented you?

16 A I am, your Honor.

17 Q And done everything for you that any attorney could do under
18 the circumstances?

19 A I am very well satisfied.

20 Q Is there anything at all now you wish to say before sentence
21 is passed?

22 A No, your Honor, that is all.

23 Q The judgment of conviction having been heretofore entered
24 it is now the sentence of this Court that you be committed
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1 to the Commissioner of Corrections for a period of time not
2 to exceed 20 years. It is the order of the Court that the
3 execution of that sentence may be and hereby is stayed on the
4 following terms and conditions: Number 1, that you be of good
5 behavior and abide by all the laws of the United States, the
6 State of Minnesota and any community in which you find yourself;
7 number 2, that you be under the supervision of the Commissioner
8 of Corrections and the state probation agent; number 3, that
9 you remain in custody of the Sheriff of Waseca County until
10 such time as the state probation agent has seen you; and on
11 the further condition that you abide by all the rules and
12 regulations set forth for your conduct by the state probation
13 agent and the Commissioner of Corrections; on the further
14 condition that you go to the place mentioned by Mr. Gallagher
15 known as Via Coeli which I understand to be near Albuquerque,
16 New Mexico and that you remain there and abide by the rules
17 of the persons that are in charge of that place and that you
18 further follow the directions of whatever person or whichever
19 person holds the office of the Bishop of Winona, that is, of
20 the Bishop of the diocese of Winona in the Catholic Church.
21 Essentially the Court is following the recommendations made
22 by Mr. Gallagher which we understood that he would not make
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1 unless he felt that you were agreeable to handling it that way
2 and we certainly wish you success in that respect. Anything
3 now that you would like to say?

4 A Well, is this period of incarceration until I see the
5 Commissioner of Probation? Is there any substitution for that?
6 Could I live at the rectory during that time?
7

8 Q We anticipate that the probation agent will be here tomorrow
9 during the ordinary working hours and that as soon as he has
10 seen you and that you have made arrangements for transportation
11 that you then will go to Via Coeli.

12 A How long a time would that be?

13 Q We would anticipate it should happen as soon as possible.

14 A Well, today is gone, tomorrow, Saturday -
15

16 Q I expect Saturday morning probably should be about the right
17 time providing arrangements for transportation can be made.

18 A In the meantime I am to be incarcerated?

19 Q You will be in the county jail until seen by the probation
20 agent sometime tomorrow afternoon.

21 A Thank you, your Honor.

22 Q Yes, sir.

PROBATION AGREEMENT
RULES AND REGULATIONS

I. General Rules:

I will abide by the general rules for probationers which are:

- a. I will obey all laws, avoid doubtful companions, avoid the excessive use of intoxicants, keep reasonable hours, and stay out of objectionable places.
- b. I will consult my Probation Agent for permission to:
 1. Buy or drive an automobile or any other motor vehicle.
 2. Borrow money or go into debt.
 3. Change employment or residence.
 4. Leave the community
- c. Through my Agent, I will request permission from the Adult Corrections Commission to:
 1. Leave the state.
 2. Marry.
- d. I will not associate, correspond or communicate with persons who are on parole or probation without the knowledge and consent of my Agent.
- e. I will immediately contact my Agent in case of any difficulty.
- f. I will cooperate with my Agent and be guided by his advice in all matters affecting my probation.

II. Monthly Report:

I will send a monthly report on the first day of each month to my Probation Agent using the blanks furnished by the Commissioner of Corrections.

III. Duration of Probation:

I understand that the continuation of my probation depends on my conduct and that I shall remain on probation until the expiration of my sentence unless the State Commissioner of Corrections and/or the Court deems it advisable to discharge me at an earlier date. In the event that I violate any of the rules, regulations or conditions of my probation, or otherwise prove myself unworthy to be continued on probation under the supervision of the Commissioner of Corrections, I will hold myself ready to be taken into custody, it being my understanding that the Commissioner has authority to place me in custody at any time and to report any violations to the sentencing Court.

IV. Special Conditions:

I will abide by the following special conditions set forth by the Court in my sentence:

1. "...that you be of good behavior and abide by all the laws of the United States, the State of Minnesota and any community in which you find yourself."
2. "...that you be under the supervision of the Commissioner of Corrections and the state probation agent."
3. "...that you remain in custody of the Sheriff of Waseca County until such time as the state probation agent has seen you; and on the further condition that you abide by all the rules and regulations set forth for your conduct by the state probation agent and the Commissioner of Corrections; on the further condition that you go to the place mentioned by Mr. Gallagher known as Via Coeli which I understand to be near Albuquerque, New Mexico and that you remain there and abide by the rules of the persons that are in charge of that place and that you further follow the directions of whatever person or whichever person holds the office of the Bishop of Winona, that is, of the Bishop

V. Waiver of Extradition: of the diocese of Winona in the Catholic Church."

I hereby do waive extradition to the State of Minnesota from any jurisdiction in or outside the United States where I may be found and also agree that I will not contest any effort by any jurisdiction to return me to the State of Minnesota.

I hereby certify that I have read and have had explained to me the foregoing rules, regulations, and conditions of my probation, and the waiver of extradition, that I understand and agree to be bound by these rules, regulations and conditions and the waiver of extradition, and that I have received a copy of this agreement.

12. **COURT-ORDERED EXAMINATION.** Coverage is provided for court-ordered physical or mental examinations by Plan Providers for dependent children. Physician services for court-ordered examinations are subject to the Copayment shown on the Face Sheet of this Certificate.

C. MENTAL HEALTH, INCLUDING ALCOHOLISM AND CHEMICAL DEPENDENCY SERVICES.

Services described in this Section III.C are covered only when furnished and approved in advance by a Plan Physician. Non-emergency inpatient or residential services in a Hospital or other Approved Health Care Facility or Program are covered only with prior approval by the Plan. However, such approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.

Referrals to a Plan therapist, a Plan Hospital or another Approved Health Care Facility or Program must be made by a Plan Physician to be covered; provided that if Your Plan Physician, or the Plan determines that no referral or structured treatment program is needed, You may receive, if desired, a second opinion at Plan expense from a non-Plan health professional qualified in the diagnosis and treatment of Your problem. The second opinion shall be considered by Your Plan Physician and, if applicable, by the Plan. However, neither the Plan nor any Plan Provider is bound to accept the second opinion.

1. **OUTPATIENT MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES.** Coverage includes up to 40 visits of 1 hour each, or equal time in longer or shorter visits, per Coverage Year. Group treatment sessions are provided at a ratio of no less than two group treatment hours to one individual treatment hour. Services include individual and group therapy, and, for a minor child, includes treatment for the family if family therapy is recommended by a Plan Provider. Prior authorization for all treatment beyond the first 10 visits is required. Such authorization will be based on the severity of the disorder, the patient's risk of deterioration without ongoing treatment and maintenance, degree of functional impairment, and a concise treatment

plan. The Plan will also cover a court-ordered mental examination by a Plan Provider for a dependent child as provided for in Section III.B.12.

All services and treatment for learning disabilities or attention deficit disorder diagnoses, including the initial evaluation, must be prior authorized, in writing by the Medical Director. The Medical Director will schedule an appointment with a Plan Physician for the initial evaluation for these diagnoses. Those services which are not prior authorized may not be covered by the Plan and may be the member's personal responsibility.

2. **OUTPATIENT ALCOHOLISM AND CHEMICAL DEPENDENCY SERVICES.** All outpatient alcoholism and chemical dependency services must be prior authorized in writing by the Medical Director. Those services which are not prior authorized may not be covered by the Plan, and may be the member's personal responsibility.
3. **INPATIENT SERVICES.** Coverage is for up to 30 days per Coverage Year for mental health inpatient care. The number of days covered for alcoholism or chemical dependency services are shown on the Face Sheet of this Certificate.

Inpatient services covered under this Section III.C.3 include semi-private care in a Plan Hospital or other Approved Health Care Facility or Program. Any cost difference between a semi-private and a private room is covered only if a private room is Medically Necessary.

4. **COPAYMENT.** Hospital inpatient services and Physician services under this Section III.C are subject to the applicable Copayments shown on the Face Sheet of this Certificate.

D. OUTPATIENT PRESCRIPTION DRUGS.

Drugs and medicines for health services covered by this certificate, prescribed by Plan Physicians, when received at Plan Pharmacies, will be covered; provided, however, that only drugs and medicines for which a physician's prescription is required by law, and those which contain a Prescription Drug and must be compounded by a pharmacist to a physician's order, are covered, except as indicated in Section VI.J. Insulin is also covered.

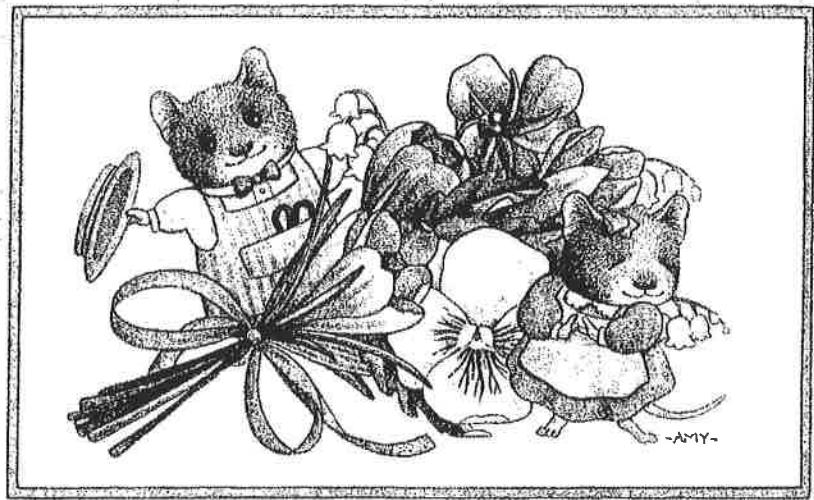

Bishop Vlaxny,

I have just read the article on sexual abuse in the November issue of the Courier for what seems like the hundredth time. It definitely has caused some inner turmoil for me. I want to believe that your words of concern and support are sincere, but I have a lot of trouble trusting the Church.

In the mid to late 1960's I was sexually abused by a priest from the Winona diocese. For some unexplained reason Fr. Ferdinand Kaiser was sent to live with his [redacted] I assume that he was sent to live with his [redacted] because of troubles that he had in his assigned parish. His [redacted] told us that he was a retired priest, but I now know how unlikely that was. Fr. Kaiser was only in his fifties. Healthy priests don't retire that young.

So I am assuming that he was a product of the "change of scene" concept you referred to in your article. Unfortunately, the diocese didn't very thoroughly check out the surroundings they were sending him to. He was placed in a neighborhood swarming with trusting children. [redacted], like myself, attended the local Catholic school and really saw priests and nuns as a piece of God walking on Earth.

My family's chances of avoiding Fr. Kaiser were reduced even further because his sister [redacted] babysat me and [redacted] brothers and sisters. We loved [redacted] and would often visit her at her home. It was during those visits that Fr. Kaiser would sexually abuse me.

I'm certain that Fr. Kaiser also abused my [redacted] brother. He would take my brother to a lake cabin, and I am assuming that that was where he sexually abused him. I'm not sure where Fr. Kaiser went once he left [redacted] but I do know his legacy was left in my household. My brother then continued the cycle and sexually abused me for several years.

These memories had all been securely tucked away by my sub-conscious for years, but now that they are surfacing I can't ignore their existence. In order to heal, there are many effects of the sexual abuse I must tend to and work at changing. For the past five months I have been attending weekly counseling sessions with a licensed psychologist. This therapy has been very effective, and I hope to continue for as long as necessary.

This brings me to another statement from your article. "The clergy, religious and laity of this diocese are eager to make amends." How committed are you to that statement? I have been searching for information on Fr. Kaiser but seem to be constantly running into closed doors. I need this information to help unlock my lost memories and to put some of my questions to rest. I want to know why Fr. Kaiser was sent to . I want to know how long he was in and where he went after leaving . I would also like a photo of him. My memories are void of his face, and I'm hoping that a picture may help me to put more of the pieces together.

I am sure that my last request will come as no surprise to you. It doesn't seem right that I should have to pay twice. The Church made a huge error in placing Fr. Kaiser in a neighborhood with so many children. I am certain that the diocese was aware of Fr. Kaiser's sexually deviant behavior. The Church's carelessness has already robbed me of my childhood and hopes of the normal development and securities afforded others. It's not right that I should have to pay financially to regain the sense of self worth taken from me at such an early age. I ask only that the diocese covers my counseling expenses. I want no reimbursement for my own pocket. This financial assistance is not only a compensation that I feel is owed to me but a validation I deserve.



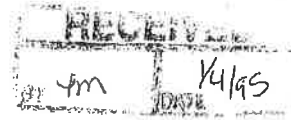
