Before imposing the sentence, Mackston asked Izzo to reaffirm the guilty plea, noting that in a pre-sentencing report that Izzo had denied that he was guilty. He complied, replying rapidly: "Yes, I reaffirm that plea."

"You have violated a sacred trust,

"You have violated a sacred trust, the care and well-being of young children placed in your care," Mackston said. "You have caused untold suffering and mental anguish to the children and their families. You have taken their innocence and permanently scarred their minds. Your conduct, as far as I'm concerned, was incredibly depraved and you'll be sentenced accordingly."

Later, Nassau Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan praised the four boys who testified in the trial.

"I think the jury believed those four young boys," she said. "As a result,

they saved the sixteen kindergarten children from having to testify about the brutal things he did to them."

But Riordan acknowledged that some of four boys' parents were upset that their children had to endure the trauma of a trial.

Nonetheless, she said, "I ensured that their children would never have to testify [against Izzo] again in a criminal proceeding."

The sentence was the second-largest to be imposed in the county in a child sex abuse case. Richard Taus, a former FBI agent, was sentenced to 30% to 92 years on Jan. 31.

"I'm very happy," said the father of a kindergarten victim. "I think my son's shirt says it all: You can't touch this."

The father of one of the Boy Scouts abused by Izzo said he was pleased. with the sentence. "Twenty years gives him a lot of time to think about what he did wrong," said the man, whose son was 11 at the time of the abuse.

DA Proceeding With Second Izzo Sex Case

In an effort to ensure maximum prison time for convicted child sex abuser Robert Izzo, the Nassau District Attorney's office said yesterday it will proceed with the prosecution of a second indictment charging the former school bus driver with abusing 16 kindergartners who rode his route.

"We're ready for trial," said Edward Grilli, a spokesman for District Attorney Denis Dillon. He said Dillon had no plans to drop the charges in the second indictment, which contains 143 counts of sexual abuse against Izzo, who already faces 167 years in prison following his conviction Wednesday.

In that trial, a jury convicted Izzo, 41, on 35 counts of sodomy, sexual abuse and endangering the welfare of a child for molesting three boys who were members of Izzo's Boy Scout troop, and a fourth boy whose family he befriended. The jury deliberated for six hours.

Izzo; a former Boy Scout leader, faces 55% to 167 years in prison if he is sentenced consecutively on each count. But the maximum time he can serve under state law is 25 to 50 years. Grilli said the district attorney would pursue the new case in order to ensure that Izzo serves the maximum jail time allowable. He said that additional convictions would also make the state parole board aware

that Izzo's transgressions went far beyond the abuse of four boys.

About 20 kindergartners' parents who were outside the courthouse after Wednesday's verdict said they were prepared for the ordeal of a second trial, even though it could mean putting their children on the stand.

"Those boys [the youths that testified] proved that Bob Izzo was a child abuser," said one father, who had cried and cheered when the verdict was announced. "The jury believed it, and now New York State believes it. We're ready to go."

A trial date on the second indictment is expected to be set on April 2, the day Izzo is scheduled for sentencing before County Court Judge Jack Mackston in Mineola.

Izzo's lawyer, Anthony Capetola, yesterday declined to comment on the guilty verdict. But he said that his firm would represent Izzo in the second case if it goes forward.

Asked if Izzo would plead guilty to the second indictment in exchange for a lesser sentence, Capetola said he didn't know, but that if the district attorney's office offered a plea bargain it's expected to require Izzo to waive his right to appeal the first conviction. "So we have to consider the options," he said.

Charles Brennan, a lawyer who represents the kindergarten pupils' parents in approximately 40 civil suits seeking more than \$100 million against the Hicksville school district and Harran Transport School Bus Company, said yesterday that the recent conviction would not affect the civil suits because it did not involve the kindergarten children. But he said it could have a "very strong practical effect" on settlement negotiations.

Ex-Wife Backs Izzo at Trial

In a surprise move by the defense, the ex-wife of-Robert Izzo took the stand at his trial yesterday and supported his denial that he sexually abused a former Boy Scout who slept over.

Michelle Muyse, who remarried last year after divorcing Izzo, said that Izzo, 41, of Hicksville, who was the youngster's scoutmaster, brought him home on Oct. 19, 1988, after an overnight camping trip was canceled. The boy slept on a living room sofa and Izzo slept with her in an upstairs bedroom, she said.

Muyse was the final defense witness. Her account followed that of Izzo's mother, Rose, who smiled warmly at the defendant and was quickly dismissed from the stand after admitting she had been in the courtroom for earlier testimony, and Izzo's cross-examination. Final arguments are expected today.

The boy, now 13, has testified that he was sodomized by Izzo during the night while other family members were asleep. During cross-examination by Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan, Muyse conceded that she left Izzo shortly after his arrest and said that it was for the "protection" of their two sons. Muyse did not look at Izzo during her testimony before Nassau County Court Judge Jack Mackston in Mineola, where Izzo's trial is in its third week.

Izzo is being tried in connection with a 35-countindictment alleging that he sexually abused three boys who were members of his Boy Scout troop and a fourth youngster whose family he befriended. He also has been charged in a second, 143-count indictment with sexually abusing 16 kindergarten children who rode on his school bus.

Once again, the courtroom was packed with parents of the kindergarten youngsters involved in the pending case, who leaned forward in their seats to hear Izzo's testimony on cross-examination.

The parents of the four boys involved in the present case have been barred from the courtroom at the request of defense lawyer Anthony Capetola, who said he might call the parents for further questioning. Before the proceedings yesterday, two of the boys' mothers were spotted in the audience and were asked to leave.

Izzo was cross-examined for an hour yesterday by Riordan, who showed him photographs of the school bus yard and other sites of the alleged molestations and established Izzo's presence at the times of the alleged abuse.

Grueling Testimony

Boy in sex-abuse case grilled on statements

A 14-year-old boy faced an exhausting 3½ hour cross-examination yesterday over statements he made to police and a Nassau County grand jury about Robert Izzo, who is standing trial on charges of sexually abusing young boys.

The youth, questioned by Nassau Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan, first testified that he was sodomized by Izzo in six incidents between 1986 and 1988. The incidents allegedly occurred in the Westbury camera shop where Izzo was employed in 1986, in Izzo's car outside a school bus garage in Hicksville, on a school bus Izzo formerly drove, and in the laundry room of the boy's home, among other places.

The boy, described by prosecutors as having a learning disability and coming from a troubled family, often admitted he was confused or didn't understand the questions as Izzo's attorney, Anthony Capetola, cross-examined him aggressively on the alleged incidents. Repeatedly, County Court Judge Jack Mackston asked Capetola to simplify the questions or rephrase them for the boy.

At one point, Capetola objected to Mackston's rephrasing of a question. Mackston replied, "We're dealing with a child here," and Capetola shot back, "I object to your comments in front of the jury" and called for the panel's withdrawal. Mackston rejected the request.

Izzo, 41, of 12 Loretta Lane, Hicksville, is be-

ing tried in Mineola on a 35-count indictment in connection with molesting three boys who were members of a Boy Scout troop he served as an adult leader and a fourth youngster — yesterday's witness — whose family he had befriended. He also has been charged in a second, 143-count indictment in connection with the sexual abuse of 16 kindergarten children who rode on his school bus.

During the cross-examination, Capetola hammered away at the boy's testimony, repeatedly going over the dates and locations of the alleged incidents in an effort to show that his testimony was directed by the prosecutor.

The boy appeared to become increasingly confused and tired as Capetola questioned him about the incidents repeatedly, blurting out at points, "I don't know," and "I don't remember." He also admitted being unable to read a statement he gave to detectives because he couldn't read the detective's handwriting.

The boy testified that Riordan "told me she was going to direct me to a certain month" and where the incident took place, "...so I'd have an idea. So I wouldn't get confused about the months."

Outside the courtroom, Capetola said, "He's been told he's going to testify about six things, and if you take those six things out of order or don't give him some key words that the prosecution has given him, then he doesn't remember the incident at all." The trial continues to-day.

Boy Describes Sex Abuse

A 13-year-old boy testified yesterday that embarrassment prompted him to lie to police the first time he was asked about Robert Izzo, a former Boy Scout leader and school bus driver who is standing trial on charges of sexually abusing young boys.

"I didn't tell them everything," the boy said of the first questioning by police.

The testimony came during more than an hour of gentle, but persistent cross-examination by defense lawyer Anthony Capetola, who picked away at discrepancies in statements the boy gave to police. Capetola repeatedly quizzed the youngster about when the slieged abuse occurred and about an account the boy first gave to detectives in which he denied being touched by Izzo.

"You lied to the detective at that point in time?" Capetola asked. "Yeah," the boy said.

Sobs From Boy's Mom at Izzo Trial

The mother of a boy who said he was sexually abused during an overnight Boy Scout trip in Oyster Bay by Robert Izzo— a former adult Scout leader charged with abusing four boys—sobbed openly as she testified about her son's behavior in the aftermath of the incident.

"He would be violent at times, not by hitting anything, but by banging on things," the woman said. Her son, who is now 12, also became obsessed with collecting knives, she said, "because he thought he had to protect himself."

The woman, who broke down during questioning by the prosecutor, Nassau Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan, declined a recess offered by County Court Judge Jack Mackston.

Fighting for composure as she sipped water from a paper cup, the woman said the family tried to reassure her son that they loved him no matter what had happened to him. "That's why this is so painful," she said.

Izzo, seated at the defense table a few feet away, leaned forward to listen to the testimony but did not react to the tears. His lawyer, Anthony Capetola, declined to cross examine the woman. She was one of six witnesses who testified yesterday morning at County Court in Mineola. The woman was preceded by her son, who testified that he was sexually abused by Izzo in October, 1988, during an overnight Scout trip at the Muttontown Preserve in Oyster Bay. The boy was 10 years old at

the time of the incident.

Izzo, of 12 Loretta Lane, Hicksville, who formerly was a school bus driver and an adult leader for a Boy Scout troop, is being tried on a 35-count indictment charging him with the sodomy and sexual abuse of four boys aged 10 to 12 in incidents that occurred between 1986 and 1988.

He also has been charged in a second, 143-count indictment in connection with the sexual abuse of 16 kindergarten children who rode on the school bus he drove,

During cross examination by Capetola, the 12-year-old, who was not abused, said he had been questioned by police about 20 times during a two-month period for about two hours at a time and that two other boys — who police say were abused by Izzo — told him they were similarly questioned. His testimony contradicted the court statements of the two other boys who have testified that they spoke to police only two or three times.

Izzo Testifies, Denies Charges of Sex Abuse

By Shirley E. Perlman STAFF WRITER

Taking the stand in his own defense, Robert Izzo, the former Boy Scout leader and school bus driver accused of sexually abusing four young boys, faced a courtroom packed with parents and categorically denied all the charges against him.

"Did you commit any of the acts that these boys accuse you of?" his lawyer, Anthony Capetola asked.

"No, I did not," Izzo, 41, said in a calm, clear voice.

The testimony from the sad-faced man dressed in a navy blue suit and striped tie was heard in a quiet courtroom, as prosecutors had warned parents of the boys involved against any outbursts. Cross-examination is set for Monday.

Izzo, of Hicksville, is accused of molesting three boys who were members of his Boy Scout troop and a fourth youngster, now 14, whose family he befriended, in several incidents between 1986 and 1988 that allegedly occurred at places including his home, a school bus, a car, and on overnight camping trips.

Yesterday, in 20 minutes of questioning, he disputed the testimony of the four boys, challenging the times and the dates of the alleged incidents. He also denied being alone with the youngsters or having physical contact with any of them.

"Did you see him at any other point?" Capetola asked.


Izzo, the 41-year-old Hicksville school bus driver and boy scout troop leader, has been charged with molesting children he was taking to and from school, as well as boys in his scout troop.

The first witness testified before a jury of nine men and five women—including two alternates—in the Mineola courtroom of Judge Jack Mackston that he was molested by 1zzo after a Boy Scout camping trip in 1988.

lzzo is being tried on two indictments charging that he sexually abused three Boy Scouts and another boy. A separate, 143-count indictment charges him with molesting 16kindergartenchildren who were passengers in buses he drove between 1986 and 1988, according to Nassau County Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riorgan, who is prosecuting 1zzo.

A spokesperson for D.A. Denis Dillon was unable to give a time frame of how long the trial would last.

During the testimony, the 13-year-old boy, who was 11 at the time of the incident, said that a camping trip to Sands Point was rained out, and that 1220, instead of taking him hone, drove him to 1220's tesidence.

In a flat voice—the youth usually confined his answers to "yeah" or "no"—the boy described how Izzo molested him in the living room of the house. The boy's request for

Izzo to "stop," was answered with a terse "shut up," the witness testified.

After the incident, the youngster said he punched Izzo in the face.

During cross-examination by Mineola defense attorney Anthony Capetola, the witness testified that he did not tell police of the incident when a detective first came to his home in 1988, but did tell the whole story in a second interview that took place in August of 1989.

When Capetola asked the boy why he waited almost 10 months before reporting the Incident, the witness answered that he was "embarrassed". Capetola asked the boy if he continued to attend scout meetings after the alleged incident, and the youth said yes, but that he "cut" some meetings until his 21-year-old sister noticed that he was not attending them.

Througout the morning's proceedings, Capetola questioned the witness on minute details, focusing on discrepancies in the two statements the boy gave detectives. On several occasions, the boy said he didn't understand Capetola's questions.

Also testifying on Feb. 13 were the boy's mother and a man who was also on the camping trip.

On Feb. 14, another boy testified that he was molested in three separate incidents by 1220.

Judge Mackston told the jurors that the case would continue on Feb. 19. No testimony was to be taken Feb. 15, due to other court business, and the courts were closed Feb. 18 for the Presidents' Day holiday.



A preliminary screening of 500 prospective jurors began yesterday in the case of Robert Izzo, a former school bus driver and scout leader scheduled to stand trial for the alleged sexual abuse of

20 young children.

By day's end, 303 of the 400 people summoned to the courtroom asked to be excused from duty after learning the nature of the case, the name of the defendant and the expected length of the trial three weeks.

"This is the largest number of jurors sent to a particular case since [Robert] Golub [who was convicted in April of murdering 13-year-old Kelly Tinyes]," Nassau Commissioner of Jurors Thomas DeVivo said yesterday. County Court Judge Jack Mackston is attempting to assemble a pool of about 110 people from which to select 12 jurors and two to four alternates, DeVivo said.

Screening continues today.

In an interview after the proceeding, Izzo's lawyer, Anthony Capetola, said he did not believe Izzo could get a fair trial in Nassau because of the publicity surrounding the case. "We'll see how it goes and possibly file for a change of venue," he said.

Izzo, wearing a navy suit and tie, showed up in court unshaven and with long hair, prompting Capetola to complain to the judge. Mackston denied a motion to excuse Izzo, saying he could clean up at the lunch break. "Apparently, the jail didn't allow him access to a razor," Capetola said later. "And this is the most important appearance of his life."

Izzo of 12 Loretta Lane, Hicksville, was first arrested in May, 1989, and charged with sexually abusing a 12-year-old boy in 1986 when the youngster was 10. Izzo was released on \$20,000 bail in that case, but was re-arrested two months later in connection with the alleged sexual abuse of a 5-year-old girl.

In July, a grand jury handed up a 20-count indictment in connection with the 12-year-old boy, and in September, Izzo was indicted a second time on 15 counts of abuse dealing with three boys who were members of his scout troop. A third indictment was handed up in October, 1990, in connection with the alleged sexual abuse of 16 kindergarten children.

Izzo, who is being held on \$750,000 bail. will be tried in connection with the first two indictments dealing with the four boys.

Molestation Trial Begins in Mineola

The actions of a former school bus driver and Boy Scout leader charged with molesting four young boys were portrayed by the prosecutor vesterday as a breach of trust on the part of an adult, while the defense attorney dismissed the allegations as the exaggerated claims of children with active imaginations.

In a 45-minute opening statement, Nassau Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan gave the sordid details of a 35-count indictment against Robert Izzo, 41, of 12 Loretta Lane, Hicksville. She said Izzo used his position as a school bus driver and Boy Scout leader to gain access to children who became victims of his sexual advances.

"This is a case about a breach of trust," Riordan said.

Izzo has been charged with sexually abusing 16 kindergarten children who rode on the school bus he drove, three boys who were members of a scout troop for which he served as an adult leader, and a boy whose family Izzo befriended.

He is being tried first before County Court Judge Jack Mackston in Mineola on a 35-count indictment dealing with the four boys. A second indictment, involving the kindergarten boys and girls, charges him with 143 counts including rape, sodomy, sexual abuse and endangering the welfare of a child.

lawyer, Anthony Capetola of Mineola, attempted to discredit the charges, saying the incidents involved "simple, innocent, non-sexual circumstances.

He said the prosecution would fail to prove its case. Asked during a recess whether the boys were lying, Capetola said: "I think they're expanding upon their imaginations.

During the prosecutor's opening statement, Izzo periodically took notes on a yellow legal pad. His parents sat behind him in a front row of the courtroom. The parents and friends of victims sat on the opposite side of the room.

Using explicit language that caused some jurors to shift uneasily in their seats, Riordan described how Izzo allegedly assaulted the four boys, then aged 10 to 12, in 10 different incidents between 1986 and 1988.

According to Riordan, the assaults occurred at Izzo's home, on the school bus and on overnight camping trips. In one incident, Riordan said, Izzo took a Scout to his house after rain canceled an overnight trip. She said the boy's parents would testify that they were not notified of the cancellation or that the boy would spend the night at Izzo's house.

"The proof will show that the child fought and that the child told him to stop and that the child was told to shut up, that it would only take a few seconds," she said.

Man Admits He Drove Bus During Assault on Child

In what is expected to be key evidence in the prosecution of Robert Izzo, a former school bus driver yesterday admitted he drove while Izzo sodomized a kindergarten boy on the school bus.

Anders L. Quintano, 32, of East Williston made the admission in Nassau County court in response to questions from Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan, who is prosecuting the Izzo case. Izzo has been charged with 178 counts of rape, sodomy, sexual abuse and endangering the welfare of a child.

Quintano pleaded guilty to criminal facilitation for driving the bus while Izzo sodomized the boy. He also pleaded guilty to first-degree sex abuse in an unrelated case in which he admitted fondling a 10-year-old girl, the daughter of a family friend, in March, 1987.

County Court Judge Marvin Goodman scheduled sentencing for Dec. 6 and promised Quintano that he would not receive more than 2½ to 7 years, the maximum penalty for first-degree sex abuse.

Quintano's lawyer, Eugene Cordaro, said in an intervivew yesterday that his client pleaded guilty to the top count because he "wanted to get it over with."

Izzo is being held on \$750,000 bail in connection with the alleged sexual abuse of 21 children, including 16 kindergartners. Quintano's name came up during the investigation of Izzo.

Jury Adds 15 Charges in Sex Offense Case

By Shirley E. Perlman

A Nassau grand jury yesterday handed down 15 more charges of sodomy and sexual abuse against a former Hicksville school bus driver and scout leader, and District Attorney Denis Dillon said later that an additional 20 complaints against Robert Izzo remain under investigation.

"If these complaints are corroborated, we could have more complaints in this case than in the Friedman case," Dillon said, referring to the Great Neck father and son convicted after being charged together with hundreds of counts of sexual abuse involving more than a dozen boys.

The new charges against Izzo, who fives in Hicksville, were contained in a 15-count indictment on alleged offenses with three boys

aged 11 and 12 who were members of Izzo's scout troop, bringing the number of alleged victims to five. A 20-count indictment against Izzo was handed up July 27.

The new indictment charges Izzo, 39, with sodomizing and sexually assaulting the three during overnight camp trips in Nassau County between September, 1987, and November, 1988.

Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan said the 20 cases still under investigation involve school bus riders and other members of the scout troop. She declined further comment on the investigation but praised parents for their cooperation.

As a result of pressure from parents, the Hicksville Board of Education is exploring the possibility of either break-

ing its contract with the Harran Transportation Co., which employed Izzo as a driver until his May 21 arrest, or in improving employee controls, a district spokeswoman said.

Jeff Weintraub, a Harran official, called the board's considerations "ludicrous...

"In essence, you're jeopardizing the livelihood of 50 other employees, some of whom have been with this company for 39 years," Weintraub said.

Izzo, of 12 Loretta Lane, is being held on \$450,000 bail at the Nassau County jail.

Arraignment on the new charges is scheduled for Monday before County Court Judge Marvin Goodman in Mineola.

Izzo's lawyer, Anthony Capetola, declined to comment on the new charges. He said that he had not seen the indictment

Bus Route Had Been Changed

A kindergarten bus driver charged with sexually abusing two children was transferred to a new route two years ago after he asked students at a Hicksville school for photographs of themselves, the school's principal said yesterday.

Harran Transportation Co. agreed to transfer driver Robert 1zzo of Hicksville after it received a complaint about his behavior toward students he was driving to St. Ignatius Perochial School, St. Ignatius Principal Jacqueline Burdi said.

But Harran Transportation never considered disciplining Izzo or taking him off school routes altogether because there were "no accusations of misconduct" in the St. Ignatius complaint, said Jest Weintraub, a company vice president.

Izzo, 39, of Loretta Lane, was charged Saturday with first-degree sexual abuse of a 5-year-old girl on his bus

route for kindergarten students at Willets Avenue Elementary School in Hicksville. He is being held without bail in Nassau County jail. His attorney, Frank Doddate, said Saturday that Ezo told him he is innocent.


Izzo was arrested May 21 on a charge of sexual abuse of a 10- or 11-year-old boy, who apparently was not on his bus route. Izzo was freed on \$20,000 bail for that charge. Nassau police said the alleged incidents occurred between September, 1988, and May.

Prosecutors are now investigating Izzo in connection with as many as 20 other alleged incidents, as well as his possible involvement in youth-oriented groups. Neighbors and acquaintances said yesterday that Izzo was a leader or volunteer with a Cub Scouts or Boy Scouts troop in the Hicksville area. Officials

of those organizations could not be reached yesterday.

Burdi said she did not remember how many students had said Izzo asked them for photographs or whether the school had mentioned the photo issue in its complaint to Harran Transportation.

"We thought there was something strange about it, so we asked the bus company to stop using him to transport our students," Burdi said. "We did it purely as a precautionary measure and we do not believe there were any incidents of any kind involving Mr. Izzo and our students.

Harran Transportation buses students to St. Ignatius and other private schools as part of its contract with the school district, Weintraub said.

Izzo was fingerprinted, tested for drug use and checked for criminal background when he first started working for Harran Transportation about three years ago, and "he came back clean on everything," Weintraub said. The company placed him on indefinite leave without pay after the first child-abuse charge.

Neighbors and acquaintances described Izzo as a good neighbor and family man who had a keen interest in photography. They said he had lived for several years with his parents, wife and two young sons on Loretta Lane, a quiet street of carefully manicured lawns and middle-income homes. No one was home at Izzo's house yesterday.

"The parents and kids just loved him as a bus driver," said one neighbor, who asked not to be identified. 'He seems like such a nice man.'

"We held block parties and he was always assisting in setting up. I can't believe this," said Frances Knights. another neighbor.

Izzo was well liked by most teachers and parents and was considered a "preferred bus driver . . . because he was so cooperative," said Hicksville School Superintendent Catherine J.

Investigators and neighbors said yesterday they did not know what he had done before the bus-driving job.
