Sexual Abuse in the Archdiocese of New York "Cardinal Dolan has not published a comprehensive list of all priests who have been credibly accused of abuse on the archdiocesan website, as other dioceses have done in a move toward transparency.

'I, for one, don't exactly see why we should, because the names are already out there,' he said Thursday, adding that the archdiocese has released all the names of abusive priests over the years one by one."

"[T]he religious institution, when it became aware of the abuse, rather than seeking to alleviate the trauma to the victim, increased it ...

[T]he evidence demonstrated that, upon receipt of a complaint, the religious institution, rather than disclose similar allegations against a particular abuser, routinely asserted to the victim that no other such claims ever had been made against the particular clergy member, even when such an assertion was untrue ...

The Grand Jury infers that this was an orchestrated effort to protect abusing clergy members from investigation, arrest and prosecution by civil authorities ...

Likewise, the Grand Jury infers that this effort also protected the religious institution from adverse publicity that might have affected its economic welfare.

Such a comprehensive strategy of self-protection by the religious institution leads the Grand Jury to conclude that permitting a religious institution to decide for itself how to handle complaints of this kind are [sic] ineffective, inappropriate and self-serving."

Purpose & Background

The Anderson List of Sexual Abuse in the Archdiocese of New York contains the names of clergy, religious employees, and volunteers associated with the Archdiocese of New York, who have been accused of sexual misconduct. While lawsuits were filed involving many of these alleged perpetrators, the vast majority of the claims against these individuals have been settled or have not been fully evaluated in a civil or criminal court. Accordingly, the allegations should be considered just allegations and should not be considered proven or substantiated in a court of law. All individuals should be considered innocent until proven guilty.

It is believed that the Archdiocese of New York has not made available to the public the full history, identities, knowledge, and context of those accused of sexual abuse within the Archdiocese. This list is an attempt to compile information already available from various public sources including the public media, bishopaccountability.org, court filings, press statements, claims filed through the Independent Reconciliation and Compensation Program in the Archdiocese, lists disclosed by dioceses and religious orders regarding allegations of sexual abuse of minors, and other sources that have attempted to chronicle this information for public use. This list is intended to raise awareness about the important issue of sexual abuse, provide the public with vital information, and provide awareness and healing to survivors.

History of the Archdiocese of New York

The Archdiocese was created on July 19, 1850, and is presently comprised of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Bronx, and Richmond of the City of New York, and the Counties of Dutchess, Orange, Putnam, Rockland, Sullivan, Ulster and Westchester in the State of New York. As of 2018, the Archdiocese of New York reports 292 parishes and a Catholic population of 2.7 million served by a total of 1,197 priests. The Archdiocese's body of priests is comprised of 628 members of religious orders, 569 diocesan priests, 128 of which are extern priests from other dioceses. The Archdiocese of New York also reports that there are 320,725 minor children under its care at 210 schools staffed by 39 priests, 26 brothers, 104 sisters and 5,884 lay teachers, and catechists.

Abuse in the Archdiocese of New York

Historically, the Archdiocese of New York, like many other dioceses and archdioceses, knew of perpetrators that posed a significant danger to children. The sexual abuse of children has long been a crime in New York. However, Church Officials chose and continue to keep these crimes hidden, allowing perpetrators continued and unfettered access to children. Over the course of several decades, occasional bits of information about sexual abuse within the Archdiocese of New York has surfaced, but the Catholic Church's strict policy of secrecy kept most of the information and the full extent of the problem hidden from the public. This has continued despite mandated reporting laws.

New York Legislation Seeks Accountability – The Child Victims Act

On February 14, 2019, Governor Andrew M. Cuomo signed the Child Victims Act into law which, among other things, extends the criminal statute of limitations and provides that survivors of child sexual abuse have until age 55 to commence a civil action for the crimes perpetrated against them. The Child Victims Act also opens a one-year retrospective window for survivors of child sexual abuse to seek their day in court through a civil action, which may be pursued without publically revealing the identity of the survivor.

"We are here today because survivors who endured unimaginable pain came forward with great courage and sacrificed their own privacy to make change for others ... This bill brings justice to people who were abused, and rights the wrongs that went unacknowledged and unpunished for too long. By signing this bill, we are saying nobody is above the law, that the cloak of authority is not impenetrable, and that if you violate the law, we will find out and you will be punished and justice will be done."
