





Many thanks for your letter of a few weeks ago. It was really good to hear from you. You certainly sounded good. I read your letter when I received it and now again as I am responding to it. I did get the letter from and I have responded to her.

I can certainly imagine the difficulty involved in having to reveal oneself to everyone. That is certainly hard to do for anyone with a large group. I just don't think we were ever conditioned to let a large number of people know our innermost thoughts and feelings.

Sometime you are going to have to tell me what the advantage in that is. I can see some positive side to it, such as being fully accepted by everyone and the recognition that everybody has a dark side which they would rather not reveal. To know that we can be loved, despite our dark sides, is certainly a plus, but I don't think I would enjoy going around letting everybody know my dark side. At any rate, nice going, I could certainly feel with you the difficulty you experienced.

I just say, "thank God for places like the House of Affirmation." How helpful it is to have people who really know what they are doing.

I know you must be worried about the future, as well as the past, but somehow you have to find a way to set those fears behind you. We can become immobilized if we think of all the possibilities that could happen. I know that I thought about the worse possible set of consequences, I don't think I could handle it. We have

to trust in the Lord that He does watch over us and will help us survive any difficulty that may arise.

I don't think you should be unduly concerned about the parish. I think that has pretty much settled down and I would not expect any type of action from there. He seems to have considerable anxiety about the future, and while there is certainly some uncertainty to that future, there is at the same time considerable assurance that in time he will return to this diocese. I know that the uncertainty of the future must be troubling for him, but I do think it is important not only for Fred, but also for the diocese, that he have some time of pastoral activity before he returns.

I certainly appreciate your support for Fred and particularly your assistance in helping him through what is becoming an increasingly more difficult time. I can well imagine how time begins to be drawn out for many of the residents and soon becomes an enemy. I know that this is a particularly difficult time for Fred and I will certainly keep him in my prayers. Again, I appreciate all that you and the others at the House of Affirmation are doing for so many. You, also, are in my prayers.

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MEMORANDUM FOR THE FILE

July 15, 1986

RE: Reverend Fred Lenczycki

I met with Fred Monday evening, July 7th. We talked about his work at the parish in Pacifica and his future. Initially both of us had felt that Fred would return to the diocese in June of 1987.

In discussing this, however, we reached a mutual decision that this would be too soon and that a decision to return to the diocese should be delayed for some time. Fred expressed the apprehension that he felt during this trip home whenever he would see someone from his former parish. He feared that returning at this time would create considerable tension and apprehension for him. He said that he did not wish to be a liability to the parish, the diocese or himself.

I suggested that Fred speak to his present pastor upon his return about his being able to stay on after June of 1987. Evidently there is another priest waiting in the wings to take up residence in the parish if and when Fred should leave. If the pastor is agreeable to Fred's staying on, then I said that I would write Archbishop Quinn after the first of the year asking for a year's extension for Fred. We both agreed that a new decision would be reached annually.

I think we had a mutual understanding that Fred would probably not return here for at least three, and probably four years, if then. We talked about the possibility of beginning to feel at home in the San Francisco area and applying for incardination there. At the same time, Fred has a strong desire to return "home," but "home" may eventually become the San Francisco area.

In the fall of 1979, Reverend Lawrence Mullins sexually abused me during the sacrament of reconciliation and a second time in his room at the Cathedral rectory. These two incidents were extremely painful because during the first one I was trying to extricate myself from the secrecy trap Father Lenczycki had entangled me. The second incident took place at a moment of incredible vulnerability. The Dean Mr. Block, found me standing at the bulletin board crying uncontrollably

Mullins, a friend to many of the seminarians. To my horror, Father Mullins sought to seduce me once in his room. Amazingly, I was able to stop my tears and fight him off. I demanded he take me back to the seminary. This ended my encounters with either of them, but also left me isolated in my shame, confusion and immense hurt.

Fortunately, I am at a place of healing now. My anger runs deep, only matched by my incredible sadness. As I overcome my shame and hurt, I am finding it possible to let go and trust you have or will do what is necessary for these priests and to protect others. Catholic diocese sued in alleged molestation

JOLIET — An unidentified man has filed suit against the Joliet Catholic Diocese claiming one of its priests sexually molested him in the early 1980s.

The man, identified only as "John Doe," filed the case in Will County court against the diocese, Bishop Joseph Imesch and the Rev. Fred Lenczyski, the priest who allegedly molested him.

Lenczyski was assigned to the St. Isaac Jogues parish in Hinsdale, which is where the molestation is alleged to have taken place on 20 or 30 occasions in 1982, 1983 and 1984. The alleged victim was aged 9 through 11 when the incidents occurred.

The suit says the victim psychologically repressed his memories of the abuse until September 1995. It seeks unspecified damages more than \$50,000 for psychological problems, embarrassment and post-traumatic stress syndrome, among other things.

Sister Judith Davies, spokesman for the diocese, said in a prepared statement that Lenczyski was removed immediately from the parish when the diocese became aware of complaints against him in 1984.




Because Cynthia is an addictions specialist on the Committee, she was asked at the 05-14-02 Committee meeting, to sit in on "John's" telling his story to Bishop Imesch.

Summary:

Because "John Doe" wanted confidentiality, and just wanted to be "listened to", notes were not taken during his 2 hour meeting with Bishop Imesch and Cynthia Power, on Friday, June 2, at St. Charles Borromeo Ministry Center. It was not until the last ½ hour that "John" volunteered his name, Doe At that time, he also walked Bishop Imesch and Cynthia Power down a corridor of St. Charles Borromeo and pointed out pictures of the two priests he was discussing: "Father X", who made the referral for psychotherapy, was a Father Slade; the identified offender, "Father Fred", was pointed out as Fr. Fred Lenczycki.

Father recommended see a Fr. Fred, who was studying counseling, and resided at St. Charles Borromeo Seminary 1062, remembered seeing Fr. Fred only five times and vividly remembered the horrible beating his parents gave him when 1062 tried to resist returning to Fr. Fred. 

STATEMENT OF BISHOP TIMOTHY DOLAN REGARDING FATHER TED LENCZYCKI

ST. LOUIS — The following statement is from Bishop Timothy Dolan regarding the Rev. Fred Lenczycki:

"An allegation of sexual abuse of a minor in the 1980s by Father Fred Lenczycki, a priest of the diocese of Joliet, Illinois, was brought to the attention of the Archdiocese of St. Louis last month. The diocese of Joliet was immediately contacted and he was recalled to Joliet.

"Since the early 1990s Father Lenczycki had been serving as chaplain of DePaul Health Center. Archdiocesan records contain nothing pertaining to the original allegation. There has been no evidence and are no complaints in the St. Louis Archdiocese regarding Father Lenczycki.

"While in St. Louis, Father Lenczycki resided at a number of parishes. Among them were St. Blaise Parish in Maryland Heights, North American Martyrs Parish in Florissant, and St. George Parish in Gardenville. Father Lenczycki was sometimes known as Father "Lenz" because of the difficulties some people had in pronouncing his name.

"The Archdiocese acted promptly when it learned of the allegation in this situation. Such action underscores our primary goal of protecting children and their families from harm by those in whom they put their trust."

In addition to informing Archbishop May, Bishop Imesch directed Father Lenczycki to inform the hospital administration of his past. Bishop Imesch confirmed that the hospital had been informed.

Sexual abuse of minors is a tragedy. The Diocese of Joliet takes this issue seriously. We have had a series of policies in place since 1990. We will continue to do everything in our power to ensure that no child is at risk.

St. Louis officials had no idea chaplain was accused of molesting 9 altar boys

A priest accused of molesting nine altar boys in the Joliet diocese was allowed to serve in St. Louis for a decade, celebrating mass in a parish where no one knew his past.

When officials in the St. Louis Roman Catholic church learned of the complaints against the Rev. Fred Lenczycki, however, they called Bishop Joseph Imesch and told him to take his priest back.

"Within the last month, we came aware of an allegation sexual abuse in his past, and ked that he be recalled to Joliet," said Archdiocese of St. Louis spokeswoman Terry Edelmann. "That was the first we ever heard of anything in his

past." Even though Lenczycki was pulled out of St. Isaac Jogues parish in Hinsdale in 1984 after children accused him of fondling them, Imesch endorsed the priest when he went to the

St. Louis church. "He had a positive recommendation from his bishop," Edelmann said. "That meant we had no reason to suspect there was anything wrong."

Imesch never told anyone in the St. Louis archdiocese that Lenczycki was placed in a medical facility for a yearlong course of psychiatric treatment immediately after the children and their parents complained, nor did he reveal the priest had undergone six years of outpatient therapy, nor did he reveal Lenczycki had admitted to abusing the boys.

The Joliet diocese did not disclose that it had recalled Lenczycki last month, even as it was naming publicly other priests who had been removed from ministry.

The unfolding scandal in the Joliet diocese, where Imesch has transferred at least three priests accused of abuse to new ministries where they had access to children, mirrors the furor over sex abuse and hierarchical cover-up rocking the Catholic Church.

In Joliet, Imesch has removed from ministry four other priests, two of whom also worked as hospital chaplains. The Archdiocese of Chicago has pulled two priests out of their parishes. One of those is parishes. accused of molesting a teenager at St. Germaine Church in Oak

The St. Louis archdiocese has removed three priests from ministry and accepted the resignation of a fourth who was accused of abuse.

Lenczycki applied to the Archdiocese of St. Louis for faculties, or permission to act as a priest, from the bishop there in 1992, Edelmann said.

The priest already had worked for two years as a chaplain at Deaconness Hospital, also on a positive recommendation from Imesch, according to

placed Lenczycki in DePaul Health Center, a 128-year-old facility that houses more than 450 patients. He worked there for the next 10 years without restrictions, Edelmann said.

In addition to his hospital work, Lenczycki resided at St. Blaise, a parish with a school about 15 miles northwest of St. Louis. He said mass there regu-

Officials at St. Blaise could not be reached for comment.

The Daily Southtown reported Sunday that Imesch did not believe it was his duty to inform the hospitals of Lenczycki's past. Imesch told the Southtown the hospitals had been aware of the priest's actions, however.

Diocese of Joliet officials did not return calls seeking comment Monday.

Lenczycki, Imesch and the Joliet diocese were sued in 1997 by one of the priest's alleged victims. Edelmann said the St. Louis archdiocese had been unaware of that lawsuit.


There are no pending allegations of abuse against Lenczycki in Missouri. The lawsuit against him was settled in 1998 for an undisclosed sum of money.

Last month, shortly before Lenczycki was recalled, diocesan attorneys convinced a judge to seal records in the lawsuit against him. The judge agreed over the objections of the victim's attorney, who said his client's accusations and the diocese's response should not be kept secret

The Plaintiff was too embarrassed, guilty feeling and fearful of discipline to tell his parents that he had been abused by Father Lenczycki. (Plaintiff dep. P. 98) He never had any conversations when he was a child with his parents about Father Fred and the abuse he suffered. (Plaintiff dep. P. 113) He denied anything had happened because of his fear and his guilt. (Plaintiff dep. P. 116) He was also embarrassed by what had occurred and did not tell his brothers or anyone else. (Plaintiff dep. P. 117 - 122) His parents asked him many times about it. (Plaintiff dep. P. 116)

The Plaintiff's memory of what happened at St. Isaac Jogues with Father Fred was repressed when his family moved to and he did not remember what happened approximately two years prior to the deposition.

Bishop Imesch knew that Father Fred should not be involved with the counseling of boys after December 4, 1984. (Imesch dep. P. 57 - 59; 74 - 75) Bishop Imesch knew that Father Fred was involved in counseling of persons at a hospital in St. Louis and that he was in pastoral care. However, in spite of the fact Bishop Imesch was a supervisor of Father Fred, he did not think it was his duty to notify the hospital where Father Fred worked of Lenczycki's past experience with boys. (Imesch dep. P. 74) The Bishop could not say whether or not Father Fred was involved in the counseling of children. (Imesh dep. P. 75 - 76) Father Fred still works under the auspices of Bishop Imesch of the Diocese of Joliet. (Imesch dep. P. 77)

With regard to his present employment, Father Fred told his employer at the hospital were he works that he had been accused of wrong doing at St. Isaac Jogues but that he had not done anything to the boys. at St. Isaac Jogues. (Lenczycki dep. P. 162 - 163) He also told the parish where he lives in St. Louis that he was accused of doing something at St. Isaac Jogues but that he never did anything wrong. (Lenczycki dep. P. 162 - 163)

Contrary to the statements of Bishop Imesch, Father Fred Lenczycki's duties at his present job in St. Louis as Manager of Pastoral Care Department includes counseling of children. There is no restriction on the patients which he sees. (Lenczycki dep. P. 4 - 6) His present employer is DePaul Health Center. (Lenczycki dep. P. 6) He was also in Clinical Pastoral Education at Deaconess Hospital and the range of patients he saw there was from birth through elderly years. He saw children in that job also. (Lenczycki dep. P. 8 - 9)

TOLLING OF THE STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS

The discovery rule is a judicially established rule. Weitherell vs. Weimer 85 III 2d 146 (1981). Under the discovery rule, the statute of limitations is tolled until a person knows or reasonably should know of his injury and that it was wrongfully caused. Plaintiff pleads in his cause of action that he did not know nor reasonably should have know of his injury or its cause until on or about September 10, 1995, at which time his memory of the sexual abuse at the hands of Father Fred Lenczycki and the negligent complicity of Father Donald Kocher and the other Defendants returned.

The Illinois discovery rule applies to a non-perpetrator of sexual abuse. The codification of sexual abuse under 202.2 does not abrogate the discovery rule vis a vis non-perpetrators.

Plaintiff argues the case of *Hawley vs. Kenley* (1994, 3d) 261 Ill App 3d 307, 310, 634 N.E. 2d 20, 23. However, in the *Hawley* case, the factual basis on which the Court made it's ruling was conclusively different from the facts in this cause. In *Hawley*, the Court noted that the Plaintiff had known of her sexual abuse at the hands of the Grandfather and with the

This afternoon I spoke with Father Fred Lenczycki about the article that had appeared in today's issue of the *Daily Southtown*. I told him that called yesterday, telling us that the paper had received information about other allegations during Father's time in California (1985-1991) and that those allegations were forwarded to the San Mateo County States Attorney. I read him excerpts from the article, specifically "The parish's pastor, the Rev. Leonard Calegari, told parishioners Lenczycki was supposed to reveal his history to the pastor of the church and continue therapy." "The district attorney in San Mateo County... is now investigating two separate allegations of sexual abuse lodged by St. Peter parishioners."

Father Lenczycki said that Father Calegari was informed about his situation and even spoke with his [Father Lenczycki] therapist.

Father Lenczycki also said that someone from the DuPage County States Attorney called Father Calegari. A secretary answered the phone saying that her son's problems began while Lenczycki was there.

I was going to fax a copy of the article to Father Lenczycki, but he had no access to a fax.

This letter follows our discussion yesterday, August 5th. As you know, we sent you our lawsuit with a request to contact me if your client was interested in discussing settlement as opposed to litigating this case. As I described yesterday, we are often reluctant to engage in settlement discussions in that many defendants do not take pre-suit discussions seriously. We both, however, see this case as being somewhat different than the typical personal injury and wrongful death case. We hope your client will take this matter seriously and consider an appropriate settlement offer.

The evidence and the facts in this case are specifically set forth in the proposed lawsuit we have forwarded to you. You are intimately aware of the facts surrounding the sexual abuse victims at St. Isaacs School of which our client was one. You are also aware of admissions made by representatives of the Joliet Diocese as well as Reverend Lenczycki in testimony under oath. Also, the evidence from my client's family, as well as other witnesses who were present immediately after his assault, will solidify any doubts as to what occurred.



Nearly 7 Month Investigation of Joliet Diocese in DuPage Concludes, Resulting in One Priest Indicted

DuPage County State's Attorney Joe Birkett announced today that his office has concluded a 6 ½ month investigation into allegations of sexual misconduct by priests of the Joliet Diocese in DuPage County. The result of the investigation includes a Grand Jury indictment against Fred Lenczycki, 58 (d.o.b. 6/12/44) for Aggravated Criminal Sexual Abuse, for alleged misconduct while he was serving at the St. Isaac Jogues Church in Hinsdale in the mid 1980's.

In April of this year, as a result of a series of sexual abuse scandals, State's Attorney Birkett instructed his staff to seek a Grand Jury subpoena directing the Joliet Diocese to produce all documents relating to any complaints of sexual misconduct between members of the clergy and persons under 18 years of age. The time period of the subpoena was from 1970 to April 25, 2002, the date of issue. According to State's Attorney Birkett, the Joliet Diocese fully complied with the Grand Jury subpoena and cooperated with all additional requests made by his office. In total, the office reviewed cases involving 26 priests through materials provided by the Diocese. Three (3) additional priests were investigated as a result of allegations that came to our attention by persons who contacted the office as a result of media publicity on the pending investigation. In total, twenty nine (29) priests were investigated.

A thorough investigation of all allegations was conducted, involving Investigators and

Prosecutors of the DuPage County State's Attorney's Office. The investigation was overseen by Assistant State's Attorney Dan Guerin, the Supervising Attorney of the Domestic Violence/Child Abuse Unit and Chief William Simmons of the office's Investigations Unit. State's Attorney Birkett noted that some of the investigations concluded with no findings of wrongdoing, while others did involve evidence of wrongdoing but were barred from prosecution due lack of venue and the tolling of the Statute of Limitations.

However, one case did reveal allegations of sexual misconduct where there was a sufficient legal and factual basis to proceed with legal action. A Grand Jury investigations was opened in August whereby witnesses and evidence were presented to the Grand Jury. The resulting action was that the DuPage County Grand Jury returned a True Bill against Fred Lenczycki, 58, currently of 377 Sandhurst Circle in Glen Ellyn charging him with five (5) counts of Aggravated Criminal Sexual Abuse against three (3) boys.

It is alleged that the defendant, while serving as a priest at St. Isaac Jogues Catholic Church in Hinsdale, engaged in separate acts of sexual abuse with three (3) boys between October 1, 1984 and December 4, 1984. The three boys were each 12 years old and were both students and parishioners at the time of the alleged incidents. The victims are now in their 30's. The alleged sexual abuse occurred on the church property in Hinsdale.

In December of 1984, a boy disclosed to his parents that the defendant had acted in a sexually suspicious manner with him, and the parents brought the allegation to the attention of both the defendant and the Pastor at St. Isaac Jogues. The next day, the Joliet Diocese transferred the defendant out of the parish. At that time, no child had reported to the church or to any law enforcement agency that there had been any criminal acts committed by the defendant. These disclosures came to light many years later.

It was learned that the defendant was transferred to various treatment centers and assignments in Missouri and California through the mid 1980's and 1990s. As a result of his absence from the jurisdiction, the Statute of Limitations was suspended.

The defendant has been charged with five (5) counts of Aggravated Criminal Sexual Abuse, a Class 2 offense, which is punishable by 3 to 7 years in the Illinois Department of Corrections, but is

also a probationable offense. Yesterday, Judge Michael Burke signed an arrest warrant and set bond at \$100,000. The defendant, through his attorney, has been in touch with authorities and he is expected to turn himself in shortly.

"No child is prepared for the possibility of molestation by a trusted adult, especially a member of the clergy," Birkett said. "This nearly seven month investigation was conducted in a very thorough and professional manner. If these allegations are proven in a court of law, this defendant faces a penalty of up to seven years in prison for his sexual misconduct with these three boys."

Following the vast public outcry in April and the opening of this investigation, State's Attorney Birkett hosted two religious summits in early May to garner the input of the religious community in crafting legislation in order to best address this public issue. Members of numerous faiths participated at both the Chicago and DuPage County summits, resulting in various amendments being made to the bill. House Bill 5002 unanimously passed out of both the Illinois House of Representatives and Senate in late May. The final result was that on August 16th, Governor George Ryan signed into law State's Attorney Birkett's bill mandating clergy to report child physical and sexual abuse.

In addition to the proposal of this new law, State's Attorney Birkett hosted a Mandatory Reporting of Child Abuse Seminar in early September whereby for the first time, the newly mandated reporters (clergy) were trained on their obligations to report child abuse.

Members of the public are reminded that this complaint contains only charges and is not proof of the defendant's guilt. A defendant is presumed innocent and is entitled to a fair trial in which it is the government's burden to prove his or her guilt beyond a reasonable doubt.

Joliet priest charged with sexual abuse

A Joliet diocese priest now must face long-delayed accusations that he sexually abused parish children in his care, prosecutors announced Thursday.

A DuPage County grand jury has indicted the Rev. Fred Lenczycki, a former priest at St. Isaac Jogues parish in Hinsdale, on five counts of aggravated criminal sexual abuse against three young boys of the parish.

"This case is an example of broken promises in the church," DuPage County State's Attorney Joe Birkett said Thursday, announcing the charges. "And the biggest broken promise is the promise the priest himself made."

Of 29 accused molesters from the Joliet church investigated by DuPage County over the past seven months, Lenczycki is the only one who can still be tried, Birkett said.

The 58-year-old priest was removed from St. Isaac Jogues in 1984 and transferred out of state to various locations during the last 17 years, including a California parish where he also was accused of abuse. Because he was out of state, Illinois' statute of limitations on his alleged offenses did not expire, Birkett explained.

A warrant was issued for Lenczycki's arrest. The priest's attorney, Vincent Cornelius, said Lenczycki was returning from out of town Thursday evening and would surrender himself to authorities this morning.

"He's presumed innocent," Cornelius said. "We are not as certain that the charges brought are within the statute of limitations, and we will say that in court."

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Released April If Convicted, Lenczycki could face a maximum of seven years in prison on each count.

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In 1984, while Lenczycki was a priest at St. Isaac Jogues, Birkett said, he used his power as a man of God to molest three 12-year-old boys and persuade them to stay silent about it, authorities said.

"He used his position of trust and authority as a Catholic priest to entice these boys," Birkett said.

The priest was transferred from the church after a parishioner reported to Hinsdale police that he engaged in sexual misconduct. Lenczycki spent a month in a parish in downstate Beaverville, and three months in Columbia, Mo., Birkett said, before being transferred to a rehabilitation center in California.

After nearly a year there, Lenczycki was placed in a parish — St. Peter in Pacifica, Calif. He served there from 1986 to 1991 and was beloved by parishioners. The pastor of the Pacifica church later told reporters he did not know "the full extent" of Lenczycki's past when he agreed to let the priest serve there.

Authorities in San Mateo County, Calif., are now investigating two complaints of molestation against Lenczycki there.

In 1991, the priest went to the Archdiocese of St. Louis, where he worked as a chaplain in two hospitals. Both hospitals denied any knowlege of the allegations against Lenczycki before last April, when his past became public and he was recalled to Joliet.

Archdiocese of St. Louis officials claim they had no record of Lenczycki's past. Joliet diocese officials maintain they told the St. Louis church about the priest.

"Ironically, it is because of this movement that Illinois' statute of limitations did not run (out)," Birkett said. "Until March 2002, Father Lenczycki was not a regular public resident of the state of Illinois."

Illinois' statute of limitations on sexual abuse expires 10 years after the victim's 18th birthday unless the accused leaves the state's jurisdiction. Lenczycki's accusers are now in their 30s.

Lenczycki was sued by one of his accusers in 1997, and the accuser and the diocese reached a confidential settlement. Last February, the diocese went to court and sealed records in the case.

In the other 28 cases of priests reviewed by the DuPage County state's attorney's office, six of the priests were deceased. The other 22 could not be charged, most often because the statute of limitations had run out.

"This is the only viable case we had," Birkett said. He added that none of the other priests was currently in parish ministry.

The DuPage County state's attorney's office issued a grand jury subpeona April 25 to the Joliet diocese seeking information about accused priests, Birkett said.

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Released April 20he same day, the diocese issued a news release stating it was voluntarily relinquishing information to civil authorities, including the DuPage and Will County state's attorney's offices.

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Birkett praised the cooperation the office received from diocesan officials. He said Joliet Bishop Joseph Imesch could not be held responsible in a court of law for his actions regarding Lenczycki and other diocese priests.

The Joliet diocese will continue to cooperate with all civil investigations, said John Cullen, the diocese's newly hired spokesman.

"We share the goal of protecting children and we want justice to be done," Cullen said.

He said diocesan officials' "recollections differ" from those of the Archdiocese of St. Louis and the Pacifica church about what was known about Lenczycki's past.


Ten priests have been publicly removed from ministry in the Diocese of Joliet, and 14 priests have been removed in the neighboring Archdiocese of Chicago.

Former St. Isaac Jogues parishioner Linda Pieczynski first reported Lenczycki to the Hinsdale police in 1984. Lenczycki's attorney did not allow police to question the priest, and no victims would come forward at the time, so no charges were filed.

Pieczynski said she was bitterly disappointed that it took 17 years to bring the priest who baptized her children to justice for harming other people's loved ones.

"This whole thing is a tragedy, even for the priest," said Pieczynski, who now heads a liberal Catholic reform group. "If he had faced the music in 1985, maybe he wouldn't be facing it now at the age of 58. I take no joy in this at all."

Dear Fred,

I am responding to the letter you wrote to me several weeks ago. I would much prefer to talk to you as I am not very comfortable trying to discuss difficult issues in writing. However, I have the feeling that you do not want to or should not talk to me until your case is settled. I leave that to your good judgment.

I do and do not understand your feeling of "distance from the diocese." I am certainly willing to meet and talk with you, but as I said, that may not be possible for you.

The matter of compensation is certainly one which needs to be discussed. I do not know what would be considered sufficient compensation. I know that we are to provide you with board and room. I do now know what a proper amount should be nor do I know how long the diocese should do this. I may have mentioned before that people feel very strongly that we should not be providing financial assistance for priests who have abused. They do not understand the responsibility that the diocese has to do this.

I can certainly understand your feelings about not being able to function as a priest. That must be very painful. It seems clear that you will not be allowed to serve as a priest in the future, even though I believe that you are not a threat to anyone. Nevertheless, as you well know, the past frequently determines ones future.

At one time I mentioned to you the need to find employment. You are at an age where I do not think you can think of not providing for

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yourself for the rest of your life. I also realize that you may not be able to look for employment until after your case is settled, whenever that may be.

These are difficult times for you I know. Hopefully, we can discuss our concerns as well as our differences. I continue to keep you in prayer each day and I appreciate your remembrance, also.

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Case against priest to proceed

1984 abuse: Judge won't dismiss charges

WHEATON —— The criminal case against a Joliet Diocese priest accused of sexually abusing three 12-year-old boys nearly 20 years ago can proceed, a judge ruled Wednesday.

DuPage County Judge Ann Jorgensen rejected a defense attorney's motion to dismiss charges against the Rev. Fred Lenczycki, 58, of Glen Ellyn. Lenczycki's attorney argued that the statute of limitations - or time frame to pursue criminal charges - had run out.

The alleged abuse occurred in October 1984 when Lenczycki was assigned to St. Isaac Jogues parish in Hinsdale. The three alleged victims — now in their early 30s —— should have filed complaints before their 19th birthdays, according to one section of the state law at the time, defense attorney Vincent Cornelius argued.

But Jorgensen agreed with prosecutors' interpretation of the statute of limitations regarding sex crimes against minors. Though state law sets time limits for prosecuting some felony charges, the statute is suspended while a defendant is living out of state.

Sent for counseling

When allegations against Lenczycki first surfaced in late 1984, Joliet Bishop Joseph Imesch sent Lenczycki for counseling and later assigned him to ministries in California and Missouri. California authorities last year investigated claims that Lenczycki abused children when he served 1986-91 at St. Peter parish in Pacifica, Calif.

Imesch then assigned Lenczycki to serve as a hospital chaplain in the St. Louis area. In 1997, one of Lenczycki's alleged victims filed a civil lawsuit claiming the priest engaged in inappropriate

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sexual conduct with nine boys at the St. Isaac Jogues rectory in 1984. The civil case was settled for an undisclosed amount.

Lenczycki continued to serve as a priest until last year, when Imesch suspended him from public ministry in the wake of media coverage about how church authorities shielded Roman Catholic priests who sexually abused minors.

Attorneys for both sides agree that Lenczycki lived in Illinois for 22 months between the time of the alleged crimes in 1984 and September 2002, when a grand jury indicted the cleric on five counts of aggravated criminal sexual abuse.

Lenczycki's attorney cited a a section of the statute that allowed minors who are sexually abused one year after their 18th birthdays to pursue criminal charges. Assistant DuPage County State's Attorney Alex McGimpsey contended that another section of the state law at the time allowed three years from the date of the alleged crime to pursue a case, and the judge agreed. Though more than three years has elapsed since the time of the alleged incidents, the clock stopped when Lenczycki was living out of state, Jorgensen ruled.

"We respectfully disagree with the court's analysis of the statute of limitations. We read it in a different way," Cornelius told reporters after the hearing.

Statute of limitations

During the 1990s the statute of limitations for prosecuting people accused of sex crimes against minors in Illinois was extended to give alleged victims until their 28th birthdays to pursue criminal charges. This spring, both houses of the Illinois General Assembly voted to extend the statute yet again —— to age 38 —— and the bill will become law if signed by Gov. Rod Blagojevich.

Lenczycki's next court date is scheduled for Aug. 25. He could face three to seven years in prison if convicted.

When announcing the indictment against Lenczycki last year, DuPage County State's Attorney Joe Birkett said investigators uncovered evidence that 29 Joliet Diocese priests may have engaged in sexual misconduct with minors, but that DuPage prosecutors were only able to pursue charges against Lenczycki.

Priest accused of molesting boy after dressing him up like Jesus By Sara Burnett Daily Herald Staff Writer

A former DuPage County priest already facing sexual abuse charges molested a teenage boy after dressing him like Jesus Christ and taking his picture, an attorney for the victim said Wednesday.

The Rev. Fred Lenczycki abused the teen "on a regular and repeated basis" between 1980 and 1983, when Lenczycki was a priest at St. Isaac Jogues Catholic Church in Hinsdale, according to the lawsuit filed Wednesday in DuPage County civil court.

The eight-count lawsuit also accuses the Diocese of Joliet and Bishop Joseph L. Imesch of covering up widespread clergy abuse and creating an environment that taught parishioners that "good" Catholics didn't report misconduct.

Attorneys for the victim, who is now in his 30s and lives in rural Illinois, are seeking more than \$50,000 in damages per count.

n a statement, attorney Marc Pearlman said that on about a dozen occasions, Lenczycki of Glen Ellyn dressed the teen - then 14 to 17

The evidence would show that throughout his career the defendant had a close relationship with Bishop Imesch, evidenced by numerous letters the two exchanged over the years, many of which touched upon the defendant's misconduct with young boys following the discovery of the defendant's child sexual abuse while assigned to St. Isaac Jogues Parish, Hinsdale, DuPage County, Illinois.

The evidence would show that the defendant was assigned to St. Isaac Jogues, effective June 19, 1980. The evidence would show that was a seventh grade student at St. Isaac Jogues Grammar School in 1984. He was 12 years old when Fr. Lenczycki sent a note to him in class saying he wanted to see him. 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Priest is sentenced for abuse

Joliet Diocese: Rev. Fred Lenczycki pleads guilty to child molestation

WHEATON — The only Joliet Diocese Catholic priest criminally charged in connection with decades-old allegations of sexual abuse pleaded guilty on Monday to molesting three boys and was sentenced to five years in prison.

The Rev. Fred Lenczycki, 59, fondled as many as 13 boys in the rectory of St. Isaac Jogues Church in Hinsdale in late 1984, prosecutors said. Three men, all age 31, were prepared to testify at Lenczycki's trial about abuse at the Hinsdale church. One appeared in court and read a victim-impact statement.

"Imagine being violated by the very person who is there to teach morals, ethics and religion," the man told Judge Ann Jorgensen. "I will never live a day, week, month or year without recalling the events of such a sick individual."

DuPage County State's Attorney Joseph Birkett said he notified the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops and Vatican authorities of Lenczycki's conviction and urged them to take steps to remove him from the priesthood.

"In my 23 years as a prosecutor, I have rarely been more disgusted by the facts of a case than I was by this defendant," Birkett told reporters.

Lenczycki's behavior included fondling boys after having them disrobe and putting on a loincloth-like garment, Birkett said. Lenczycki persuaded boys to believe they were trying on a costume for a play, and the priest would breathe heavily and perspire during the acts, Birkett said. Lenczycki also had boys answer a lengthy questionnaire that included questions about sex, gave massages to naked boys, and photographed some boys wearing the scant costume, Birkett said.

Birkett said he spoke by phone with Joliet Bishop Joseph Imesch on Monday and told the leader of the diocese's 620,000 Catholics that he questioned the moral judgment of the bishop's decision to reassign Lenczycki to a parish ministry after the Hinsdale allegations first surfaced.

"It is clear from the facts of this case that the Joliet Diocese placed a priority on protecting their own instead of the victims," Birkett said.

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Site Tools About Our Paper About Our Site Advertiser Index Privacy Policy Search Terms of Use Criminal investigators uncovered evidence that Lenczycki continued to molest boys after Imesch pulled him from the Hinsdale parish and sent him to a center where priests who abused children received counseling, authorities said. Imesch transferred Lenczycki to St. Peter's Church in Pacifica, Calif., where the priest molested at least three other boys, Birkett said.

"This pattern of hiding priests for the express purpose of avoiding prosecution is what I consider running from justice, but it is not a crime. (Imesch) broke no civil law," Birkett said.

Imesch disputes Birkett's characterization of Lenczycki's transfer, diocese spokesman John Cullen said Monday night. When reports of Lenczycki's misconduct first surfaced in 1984, no family was willing to pursue criminal charges.

"(Imesch) knew it was inappropriate behavior. He didn't know there was anything sexual about it," Cullen said.

Lenczycki's case was scheduled to go to trial this week, and his guilty plea surprised prosecutors who expected the priest's attorney to request a continuance.

"(Lenczycki) made a decision that he was ready to get this resolved. The most important thing to him was that he wanted to give closure to the victims and avoid having them testify at a trial or a sentencing hearing," said his defense attorney, Vincent Cornelius.

Yet the cleric made no apologies for his behavior during his sentencing hearing, Birkett said.

"He did not seize the opportunity to apologize or express any remorse to these boys," the prosecutor said.

Lenczycki's pattern of molestation continued until 1991, when Imesch recalled the priest from California and assigned him to serve as a hospital chaplain in the St. Louis area, authorities said. Ironically, Imesch's desire to keep Lenczycki away from the Joliet Diocese allowed prosecutors to pursue charges, since the statute of limitations is suspended when an offender lives out of state.

"It was clear the Joliet Diocese was aware of the defendant's perverted behavior and did not report it to civil authorities," Birkett said. The case prompted Birkett to pursue legislation — adopted in 2002 — that now makes clergy mandatory reporters, requiring them to notify state officials when sexual abuse of children is suspected.

But Imesch says he did notify state child-welfare authorities of the allegations against Lenczycki at the time they were first reported, Cullen said.

Jorgensen could have sentenced Lenczycki to probation, but chose to send him to prison. With time off for good behavior, Lenczycki could be released in 2 1/2 years. He will have to register as a sex offender for the rest of his



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life, Birkett said.

Barbara Blaine, founder and president of the Survivors Network of those Abused by Priests, echoed Birkett's comments and said Imesch is lacking moral leadership by challenging a change in state law that extends the statute of limitations for sex crimes against children. A ruling involving two civil lawsuits filed in Will County is expected in about two weeks.

"This same diocese is trying to overturn a law that protects children of Illinois. Who in the world should be trying to protect children other than the Catholic Church? No other entity is challenging the law," Blaine said.

Lenczycki, Imesch and the diocese are defendants in a civil lawsuit filed in December in DuPage County. The same parties were defendants in another civil suit filed in 1997 in Will County. That case was settled, and the diocese succeeded in convincing a judge to seal the records.

That protective order blinded DuPage authorities to the possibility of prosecuting Lenczycki five years earlier, Birkett said.

"We weren't aware of the 1997 lawsuit because the order of protection sealed the records," Birkett said.

Lenczycki is among 29 Joliet Diocese priests that DuPage authorities believe engaged in inappropriate conduct with minors, Birkett said. Many of the clerics have died, and none is actively serving as a priest, he said. Of the 29, only Lenczycki was living out of state long enough to suspend the statute of limitations, which in 1984 would have required minors to press charges against sex abusers by the time the victims reached age 21.

"Lenczycki is the only one (who could be prosecuted). As it turns out, he was one of the worst," Birkett said.

In response to the sexual abuse scandal that has rocked the Catholic Church, Illinois legislators in 2003 amended the Abused and Neglected Child Reporting Act to give people who were sexually abused as minors until age 38 to pursue criminal charges against their abusers.

I received the e-mail letter which you sent to the diocese regarding Fred Lenczycki. Despite what the papers may say, I can only tell you that I am terribly disturbed by what occurred more than 20 years ago. These are the facts of the case as I know them.

When this incident was first discovered, a meeting of all of the parents of children in school was called. The parish asked a lawyer, Mr. parishioner, to address the parents. The matter was brought to the attention of the States Attorney's Office and to DCFS. The following day, the principal gathered all of the children in the school and spoke to them about the inappropriate activity and asked for any of them who had been with Father Lenczycki to discuss this with their parents.

When I was informed of the incident, I immediately removed Father Lenczycki and sent him for an evaluation and subsequent treatment at a facility out of state. Illinois had no such facility available. After several months of counseling and therapy, the counselors who cared for Father Lenczycki felt that he could participate in supervised parish ministry. He did that for approximately five years. Two years ago allegations were made concerning inappropriate behavior while he was at that parish.

In August of 1991, Father Lenczycki sought employment as a chaplain at a Catholic Hospital in St. Louis where he served for ten years. During that time there were no allegations of inappropriate activity.

Almost 20 years after the incident in Hinsdale, the States Attorney filed suit against Father Lenczycki. I do not know why the States Attorney's office did not initiate action at the time of the incident, nor why any of the parents did not pursue the matter further.

This whole matter is a terrible tragedy. Looking back, I am sure that everyone involved, including myself, would say that things should have been handled differently. At the time, I thought I was doing the right thing by sending Father Lenczycki for therapy.

The judgment against Father Lenczycki is one with which I certainly concur. He has committed a crime and deserves whatever penalty was imposed. For my part, I can only offer an apology to the victims and to their families. At the time of the incident at St. Isaac Jogues, I was not aware of any previous inappropriate activity by Father Lenczycki, nor had I received any report of such inappropriate activity. If the incident occurred today, certainly it would have been handled differently. At the time, it was handled as was thought best, to provide counseling and therapy for the priest. The entire matter has had a terrible effect on so many people, the victims, their families and Church members, like yourself. I cannot undo the past, but I can only say that the diocese has taken a number of initiatives to see that such things do not occur in the future. The past cannot be undone, but I am committed to do whatever is necessary to prevent such things from ever happening again.

The following day, the principal gathered all of the children in the school and spoke to them about the inappropriate activity and asked for any of them who had been with Father Lenczycki to discuss this with their parents.

When I was informed of the incident, I immediately removed Father Lenczycki and sent him for an evaluation and subsequent treatment at a facility out of state. Illinois had no such facility available. After several months of counseling and therapy, the counselors who cared for Father Lenczycki felt that he could participate in supervised parish ministry. He did that for approximately five years. Two years ago allegations were made concerning inappropriate behavior while he was at that parish.

In August of 1991, Father Lenczycki sought employment as a chaplain at a Catholic Hospital in St. Louis where he served for ten years. During that time there were no allegations of inappropriate activity.

In 1995, the Catholic Priest, Father Rev Doc, 2 wrote to Bishop Imesch and informed him that the defendant 3 had sexually abused Doe in 1979 when the defendant was 4 assigned to St. Charles Borromeo High School. Doe was 5 14-years-old at the time. This abuse consisted of 6 fondling the victim's penis, during what the defendant 7 said was a research project. The "research" consisted of 8 a questionnaire, followed by naked massages. 9 Three victims from California, Doel C., Doel 10 , and Doe I , who were all teenage boys, 11 would testify to abuse by the defendant from 1986 to 1991. 12 In his correspondence to Bishop Imesch on February 13 (sic) 27, 1985, while at the House of Affirmation, the 14 defendant wrote and I quote, "I have already discovered 15 I'm not the lone ranger." He said that he had feelings of 16 quote, "guilt and humiliation". Bishop Imesch replied to 17 virtually all of the defendant's letters. The two would 18 meet when Imesch would travel to California. Imesch told 19 the defendant that he feared the defendant's return to 20 Illinois would create considerable quote, "tension and 21 apprehension." He said that in a letter, dated June (sic) 22 15, 1986, that the defendant, when I say he, I mean Bishop 23 Imesch, said in a letter dated July 15th, 1986, to the 24

- 1 defendant that you should stay away "at least three and
- 2 possibly four years."
- 3 When rumors began that there might be a civil case

Dear Fred,

Thanks for the letter you wrote me just before Christmas. I intended to write to you, but the holidays, as well as the holiday mail, prevented me from doing so. Then after you pleaded guilty I had to wait for an address for you. Deacon Chuck Peterson sent me your address.

Fred, first of all, I want to thank you for the sorrow and remorse you expressed in your December letter. I know the pain you have experienced over this whole situation. The newspapers were quick to point out that you did not express any remorse or regret at the time of your sentence. I know that your emotions would probably not allow you to say anything at that time and I also know the deep regret and remorse that you experience. Unfortunately, people who do not know you consider you as a hardened and unfeeling abuser. I know that is not the case.

As you probably know, the State's Attorney went after me pretty heavily, also. He accused me of moral failure in allowing you to be assigned to a parish in California where there are additional allegations by three young men. I was not aware of any of that until news of the allegations were reported several months ago. If they are true, I deeply regret that these things occurred after your therapy.

I do not know all of the details of the legal proceedings of the past several months. What is puzzling to me is that whatever information the State's Attorney had to convict you now, the State's Attorney also had in 1984 at the time of the situation. They were aware of what had taken place

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and DCFS was also informed. The parents of the young men could have filed suit at the time, had they wished. If the State's Attorney office felt that a crime had been committed, they should have taken action at the time. I guess I just do not understand all of the legal ramifications and maneuvers.

I prayed so much for you in the days following your sentencing. I cannot imagine how traumatic it must have been to be imprisoned and to endure all that - that means.

Deacon Chuck Peterson and both told me that they had seen you in Stateville. Hopefully their visit helped you. I do not know a great deal about East Moline, but I will find out something about it.

wrote me and asked for your address, so I presume you will be hearing from him. Sister Camille did also.

Fred, I do not know if you want a visit from me or if such a visit would be allowed. In any case, I probably would not come until summertime, but if it is possible and if you wish, I could certainly come.

I pray that you will find some peace and comfort after you get settled in. I know that the Lord is not limited by prison walls and I am sure he will be present to you.

You are in my prayers each day and I know that you remember me also. A lot of people are praying for you. I am sure you know that.

Dear Parishioners:

A very important issue confronts us today. In 1986 Father Fred Lenczycki came to St. Peter Church as associate pastor and he served the parish for five years. Recently, the Internet stated that Father Fred has confessed to numerous counts of improper sexual contact with eight boys over a two-year period (1982-1984) in Illinois – why was he allowed to serve here?

In 1985 Father Fred signed up for ten months of intense therapy at the House of Affirmation in Montara, Ca. I agreed to accept him in 1986 and he continued extensive therapy for several years. His bishop and our Archbishop and the House of Affirmation approved my decision.

The conditions were as follows: he was to reveal his past history and continue the therapy mentioned above. In 1986, his coming to St. Peter seemed like a good idea. The entire St. Peter Staff accepted him and he served here quite successfully. His candor, however, was seriously lacking. What he revealed to me was incomplete, and he seemed to be "a border line case" which could be helped through the counseling.

In any case, what seemed like a good idea in 1986 turned out to be a serious mistake because we put some of our young parishioners at risk. Since the Father Fred situation has become known through the Internet, two allegations from St. Peter Parish have been forwarded to the San Mateo County D.A. and the Archdiocese.

I apologize to all the parishioners for the danger, pain, anger, and disappointment, which my decision has caused. I am devastated by this tragic series of events. We have learned a great deal since 1986 and we know now that my decision was very ill-advised. I can only repeat my sadness and regret. To help us move beyond this crisis I am offering counseling to any parishioner who has been harmed. I will also forward any other allegation concerning Father Fred's behavior to the Archdiocese and the San Mateo D.A. Finally, there will be a public meeting in St. Peter Church <u>Thursday</u>, <u>August 29</u>, <u>2002</u> to air out more information and make plans for future healing.

Once again, I beg your forgiveness for not being more vigilant. I am seriously committed to the protection of our children and teenagers. Furthermore, I am confident that through prayer, understanding, and compassion, we will overcome this evil, which has come upon us, and we will emerge as a parish stronger than ever.

This document summarizes comments from the St. Peter Parish meeting which was held on August 29, 2002 regarding the past assignment and work of Father Lenczycki to St. Peter for a five year period 1986-1991. The background for this meeting is as follows:

Internet articles regarding Father Lenczycki's past involvement in child sexual abuse cases, (1984 -1986, Joliet, Illinois Diocese) began to circulate in the summer of 2002. Some St. Peter parishioners became aware of this in August. They were very concerned because he had been subsequently assigned to St. Peter Parish, Pacifica, from 1986-1991, after his time in Joliet. A committee met with Father Len Calegari on August 20, 2002 to discuss the seriousness of this matter and to make plans to present it to the parish Father Len sent a letter dated August 22, 2002 to all members of the parish and a parish meeting was scheduled for Thursday, August 29, 2002.

The meeting was attended by approximately 200 parishioners. It began with an Introduction by members of the committee, followed by an Opening Prayer by Father Len and then a statement and background information from Father Len about Father Lenczycki's assignment to St. Peter Parish. Father John Talesfore, Director of Liturgy and a representative of the Archdiocese of San Francisco then gave a presentation.

An Open Forum followed in which parishioners spoke with great emotion and concern about the circumstances of Father Lenczycki's employment at our parish, the problem of clergy sexual abuse, and the absolute need for reforms.

At the close of the meeting, the congregation was assured by Father Talesfore that their comments would be conveyed to the Archdiocese. A list of Archdiocesian resources to support the parish in this time of need was also provided to all in attendance at the meeting. Additionally, the committee will meet with Father Calegari on Wednesday. September 4, 2002 to discuss additional steps to take, including a meeting parishioners and the representatives of the Archdiocese on this matter. A Mass of Healing has been scheduled for Tuesday, Oct. 8, 2002.

The following comments are summary notes taken from the parish speakers at the August 29, 2002 Parish Meeting. Father Len and Father John responded to questions that were raised during the Open Forum.

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STATEMENT TO THE PARISHIONERS OF ST. PETER PARISH, PACIFICA, SUBSEQUENT TO THE REVELATIONS REGARDING FATHER FRED LENCZYCKI

As you meet this evening for prayer and healing and to address once again the revelations regarding Father Fred Lenczycki during his tenure at St. Peter Church, I wish to assure you of my respect, admiration and support. I recognize that you have reached out to your fellow parishioners as they seek to respond to reports of sexual abuse perpetrated by Father Lenczycki, especially assisting those who have been directly affected by his inexcusable behavior. Your honest and forthright approach has been helpful to the healing process that finds a certain conclusion tonight but which will continue into the future. I am sure that your pastor, Father Calegari, and the entire parish staff appreciates the time and concern you have invested in this process, as do I.

As Vicar General of the Archdiocese of San Francisco, I wish to extend to you and all the parishioners of St. Peter Parish my sincere apologies for the pain that you have been experiencing, either directly or indirectly, due to Father Fred's behavior here. The Archdiocese of San Francisco takes very seriously its commitment to serve the people of this local church in a manner fitting the Gospel of Jesus Christ. To that end, the administration of the Archdiocese seeks to assign to duty only those priests who have been carefully screened and trained for their sacred duties. While it was thought, given the wisdom of the time, that due diligence was observed in the assignment of Father Lenczycki at Saint Peter's in Pacifica in 1986, our current understanding of the pathology of child sexual abuse reveals that the problem is more intractable than once believed. As fellow Catholics, brothers and sisters in the Lord, I assure you that all of us in Archdiocesan administration journey with you in the healing process and seek, as you do, to provide for the safety of our children and young adults.

At the direction of Archbishop Levada, the Archdiocese has continued to establish strict and verifiable norms that seek to assure the protection of our youth in the Archdiocese of San Francisco. The policies already in place have been even further enhanced and tightened; all employees in the Archdiocese, including clergy, are thoroughly instructed in these policies; background checks, including fingerprinting, are mandatory for all clergy and for those lay employees and volunteers who have regular, supervisory contact with children; and the Archdiocese, in the implementation of the USCCB Charter adopted in Dallas, continues to add more proactive programs of education for those working with children and youth. I can assure you that every step is being taken to see that our parishes are safe and loving environments where people can gather, pray and worship without fear of being victimized in any way.

As deacons, priests and bishops, we are dedicated to the Gospel of Truth and Light. We seek to live the truth, speak the truth and embrace the truth. We desire to reflect the light of Christ in our world where the darkness of sin often obscures the beauty of the human heart. Nothing hurts us more than when one of our brothers fails in his sacred duty to serve Christ and His people with integrity and purity of heart.

And so, I assure you of the support and prayers of Archbishop Levada and all of us in the Archdiocese. I also seek your prayers as we cope with the fragility of the human spirit and the consequences to all of us, particularly the abused, when those dedicated to the truth that is Jesus Christ sin against His body, the Church. Together we are forging a transparent and courageous path in dealing with the sin of sexual abuse of minors and Archbishop Levada and I join you as fellow pilgrims on that path.

I realize that nothing I can say will erase the past, but I want to give you the opportunity to tell me personally how your life has been affected so that I might offer you some pastoral response. While I fully recognize that the pending litigation may preclude anything like that happening at this time, I want you to know that the door is always open for you.

I received your recent letter in response to the letter I sent you on behalf of the Diocesan Appeal. I want to respond to some of your concerns, but I also want you to know that I would be willing to meet with you and your husband to discuss any of these issues further. I also offer to meet with your son, if he wishes to do so.

You mentioned that "...you have known since 1984 that my son was one of the victims..." Until I received your letter I did not know that your son was one of the victims. In fact, I did not know the name of any of the youngsters involved until some names surfaced in a lawsuit. When the incident happened at the parish, I was informed that the parents were advised that a counselor, either a psychiatrist or psychologist, was available to talk to them or any of their sons. No names were ever presented to me. If your son feels he could benefit from counseling at this time, I certainly want to offer that opportunity.

In your letter you also said that I had assigned Father Lenczycki "... to SIJ even after he had abused a seminarian at St. Charles Borromeo Seminary." I had no knowledge of any such abuse having taken place before I assigned Father Lenczycki to St. Isaac Jogues, nor have I heard of any abuse by Father Lenczycki having taken place at St. Charles Borromeo. If I had known of any abuse having taken place, I would never have assigned him to St. Isaac Jogues or to any parish.

I do not know where you obtained your information regarding this situation, but it is not an accurate account of what happened. If I were

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aware of child abuse by a priest, I would never place children in jeopardy by assigning that priest to a parish. The first information I had about any abuse by Fred Lenczycki was the morning after the incident was reported at St. Isaac Jogues.

I, too, am terribly distressed and disturbed over the reports of sexual abuse by members of the clergy. I want to do whatever I can to ensure that such things do not happen again and that those who have been victims receive whatever help can be offered to them. I want to do that for your son now. He may not wish to meet with me, but, if he does, I would want very much to do that.

I sincerely apologize for the abuse your son suffered. Again, if you wish to speak with me about this matter, I would want very much to meet with you.

- 1) <u>Father Philip Dedera</u>. According to my records, he was ordained in 1972 and was placed on Administrative Leave in 2002. That means he had 30 years of service. His pension then should be reduced by 10 times 2.5% equaling 25%.
- 2) FATAR DOE: He was ordained in 1968 and placed on Administrative Leave in 2002. That means he had 34 years of contributions. His pension then should be reduced by 6 times 2.5% equaling 15%.
- 3) <u>Father Don O'Connor</u>. He was ordained in 1964 and placed on Administrative Leave in 2002. That means he had 38 years of contributions. His pension then should be reduced by 2 times 2.5% equaling 5%.
- 4) <u>Father Fred Lenczycki</u>. He was ordained in 1972 and left in 2002. That equals 30 years of contributions. (I am presuming that from the time he left in 1985 until 2002, he was making contributions for himself.) If that is true, then he has contributions for 30 years and, therefore, his pension should be reduced by 10 times 2.5% equaling 25%.

These priests will continue to receive a pension in the future, reduced by the percentage as above, though they will receive the annual increase that the other priests receive, reduced by the same percentage.

If you are in agreement with this, please let me know.
