




MR. THOMAS S. STITTS, a student in the first year of Theology in this seminary, will need a dispensation before he is eligible to receive First Tonsure. The dispensation needed is that cited in Canon 987, # 1, because Mr. Stitts's father is a non-Catholic. He is nominally an Episcopalian but does not attend that church. When Thomas is at home, his father accompanies him to Mass. The elder Mr. Stitts is also a Mason but he is not active in this group. He has never shown any opposition whatsoever to Thomas's preparation for the priesthood. On the contrary he seems altogether favorable to it. Hence there is no danger to Thomas's faith in so far as anyone may see.

There is one more point to be mentioned. The Stitts home is in Belmont, Massachusetts and it has been there since 1946. Thus Thomas belongs to the Archdiocese of Boston. He received Testimonial Letters in 1956 but ought to have Dimissorial Letters from Boston before receiving Tonsure here. His reason for wishing to belong here is that St. Paul was the home diocese of his mother.

Dear Archbishop Byrne:

Thank you for your assignment to Blessed Sacrament Church in St. Paul. I am sure I shall enjoy working with Monsignor Francis Curtin. This assignment emitted far healthier feelings than previously when my first indication of a new post was a letter directing me to an unknown parish and a pastor I had not even met. I am grateful for the opportunity to have visited with my new pastor and to have been brought into the decision before I received an official letter of assignment. To know that he wants me to come as well as my acceptance of the post is very reassuring. Undoubtedly a further development of this process is needed. So many of the problems of our society seem to be in the area of "due process" and communication.

I have enjoyed by apostolate in Hastings and found it meaningful. Shortly after I began work here I outlined five areas of special need in Guardian Angels: the liturgy, the youth religion programs, the priest's role in the school, adult education and the personal relationship of the people to their priest. I have worked very hard at these goals and am relatively satisfied with their development during the past four years. I have visited the great majority of the 3500 people in Guardian Angels and had I remained here longer would have emphasized especially this personal apostolate to further cement a deeper Christian community. Two other apostolates developed during my time here. I am particularly pleased with the ecumenical relations which have grown locally and I personally have grown through the development of an exceptional ministerial association. This past year I have served as the only Catholic Chaplain to the Hastings State Hospital. I am confident that Father Ross Bigot will develop this apostolate more fully.

These are very critical times for the Church and I am sure most priests would agree that they are especially critical for our diocese. In the past I have

spoken to you of my personal concerns and aspirations and for the diocese. I trust you understand my thoughts. I was interested in the last part of the first paragraph of the assignment letter. I would welcome the opportunity to discuss any of the above points further with you at some future date.

Hastings is a unique community and has had difficulties church-wise in the past years. After being involved for several years I feel that I understand its complexities. I have expressed my concerns in this regard to Father William Kenney and Monsignor Ambrose Hayden. In a hope to alleviate some of the present anxieties of the parish, I have spoken at all seven Masses last Sunday, have made several personal calls, and have written over sixty personal letters to key people in the parish with whom I have worked. The anxieties of many people are very high at this time. I shall continue to pray they will subside peacefully.

Thank you again for the assignment to work with Monsignor Curtin and thank you for the opportunity to be a part of a community such as Hastings.


Tom sees the power in St. Leo's Parish held by the upper-middle class. They learned long ago that the Church is the people, therefore, they can run it. For many the Church is the Catholic school. They see themselves as a group of professional people; they feel that they can run the parish like a city council. The priest is the professional servant of the people (like a lawyer). Tom sees the pastoral demands as impossible; the expentations of the priest from the parishioners are "impossible". Tom sees the parish steeped deeply in Catholic cultural influences (not necessarily Christian). At the same time the parishioners are very supportive (sermons); they do give positive feedback and considerable amount of negative flak! Kinds of demands: kids in school and priests, pre-school, adult education, debt reduction, CCD, social action, day-care center. St. Leo's has good liturgy. There are in the parish many self-interest groups. The last eight priests who were assigned to St. Leo's Parish: only two remain in parochial ministry - John Clay and Mike McDonough; the rest have left the ministry. Tom recommends that no change takes place at St. Leo's: till next August. What kind of priest could serve well at St. Leo's? Someone like Jack Roach or the other end of the spectrum - John O'Neill.

## RECOMMENDATION:

If Tom Stitts takes the job with the Personnel Board, I recommend that the Personnel Board begin to search out candidates to become pastor at St. Leo's Parish. Tom states that Msgr. Bernard Murray will retire June 1; he has already met with the Archbishop.

ginning to be utilized.



We spoke last month about our mission appeal collection and the policy of the Archdicesse in this regard. I wish to thank you for your words and kind letter of September 5. In no way do I have anything but praise for your work with the missions and your handling of the office of the Propagation of the Faith. As a priest of the Archdicesse I am very grateful to you for your work in the Presbytery and for the Church in this area.

The situation that I referred to has happened twice, and I fed it is a prompting to review the policy in this regard more than a correcting of an individual parish concern. My questions and concerns are two-fold. First, that the emphasis of the mission collections should in some way reflect the quantity and quality of work that a missionary order does and not simply that they have a house in some mission country. And, secondly, that the specific missionary coming into the diocese be cognisant of the missions themselves as well as able to capture the spirit of the liturgy of the parish where he is asked to celebrate. I would hepe that the following of the rubrics, or even more obvious, the ability to speak English would be self evident. My conversation was meant to express a deeper concern involved in delebrating the liturgy, as I am sure you are well aware from your own pastoral experience.

I am not intending to criticise the men personally who visited our parish. I am concerned in a pastoral way for the people of my parish and of the Archdiocese.

we were informed last week of an anonymous letter written to you, which included some facts and information regarding the molestation of our back in 1973, by Rev. Tom Stitts, then administrator of St. Leos rarish. With the advice of a psychologist and a Catholic Social worker we did discuss the incidents with Rev. Stitts, at the time, and have documentation of that visit, which we shared with Archbishop Byrne.

We wish to assure you that we did not give permission for our names, nor that of Father Charles Froehle, to be used in AN ANNOYMOUS LETTER, nor did he...he didn't know of the letter...he does now, because I phoned him to apologize, and to tell him we gave no such permission.

However, since the letter has been written, let us say that we do share the serious concern of the writer that other boys not continue to be victimized in this manner. Our son, is now eighteen and there is no doubt in our minds that his confusion over his own sexuality may have root in this early experience with sex at the hands of such an important authority figure.

We hope that you will give this serious matter your personal consideration.

## Conscience said guide for homosexuals

The conscience may be the guide for gays and lesbians deciding on their lifestyles because there is confusion in the church about the morality of homosexuality, Dominican Father Herbert Hayek said at St. Albert the Great parish in Minneapolis March 6.

Uncertainty about scriptural prohibition of homosexual activity, the church's recent recognition of homosexuality as a natural orientation and a difference of opinion about it among theologians and others has left room for personal conscience, Father Hayek said during the first part of a three-part lecture series at St. Albert on the pastoral approach to homosexuality.

Citing a statement from the Australian bishops made in the 1970s on the papal encyclical "Humanae Vitae," he said individuals must realize that they may be objectively wrong and must stay up-to-date with developments in church moral teaching, but they cannot go against their consciences.

"This may sound like total situation ethics, but it's traditional Roman (Catholic) theology," he said of the role of the conscience in moral choice:

Choosing active homosexuality then may be subjectively right for individuals who are following their consciences while it might be objectively wrong, he said. Judgment can be made only if the state of the conscience is known.

Father Hayek, chaplain of Dignity, a group for Catholic homosexuals, told about 25 people at St. Albert the Great that biblical references to homosexual activity are not as clear as many fundamentalists believe.

Words used in Paul's letters have been translated with several meanings and cast some doubt on his condemnation of homosexuality, he said.

In one instance, the word translated to

mean homosexual also can be translated to mean promiscuous, Father Hayek said. In another case Paul refers to male prostitutes, probably those involved in temple prostitution associated with some religions of the time, and the condemnation is more concerned with false worship than with the sexual act, he said.

Paul's letter to the Romans condemns homosexual intercourse as being against nature (Rom. 1:26-28), he said, but that must be viewed in light of recent understanding of homosexuality as a natural orientation.

There is confusion, too, about passages concerning the Old Testament cities of Sodom and Gomorrah, he said. It is more likely that the cities were destroyed because people there had a "bitter hatred" for strangers.

"The sin we keep hearing in the Old and New Testaments (about Sodom and Gomorrah) is not sexual but inhospitality to guests, strangers," he said.

Today's church teachings as outlined in the "Declaration on Sexual Ethics" hold that homosexual orientation is morally neutral but that homosexual activity is wrong. Father Hayek said that the church's view of homosexuality may change as sexuality is recognized as more than simply a procreative act.

"The whole history of moral theology has been a shift and process," he said, citing the church's past acceptance of slavery and condemnation of charging interest for loans.

Church teachings grow out of the experience of communities and their individual members, he said. "Finally at some point the bishops or some authority will intervene to establish where we should be."

"People may come to this position:
'This is who I am. It may not be addressed by our present moral teaching,' " he said later.

He said that only recently the church has accepted homosexuality as a natural orientation, and added that it takes time for the church to develop teachings in light of new data.


The view that everyone is heterosexual and some choose to be homosexual still causes confusion, Father Hayek said. "The popular misconception that I hear in fundamentalist circles is that it is something you choose; this is your choice. That is ridiculous, Why would anyone choose something that carries a social stigma?"

For the second part of the series on pastoral approach to homosexuality, March 13, a gay man, a lesbian woman and the parents of a homosexual talked with participants. Sunday, March 20, at 7:15 p.m., Father Hayek will address concerns raised by people attending the series. The Bulletin will not cover that part.

Dear Parishioner,

This year I celebrated my twenty-first anniversary as a priest and shortly will be leaving for three months or so on my sabbatical. Before leaving I want to take a few moments to share some thoughts and update you on the happenings at St. John's.

Shortly after I arrived at St. John's and after conversation with the priests, listening to the sisters and parish advisory board and to a number of neighborhood groups, three or four goals seemed to form. The first was in regard to liturgy; the second, to develop staff; and third, to increase participation of the parish in its directions and its programs.

Regarding the liturgy: during the first two years I spent a great deal of time working with each of the liturgical assistant groups. In my preaching and ministering to the people - I hoped to emphasize the importance of liturgy. Vatican II stressed the Eucharist as the "summit and source" of our Christian life. Sunday Mass is clearly the most important thing we do during the week and is the culmination of all that we believe as Christians. Too often in the past Catholics, myself included, have seen the Sunday Mass as a kind of private devotion, a sort of quiet time with the Lord. Vatican II challenged that theology and called us to be a Eucharistic community celebrating the resurrection both as individuals and as members of the family of Jesus Christ. I am exceedingly thankful and pleased with the many people who have understood this and have helped this become considerably more evident in our parish. The spirit and cooperation of the ushers, the Eucharistic ministers, lectors, commentators, musicians, servers, sacristans, liturgical planners and all others have been a real source of inspiration. All of this helps us to pray better and to understand our Christian belief in a better way. The sense of prayer and attention given by the community is a great source of strength to a celebrant at the Mass. I wish to thank all for their leadership and participation.

The second goal has been to build a staff, administration and other support ministries which serve the people of our parish. The institution of new ministries in the area of youth, social ministry, social justice and the continued development of religious education for the school children, for young people and for adults is a great tribute to our parish. The professionalism, the true leadership and service that

the staff has given the community should be a source of pride for all of us. They deserve our thanks and our support, and most particularly our prayers. I am personally grateful to each member of our staff and for the excellent contribution they have made to our community. I am proud of our school and the people of St. John's who have enabled it to develop in such a beautiful way.

The third goal involved the development of lay responsibility and participation in our Church community. We have been told by the Fathers of Vatican II that we are the Church and indeed we form a community of people. This means some sense of sharing leadership and the development of the ministry that God has called us to. Although often misunderstood and a devisive thing in many churches and especially among our non-Catholic brethren, it however is an important element in church life. I am pleased to see the people who have become involved at St. John's - from the parish festival to finance committee, from liturgical and social justice areas, from building and grounds to school and education advisory committees. It is my belief that the best interests of the parish are served by use of a strong committee system. I would hope that this would continue to develop in the future.

Shortly before my arrival at St. John's, Father Dick Berg put together a constitution for a parish council. As I wrote to the parish last September I was hoping to see the parish council expand and develop in its representation and service to the parish community. Recently our constitution was submitted to Bob Burke of the Archdiocesan Office of Pastoral Planning who made a number of recommendations. After consultation with him, recognizing a new code of Canon Law coming into effect this fall, consulting with each of the members of the parish council and the trustees and most particularly with Fr. Kevin Clinton and Fr. Bill Murtaugh as well as the parish staff and given the fact that I will be gone during the scheduled elections this spring, plus the fact that we again face a major turnover in the council because of a couple of members moving out of the parish and two resignations for personal reasons, I hereby temporarily suspend the election this spring of the parish council. I am asking the present members of the council to join with others who would be interested in working with me to help put together a slightly different and more broadly based consultative body in the parish. There is a definite need to have a council or board. Their functions include representing the varied elements of our parish community, helping set the directions and priorities of the parish, working with the pastor, lay and religious staff, professional and volunteer people who serve the parish. Also they are to help prepare and approve the budget, to help foster a sense of community in the parish, to represent the community and to dialogue with the pastor and others involved. A parish is run and managed by the full time staff and the pastor; a lay board sets the direction for the staff and the parish and reviews the programs developed by the staff.

The three years I have worked with the council, it has served well and done a number of very good things. It was a good beginning at St. John's of what the Church was calling us to do. My special thanks to John Carlson, Matt Grundtner and particularly Bev Aplikowski for their dedication and work and chairing our parish council. I cannot thank them enough and again all those who served on the parish council at St. John's. I will be asking for volunteers next August to work closely with Bob Burke of the Archdiocese who has agreed to help with us to help to put together a truly wide-based, representative and consultative body for the important work of listening to the Holy Spirit and helping to guide our parish community.

As I announced last summer, I will be leaving for my sabbatical according to the Archdiocesan Sabbatical Plan around the middle of April. I will be attending a thirty day Ignation retreat in Los Angeles and then be involved in taking theology and spirituality at the University of San Francisco. I will be returning to the parish in early August. Although I am looking forward to the opportunity and feel the need for a good rest and chance to to rethink, refresh and renew, I will miss being at St. John's and in a parish setting. I have worked hard these three years. It has been a great transition and a different role for me. In some ways I feel I should not be gone that long from the parish. I believe, however in many ways the parish is in a good place for me to take such a sabbatical. Programs and staff are generally stabilized. Although May will be wrapping up a number of school and social programs, no new programs are planned at this point and summer would be a good time for this kind of extensive absence.

Father Bill Murtaugh will be administrator of the parish while I am gone. News from home is always welcome when one is away. My address and phone may be obtained from the parish office and personal mail will be forwarded.

Remember the elements of courtesy and Christian community we have talked about in the past, of praying for the community and those who serve it, of being on time for our liturgies and staying through the end, of avoiding the unnecessary distractions during our liturgy, to continue the generous support especially during the summer and all through the year but most especially to continue to pray and fast for our parish. We are a Christian community because of our faith and commitment to Jesus Christ and his bonding of us to each other. This is why we are and why we do what we do. Again please remember me in your prayer especially during these important months.

May the fullness of the joy of Easter and the hope that Christ brings be shared by us all.

## A CHRONOLOGICAL PRESENTATION OF SOME EVENTS THAT LED TO MY LEAVING ST. JOHN THE BAPTIST PARISH OF NEW BRIGHTON by Fr. Kevin Clinton

June 6, 1983

### PREFACE

In January, 1983 I contacted a chancery official to seek advice in what I considered to be a very serious situation developing at St. John's. Since that time three chancery officials have asked that I keep them informed. I have chosen the following formate to do so.

- June, 1982-Fr. Bill Murtaugh (WM) came to St. John's from New York City and the Blessed Sacrament Fathers. I had little knowledge of WM because I met him only once in an interview. I was aware that he had difficulty with his religious order and that he recently recoved from hepatitis.
- June-December, 1982--WM really never plugged into the parish. He seemed deeply depressed and cynical. Often he slept in and was late for morning meetings. On at least five occasions he slept thru his alarm and I answered the doorbell with parishoners on the threshold waiting for the priest to come over for the 7:00 AM Mass.

Also during this time WM and Fr. Tom Stitts (TS) were passively fighting with one another. TS was sending WM nasty notes. WM would strike back with sarcastic humor. TS tried to involve me in the stuff. I stayed out of it as much as I could.

August-September, 1982—I was looking for someone to led the contemporary music group. My first led was that of a married woman with husband and children who later, in doing character references was found to be having a lesbian affair. I did not pursue her being hired.

The next led came from WM in August, 1982. "Greg Satorie has just taken a leave from SJV," Bill said, "and he has considerable talent in doing contemporary liturgical music." WM said he would have Greg contact me the next time he saw him. Greg called and we set up an interview for August 27, 1982. In the interview Greg gave me references from SJV to speak to. It was from an SJV staff member that I heard the rumor that Greg moved into a gay household in south Minneapolis.

I spoke with WM telling him that I heard from "a source" that Greg Satorie was living in a gay house. I was careful with what I said because I strongly suspected WM's own connections at this time with the gay community. When I asked WM if he knew anything about this, he fell strangely silent. I said that I didn't want someone who was going thru a possible sexual identity crisis and presently exploring the gay world, to be hired for this music position.

I also spoke to TS in regard to Greg Satorie. He reacted strangely, too, saying that maybe Greg could be used in some other lesser position but the risks were too high to have him as leader of the music group. TS laughed when I told him Greg was possibly living in a gay house.

In speaking with Greg over the phone and turning him down for the job, Greg mentioned his friendship with WM and that if things changed I could contact him thru his friend, WM.

The next time I saw Greg was in WM's upstairs rectory sitting room. Later that evening he was present for a songleader workshop that TS was leading. I never saw him again. How and why he was invited I still don't know.

- Fall, 1982--For his retreat, WM chose to go to San Francisco. I offered to take him to the airport, but WM said he had arranged a ride. I answered the door. WM was taken to the airport by a young man wearing an ear-ring who I had never seen before. There were other such "friends" who would stop by also.
- Summer and Fall, 1982—WM had a number of phone calls from New York and had on two or three occasions, young male friends fly to Minnesota to visit him. Occasionally they stopped by the rectory to see him. He was different with them than he was with others in the parish. He was more friendly, and relaxed. I know little for sure about these people acept their names and maybe their line of work. WM introduced them as his friends.

What surprized me was how quickly WM had a circle of friends here in the Twin Cities. He had been out-state for years prior to June but now was going out to dinner with these guys in downtown Minneapolis. I was aware that he knew Adam Brunnell and Fr. Dick Dorr from the St. Paul Seminary.

- November, 1982—Without TS and my knowing it, WM was offered a job back in New York working in hospital administration. I did not know this until December 31.

  WM was given, by this prospective employer, until the end of December to decide whether he was going to take the job or not in New York. He chose not to tell us, he said, until just before he left because he didn't want to be without a job and salary for two months. He needed the money. He was seeing Ken Pierre. I sensed that the relationship between TS and WM was going to blow soon during this time.
- December, 1982—TS and WM began to meet. TS indicated that he was having a major breakthrough with WM. WM had told him that his problems were not with the parish or with the pastor. Rather, the problems were with celibacy and lone-liness

As the meetings continued TS told me that WM was deciding whether or not to stay in priestly ministry. TS told me on two or three occasions that he told WM he "should be a priest." Then TS editorialized: "Bill is so Irish. He has all these moral ideals, and he can't mesh his human weakness with it."

Later in the month TS told me what he thought the issues with WM were:

1) WM wasn't present to the parish; 2) WM didn't share personally with the priests. TS added: "The lifestyle question is not an issue." I was silent. TS and I have never talked about the "lifestyle question" since, nor had we ever talked about anything like it before that.

- December 30, 1982—TS called me on my day off and told me that WM had something to tell me. I presumed WM had decided to leave ministry.
- January 1, 1983—"Ira", an intermist from New york City, came and stayed at the Hilton Hotel. He was introduced to me by WM as one of his close friends. WM visited Ira as much as he could and provided him transportation.

It was between Masses on January 1 that WM took ten minutes and told me he was leaving ministry. He said he was unhappy for 15 years and now finally made a decision. He could take only ten minutes with me because he had to pick up Ira at the hotel before the next Mass.

I said to WM that I was expecting this and I asked him if there was anything I could do to help him in this transition. He said he may ask my advice on how to tell his mother since I knew somethings about co-dependency. In the next few days WM, accompanied by TS, would go to Hastings to deal with the Murtaugh family.

January 7, 1983—Morning—"Dennis" one of the frequent phone callers of WM and a friend, spent all day with WM. In the morning I came into the kitchen to get my breakfast. WM was in his bathrobe and Dennis had apparently just come. While I read the paper in the kitchen I could not but help hearing their conversation.

Dennis said he had just been to the doctor to get an infected prostrate treated. Dennis tooked like he was in his early 20's. WM and Dennis were commenting on how understanding the letters to the editor were in the paper regarding the Congregational minister who committed suicide following his arrest for feeling up a plain clothes policeman in an X-rated movie booth. Dennis response was to say maybe society was beginning to come around.

- January 7, 1983—Evening—TS told me that WM talked with him the night before for two hours. WM came to see TS and had resigned to take the New York job. TS said:

  "It seemed appropriate for me to say, 'Bill, why don't you take a month's leave of absence during which you can decide whether or not to return to St. John's.'"

  When TS informed me of the deal he arranged with WM I asked TS if the deal was WM's idea or his. TS said it was his. I told him that I disagreed with it.

  TS said, "There's only a 10-30% chance he will actually return. I did the month's
- January 8, 1983—Morning—After consulting with my administrative counselor I said to TS: "The arrangement you made with WM is unacceptable. I ask that we go on open listings immediately." TS silently stormed out of the room without saying a word. He returned a few minutes later and said: "If that's what you think, then you tell WM." I said, "If WM wants to speak to me he's free to do so." TS never told him until WM was in New York a few days and planning to come back.

leave because WM was so undecided."

- January 8 and 9, 1983—WM does not take any of the Masses at St. John's this wknd.
  On the evening of January 9 he gets on a plane and flies off to New York City.
  All of WM's rectory belongings were packed in big boxes. His room was barren and stripped. The boxes were put in a rectory guest room and addressed to an apartment in New York City. A trucking company was called to pick them up the coming week. The parish secretary was instructed to pack everything in WM's office in a box and include it in the shipment. All of WM's weddings were given to me along with his share of the Guthrie and Minnesota Orchestra tickets. WM did not inform the staff he was leaving. However, he did tell one staff member and maybe a couple parishoners that he was leaving ministry and that it had to do with celibacy, loneliness, and intimacy.
- January 10, 1983—Evening—According to what TS said to me WM called from New York and said he was very unsure of his decision and he needed five days in New York to re-think things. He may come back.
- January 13, 1983—Morning—After discussing these developments with my administrative advisor I had a meeting with TS in which I told him the following which is the text of the notes I used in our discussion:

"Events this fall make the environment of St. John's staff and priests into an emotional "West Bierut." I will not allow myself to watch and be drawn into further dynamics like those of the last seven months. The facts are clear: WM knew in November about the New York job offer. a)Before November he was struggling with whether or not to stay here at St. John's. 3)After Christmas before January 1 Bill firmly said he would resign to TS. 4)On January 1 he told me he was leaving soon. 5)Between January 1 and 5 WM showed some vasilation according to TS. TS was saying, "You should be a priest." 6)On January 7 he resigned. But TS suggested he not break it off immediately but take a months leave. 7)On January 9 he emptied his room. The bridges were burned behind him—so I thought.

"Therefore it was not in the service of Bill nor the parish nor my own wellbeing for the indecision to be dragged on. I was grateful it was over--but it is apparently not." (Notes continue on the following page.) "Therefore, what I need is the following: Decisions into Bill's status must take me into account because I am one of the three priests in this house. My life is profoundly affected by who I live with.

"In light of Bill's ambiguity and trouble I am willing to change my January 8 statement to the following: 1)Bill may return to St. John's with my acceptance if: a)his official status here is understood as that of a 'troubled priest' and not a regularly assigned associate pastor; b) That immediately we open up the position to open listings and other means of acquiring a third priest and maybe a fourth. c) That Bill agree to be transferred as soon as his replacement is found and that the transfer happen no later than June.

"Note also: Because of TS's sabbadical we have only  $2\frac{1}{2}$  months for searching for a replacement. Bill's instability is alarming, I do not expect a change and a counselor-sounselee relationship between a pastor and an associate is crazy." (End of notes used on January 13.)

TS's response was that he always had trouble saying "no" and that other priests, like Pat Griffin took a month's leave and returned. I said this was different. TS said it was not and we were in a dead-lock. The conversation ended.

January 15 and 16, 1983—The Chancery provided extra weekend help for St. John's and sometime that weekend WM called TS and told him that he was coming back.

January 16-20, 1983--TS was "keeping me posted on developments." He wrote me a note saying that WM seemed to really have changed but that WM was "concerned about my reaction to the situation." TS said that I must at least hear out WM when he returns. TS said he would arrange a meeting when WM returned. I agreed to it unenthusiastically.

January 24, 1983—I met WM in a Chinese restaurant outside of Savage. This was the first time I had seen WM since he returned. He was very tense and I told him I was there to only listen and that a decision from me on what I would do would be given on Friday, January 28. WM said he did not want to give me that much power over him. I told him I did not desire power over him but I did need to make decisions for my own well-being.

He said he had a dramatic conversion while in New York. His problems stemmed from loneliness and needing to have a close intimate relationship with someone. He said he had been in trouble before with his religious order because of a relationship he had with a guy. He quickly added that it was not genital. Not once in the whole conversation did he mention he was gay but the whole discussion presumed it. For example, he said at one point in tears: "How would you like to have a problem like mine. What would you do if it was you?"

He seemed terrified of me and cried on a couple occasions. As I suspected weeks before I was set up to be an SOB if it took care of myself. The meeting lasted  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hours.

January 26, 1983—Wednesday—I had a candid meeting with Bob Carlson. I consulted him for advice. I did not know how to respond to this situation. He asked for and a presented him with three pages of facts as I collected them concerning evidence of homosexuality here at St. John's He said that the Archbishop would be very alarmed and would probably review WM's status in the Archdiocese. Bob asked me to back off my demands in regard to WM's status at the coming Friday meeting in leiu of the Chancery acting a few weeks later. I accidently met WM in the Chancery lobby. WM was waiting to see Mike Korf.

- January 28, 1983--Friday--At 11;60 AM-TS, WM and I met in my office. I informed WM that I was withdrawing what I thought I needed here at St. John's. TS slapped his knee and said "Welcome back Bill!" TS added that the only two issues were: WM was not present enough to the parish and he did not share enough with the staff. It was then that I began threading water until March 14 when I decided to ask for a transfer.
- February 6, 1983--Sunday-On the way back from a high school Michigan ski trip
  Pat McHugo shared with me some of his anger and contempt for TS. Pat is the
  Youth Director on the staff.
- February 9, 1983—Wednesday—TS informed me that Mary Flood found a note from TS about her to Bill Urbanski (administrative assistant) and she was furious with what the note said about here TS also presented me with the book: And They Felt No Shame which contained among many other things 30 pages of pro-gay quotes.
- February 17, 1983—Wednesday—At Bill Urbanski's request we had a meeting today of just the two of us. He wanted, from my perspective, to find out where I was coming from because I put as an "A" priority this parish getting a full time administrator. He also agreed with that. Bill said candidly he could not work with TS and that TS's personality does not allow for healthy and stable interaction in the staff. Bill said we are at crossroads in hiring a Parish Administrator. Bill was real unclear about his role. Bill seemed overwhelmed and frustrated.

On this day I was informed that Mary Flood had decided to resign.

February 28, 1983—Monday—Mike Korf called to ask how things were going. A week before he called TS and TS told me he said things were going great—that Bill had changed and he was a really different person. I tried to stay neutral with Mike. Mike did not know why WM went to New York. I did not inform him.

TS on this date invited me to join him and John Parkos in a priest support

TS on this date invited me to join him and John Parkos in a priest support group.

The Parish Renewal was a disaster as far as relations between the two Dominican priests and the pastor. One of the priests told me that TS was psychically absent from him.

- March 3, 1983—Thursday—Mary Flood and I went to the Minnesota Orchestra and afterwards out for pizza. She told me she figured out that WM and TS were gay. She wouldn't be surprized if they were having an affair. The final fact that closed it for her was that she knew WM was taking came of a "friends" apartment in Loring Park. She also told me that Slyvia Thorme knows things also. Slyvia is a trustee of the parish.
- March 4, 1983—Friday—Bob Schwartz called to inform TS that Herb Hayek was available to help out for the summer. I took the call. I wrote a note to TS and said nothing further.
- March 6, 1983—AM—I met with Bill and Slyvia Thorne for 45 minutes. I told them some of the details of the last several months. Slyvia said she would be contacting Bishop Bullock and that a meeting between us would be appropriate. I agreed to see the Bishop at his request.

- March 14, 1983--1:00-I met with Bishop Bill Bullock. I told him the facts as I saw them. He prayed with me and advised me to consider asking for a transfer. I was surprized but felt relieved to make the necessary but previously unthinkable decision. In the evening I wrote my letter requesting a transfer.
- March 17, 1983--Thursday-9:00 AM: I surprized TS with my resignation. I said I did not want to discuss it that day.
  - 12:00: I had lunch with a former staff member of TS who stated that TS was visited often by a priest (perhaps Bob Valet) and that this staff member was one of the last of the staff to conclude that TS was gay. This staff member also found TS intolerably manipulative and intrusive. It had been a while since last contact with TS. It appeared to me that my experience with TS was very similar.
    - 4:00: I shocked the staff with my presenting the letter requesting a transfer.
- March 18, 1983—Friday—9:00 AM—TS pumped me in a private meeting to find out "why."

  He asked the question: "Is it something about my personal life that normally would be kept between me and my confessor?" I refused to say anything substantive. I said at his suggestion that I may discuss this with a third party present. He suggested Doug Lenard or Bill Kinney.
- March 26, 1983—Saturday—TS was loud, directive and self-confident. We had supper with Herb Hayek and Frank Zachman. TS said he preferred Frank because Hayek was a "negative" person and was too closely associated with "Dignity." TS said this parish might be upset with that. He said he had no problem with that but he disliked what society did with it. This was TS's attitude before the supper.

  After the meeting with Hayek, TS changed his thinking.
- March 26, 1983--Monday--4:00-6:30 With Ken Pierre as facilitator the staff had a crisis meeting. The meeting was one of the more horrible experiences of my life. I came very close to walking out. I stonewalled it because I could not trust the dynamics even with Pierre there. WM cried a bit saying he could not reveal why he left ministry for eleven days because it involved a question of conscience.

The other staff members made weak initiatives in confronting TS but they were all disarmed by TS's arrogance and confidence. I was furious with the staff because they minimized their feelings and their statements. They said 10% to TS of what they said to me. TS took their 10% and turned it back on them.

The staff relegated the problems to group dynamic problems. TS got away. I was deeply depressed and glad I was leaving.

- March 30, 1983-Wednesday-Herb Hayek came for supper and I was informed he would cover TS's sabbadical.
- March 31, 1983--Thursday--I informed the Thornes that Hayek was moving into the Rectory. They said they would inform Bishop Bullock.

- March 31, 1983 (con't) Pat McHugo came into my office to say he was angry that I didn't say anything at the Monday meeting. He also recognized that TS had controlled the group completely. I ended up telling him most of the facts that contributed to my leaving. I was surprized that he did not recognize the homosexuallity issue. It seemed very obvious to me. I told Pat that I was convinced we were dealing with a pathological personality when we were dealing with TS and that he was impossible to negotiate with.
- April 5, 1983—Tuesday—I met with Mike Korf today concerning a new assignment. We got into St. John's stuff. Mike said that there was not enough information for them to move. He also said after I informed him that Herb Hayek was moving in April 12, that he didn't believe Herb was a practising gay. However, I tend to believe that he is from other reliable sources.
- April 7, 1983—Thursday—The staff meeting today was filled with joking and laughing on the part of many staff members, especially TS. TS seemed triumphant. He was enthusidastic about his sabbadical. The staff was given a memo detailing the lines of authority the next four months. I went into depression—anger turned onwards—for the rest of the day.
- April 12, 1983—Tuesday—Herb Hayek moved in. He spent the day and the next preparing a talk he gave at Metropolitan Junior College.
- April 21, 1983—Thursday—I informed Bill Urbanski that I would not be attending any more staff meetings unless the staff was discussing an issue directly affecting me. Bill said he would inform the staff.
- May 1, 1983—Sunday—I informed WM that I would be moving to White Bear Lake to live in the Rectory until my transfer takes place.
- May 11, 1983—Wednesday—WM asked to see me. He confronted me because another priest of the diocese quoted me to him as saying that "I moved out of the rectory because I didn't want to live in a gay whore house."

My response was to say "I never said that to anyone at anytime. I have talked to only two priests of the diocese about my situation here at St. John's and that was in strictest confidence."

WM said he was relieved to hear that because he regarded me as an homest and fair person. He did not say anything more but just left the room.

- May 12, 1983—Thursday—John Malone, a member of the personnel board, calls me and asks me to consider going to Blaine. I told him that I preferred Faribault.

  After further discussion John said he would push for Faribault.
- May 16, 1983—Monday—My meeting with Tom Hunstiger went beautifully. We spent a great deal of time talking about why I left the Rectory at St. John's and why I resigned from St. Richard's in Richfield. It seems that some within the diocese feel that I resign and leave parishes for little if any reason. Tom seemed to be reassured by my explanations.
- May 20, 1983——Friday——As of this date I continue to sleep at St. Mary's in White Bear Lake and work at St. John's as usual.

#### POSTSCRIPT

What preceded comes from my journaling, my appointment book, staff memos, personal notes and general memory. I submit this to make clear that the "gut-rendering" decisions that I had to make over the last six have reasons and causes that left me little option accept to leave St. John's.

I want church authority to know as clearly as possible what my experience here has been. Also, if things go public and go crazier than they already are, I want the parish to know that this priest did not idly stand by and do nothing and then run away to another assignment. I believe I have done everything possible and appropriate for an associate pastor to do in a situation like this.

I care very deeply about the people of this parish. I have done the most productive and effective work of my priesthood at St. John's. Because I have had to uproot myself from this situation, I am forced to grieve the loss of the many relationships I value.

I realize that my leaving, by itself, does not solve the situation here. It is what I had to do for myself and may have been the only appropriate response given my role and my power as an associate pastor. I commend this situation to other powers that be.

Dear Adrienne,

I am enclosing a resume put together by Pat Kissel of Blue Cross/Blue Shield describing how payments were made against the charges for Father Stitts' hospitalization. I believe of principal importance is the question of U&C Reductions (Usual and Customary). Mayo Clinic has many times had to respond to questions by insureds regarding costs for services rendered which far exceed usual and customary amounts as defined by Blue Cross/Blue Shield. The procedure is simply to ask them to identify why they need so much in excess of the acceptable Blue Cross/Blue Shield amount. What I would suggest is that you send the Claims Resume to May Clinic and ask them to respond. Once you have their response, send it on to Blue Cross/Blue Shield to determine if any additional payments will be made due to any unusual circumstances which would have caused the charges to exceed reasonable amounts.


Have you ever had the experience of going on a hike that seemed like an obstacle course and after finally reaching the top of a hill thinking you were home only to realize there's another long hill to climb? This past week I returned to Rochester for a CT scan and follow-up of my December surgery. The radiation in the lower abdomen seemed to be successful, however outside that field they discovered what appeared to be a couple of small tumors. We assume we are dealing with the same thing as before - low grade fatty tissue cancer. These do not appear to be attached to anything vital and are causing me no discomfort but need to be dealt with.

I will be returning to Rochester next Monday where I will probably start weekly sessions of chemotherapy. It is hoped through this that the tumors will shrink and if there be any others in my system, they too will be affected by the chemical. Yes, I will have some of the side effects associated with chemotherapy. I will probably be sick for a day after the treatment and will experience the thinning of hair. Otherwise, I will be able to continue my normal responsibilities and other activities in my life. If all goes well I'll probably have surgery in late summer.

I had always imagined that people with cancer had a great deal of pain and discomfort. To date I have not had any pain except for a few days after surgery nor had any indication of the cancer either by sickness, weight loss or in a way has it inhibited my life style. I continue to feel good. I have been active playing tennis, racquetball and skiing. My work schedule which I seem to thrive on, includes some long days and many exciting things that are part of ministry.

My cancer in no way seems to limit my duties and responsibilities as pastor for the present and hopefully for years to come. My overall strength is as good as ever - modified only by middle age. Thank you for the many prayers and the concern that has been expressed to me in the last several months. Although very discouraged and angered at the news I heard Monday from the doctors, I'll continue on to the next hill. Perhaps that's in part why we are called a "pilgrim people" for each of us have our own path, our hills to climb. It's good that faith gives us some insight into the reasons why or ultimate goal but at times it's so vague. Please continue to remember me and the many others in our parish community who experience similar kinds of hills and valleys in their lives. Again, thank you for your support. Does anyone have a wig I could borrow? Maybe I should try punk.

This is to put in writing what we discussed over the phone regarding Father Tom Stitts' hospitalization coverage.

Over the past year I have had considerable experience with the coverage afforded by Blue Cross/Blue Shield for the Archdiocese. It seems to me that the coverage is adequate when the problem is of a "normal" nature. However, in special cases (such as Father Tom's) the coverage does not seem to be adequate. For example, one charge of over \$3,000 was only covered by one-third; another charge of over \$4,000 was only covered by one-half.

I have taken this matter up with Blue Cross/Blue Shield for reviewal and possible adjustment. This was done on April 4 and I have just received a small adjustment for one charge.

I met with Father Stitts yesterday (January 30) about his health and his future involvement at St. John the Baptist parish in New Brighton. Tom is looking at his fifth surgery this Spring. At this point, the surgery has not been scheduled but he will be going to Rochester in March to set the date. The tumors are growing but he assured me not in any vital areas. His goal is to maintain the growth of the tumors through surgical procedures and not through chemotherapy or radiation.

Tom is looking for another one to two years at St. John's. He has talked with his spiritual director, who has advised him that that would be a good time projection. He feels very good physically and is energized by the parish. He feels that the parish is a strong support system for him and he would not consider moving at this time. I suggested that maybe a position as a spiritual director within the Archdiocese might be an alternative for him and although he has strong interest in that field, he feels that position would not attract him right now.

Tom is very pleased with the present Staff and facility at St. John's. The Staff is willing to continue next year and Father Paul Ryan, OP, is interested in staying on. Although there are some conflicts with Paul, Tom said he would be open to his continuance at St. John's.

Father Steve Prokop has created some difficulties at the parish and Tom would rather see him move on for the betterment of the parish. I don't know if Steve is willing to do that right now but one of the Board members will talk with Steve about his ministry at St. John's soon.

Tom said Father Bob Hazel was a godsend and has been a great support for Tom during the last six months. If possible, he would like Bob to stay on for the duration of Tom's assignment at St. John's.

Father Stitts and I talked extensively about his continuance at St. John's. I probed him about a resignation and he was not ready to step down from the Pastorate. I then talked about someone to administrate the parish and he was unwilling to give up that control. He was somewhat open to a Co-Pastor at St. John's...he said someone with pastoral skills who would continue after his resignation would be acceptable. He mentioned Bob Hazel and Bob Nygaard as examples. He would want someone who was skilled with people and supportive in a living situation.

There are a couple of things that I think are definite right now in Tom's future:

- A) He wants to remain as pastor of St. John the Baptist in New Brighton but would consider having someone to share the responsibility there as Co-Pastor.
- B) He would like a replacement for Father Steve Prokop as the Associate at New Brighton.

I challenged him about being away from the parish because of surgeries, etc. but he feels that he is not gone a significant amount of time and his recuperation from surgeries has been only about 2-3 weeks each time. He feels that the Staff has been very capable in running the parish during his absences and he is in close contact with the administrative assistant he has at the parish.

### RECOMMENDATION:

- A) I would suggest we talk with Bob Hazel about staying on at St. John's. Bob is very interested in taking a pastorate assignment, especially, the Basilica, although he does know that there are other candidates for that position. I think Bob is ready for more responsibility but I don't know how much Tom would allow him to do as Co-Pastor. There are other individuals that might also be candidates; Bob Nygaard and Paul Jaroszeski, are two that come to mind. Bob Hazel does have the luxury of being there presently.
- B) If we can get a Co-Pastor to accept the assignment there, I would suggest that we reassign Steve Prokop or encourage him to look for another associate position. This will not be easy because we had problems assigning him last Spring. I believe that this is a 3-man parish, not 4 as we presently have there.
- C) If we are unwilling to assign a Co-Pastor at St. John's and Bob Hazel moves to another assignment, we are going to have to have a quality Associate in the parish to take responsibility during Tom's absences.

In summation, Tom does feel good about his ministry and we have received very little complaint from the parish, but there have been some problems with one or two members of the Staff.

Tom is unwilling to resign as Pastor and sees himself in that position at least one and maybe two more years. If we are going to replace him, we may have to suggest strongly his resignation and that would not be seen by others as a very sympathetic way of dealing with Tom's illness.

The best solution may be trying to get a Co-Pastor if you are open to that.

SUBJECT: Issues to be Resolved...

The following are some areas of concern of the Board and myself that should be resolved.

A. St. John the Baptist/New Brighton - Fathers Bob Hazel, John Bauer, Steve Prokop and I met concerning the parish at St. John's. This has been a concern over the last two years because of the deterioration of Father Tom Stitts' health and some conflicts in the relationships between the priests assigned to the parish. Presently, there are four priests at St. John's: Tom Stitts, Bob Hazel, Steve Prokop and Paul Ryan, O.P.

Father Stitts has had recent surgery (his fifth) and has returned to the parish, but has reduced his involvement there. Tom is unwilling to step back from his position as pastor, although he isn't taking a whole lot of leadership at the parish. Father Hazel says that he is gone much of the time or not involved in the parish, but doesn't want any decisions to occur during the periods when he is away. Tom feels he is still in control of the parish, although, realistically, there has been little leadership there for a number of years.

I have talked to Tom about an administrator and he is unwilling to accept that. I have also talked with him about a co-pastor and he would be willing to accept someone like Bob Hazel or Bob Nygaard, but I feel he would not relinquish any control of the parish to a co-pastor.

This situation is complicated by the conflict in the rectory with Father Steve Prokop. Steve brings up issues that he feels need to be discussed, but Tom is unwilling to face those issues or to discuss them with the staff. Steve has some personal difficulties with Tom's style and, therefore, is isolating himself from the staff. Tom has asked that Steve be moved this June, after one year. Steve would like to remain.


Bob, I talked with Leroy Piche, a parish member, and he feels that there are really no conflicts apparent in the parish. The income remains fairly stable and there is no turnover within the staff. Lerooy, however, feels that Tom wants to stay in control but he is not visible within the parish.


Leroy said Tom was like a visitor at the masses. Leroy's observations are that there has been very little direction given to the parish because of Tom's health and his style, which is very controlling. He wants to be involved and yet he is unable to because of his health.


I think you should be involved somewhat in this situation. I believe the Archbishop would feel that Tom should step back, but he would not want to press the issue or force Tom out because of the illness. A parish of that size needs more leadership than it is getting and yet Tom does not see that as a problem. Even Bill Kenney and Bob Hazel, Tom's friends, questions whether he should continue to have a pastoral leadership role in the parish.


I don't know how much we can do in this situation, but I don't think Tom is willing to negotiate a move for himself. He feels he is capable of remaining there and doesn't see any problems within the parish. I think the direction will continue to deteriorate unless we take a close look at Tom's future plans for the leadership of the parish. This situation is the most important of the items that we should discuss.


- B. Immaculate Heart of Mary, St. Paul (This is an area of concern also.) We have not formally assigned Jim Zappa as pastor of Immaculate Heart; he remains there as administrator. I told Jim that it would be necessary for us to clarify the situation at IHM before he takes the pastoral position there. I talked with Dutch Scholtz and he should also be a part of our meeting with Jim. As soon as possible, we should set a time for you, Dutch, Jim and I and, if possible, the Board members who did the Consultation at IHM (Gip Endres and Ray Monsour).
- C. Linwood In response to your memo about Linwood, the Board's recommendation would be that there be some kind of affirmation of the Linwood Community education program; it appears to be guite successful and it would be good to tell them that. Also, it was suggested that a Quasi parish similar to the one established by Bishop Kinney (see attachment), be considered.
- D. I talked with Greg Skrypek about the incardination process for Bill Murtaugh and Jim Cassidy. I think we should sit down and talk with Greg about his view of these two individuals. There are some concerns on both our parts about them. It is interesting that Greg's reservations are not with Jim, but with Bill.

SUBJECT: Father Tom Stitts - St. John the Baptist Parish -

I talked with Father Tom Stitts on Monday, April 22nd, concerning his health and his future at St. John the Baptist in New Brighton. (Enclosed is a copy of a memo to Bishop Carlson in which I recommend his heavier involvement in this matter.)

Tom continues to be quite adamant in two areas: his remaining at St. John the Baptist and the removal of Father Steve Prokop as associate

- A. Father Stitts continues to project a very positive outlook for himself physically and ministerially. We have some contrary comments from Leroy Piche, Deacon Peter D'Heilly and Chuck Ceronsky, however. Tom remains quite strongly determined to stay on as pastor. He speaks of someone to "help him administrate" the parish, but he is unwilling to give up any of the administrative responsibilities. When pressed about an administrator or co-pastor at St. John's, he immediately backs off and says, "I only need help".
- B. Tom continues to have problems with Father Steve Prokop at the parish. Steve seems to have a personality conflict with Tom and Tom sees Steve as a devisive person in the rectory and in the parish. He says people are leaving because of Steve and wants him removed. When I shared with Tom that you and the Board feel that Steve should continue there for one more year in order to give him some stability, Tom became irritated, saying that we hadn't heard his side. I did tell him that I shared his feelings by memo and personally with you and he said "You were not convincing enough; I want him out." He is going to go directly to you two, asking for Steve's removal.

### C. Recommendations:

Tom's future at the parish - Bishop Carlson will be talking with Tom about his health and how he is doing and the situation at St. John's because it is within his vicariate. This will be an opportunity for him to evaluate the situation objectively and give us some recommendations. I don't believe any of the three of us would be willing to remove Tom Stitts as pastor of St. John's at this time, under these circumstances. It would not reflect well on us, within the parish, or the Presbyterate.

Tom's health continues to deteriorate. He is in chemotherapy presently and is suffering side effects from that. He feels badly one or two weeks a month, but he is not ready to give in to any suggestions about stepping down.

Overall, it would seem that Tom may only have a few months of life left and we may have to respect his wishes to remain at the parish. St. John's has not had a lot of leadership in recent years but to go in now and ask him to step down may not be the best for Tom or for us.

2. Tom would be willing to have Father Bob Hazel stay on at the parish, but it is questionable as to the capacity of administration that Bob would have. Tom and Bob get along quite well together but Tom is unwilling to give up the administrative control to Bob. (He may deny this, but when pressed about a job description, he doesn't want an associate or co-pastor to administrate the parish.)

Bob Hazel is ready for a pastorate of his own and may want to move; I will talk with Bob to see if he is willing to stay there for some additional months. I do not know of another priest who would be willing to go to St. John's and work with Tom.

3. Steve Prokop - Equally important in this situation is Father Steve Prokop. Steve brings up issues that he feels need to be discussed but Tom is unwilling to face those issues or to discuss them with the staff. Steve does have some personal difficulty with Tom's style and is beginning to isolate himself from others in the rectory. However, Bob Hazel does not see Steve as an overall difficulty with the parish—only that he is not involved as much as he should be. Steve would like to remain at St. John's.

It may not be a viable option for both Tom and Steve to remain but I would hope that we might aid a reconciliation if that is possible. Right now, Tom is adamant on Steve's removal.

I wanted both of you updated on the situation because Tom will be contacting you concerning the issue of Steve Prokop.

## Dear Archbishop:

After learning from Austin Ward that it was your hope that Steve Prokop would remain at St. John's another year I set up a time to talk with Steve. I had delayed this talk as we both were waiting for a meeting with Austin and Bishop Robert Carlson. We had anticipated this meeting taking place soon after Easter.

When Steve and I met there were two things I had insisted upon if we were to continue on together for another year. The first was that he accept my pastorship and the way things are done at St. John's. I had felt a strong resistance to this during the last six months. Secondly, that we would share on a regular basis as to what he was doing and what he was involved in. There has been little sharing. Since Steve agreed to both of these conditions and since there has been a considerable positive change in him since Easter, and since it is your request, I am open to trying it for another year. However, if this would break down again I would ask that a change be made so as to eliminate the kind of tension that took place this last year for me, for the parish, and more importantly, I believe, for Steve.

Steve is a good priest and relates well on a one-to-one basis. He has done a number of positive things at St. John's this year but we had had a real problem until recently. He obviously wants to stay here.

We talked a year ago at Christmas about my continuing at St. John's and I appreciate your support of me at that time. St. John's is important to me. It's where I've spent the last five years and I've worked hard. The parish is functioning very well at this time. People seem to be happy, are contibuting well and supporting the programs and staff. They have been particularly supportive of me.

The doctors at Mayo encourage me to continue my active schedule as they believe this is important in my rapid healing and recovery after surgery. I am presently continuing a program of chemotherapy which, although weakens me for a few days, does not seem to interfere with the rest of the month. I have, once again, lost my hair and continue to look for another ten pounds which I had previously always been struggling to lose.

I continue to look for someone more experienced to share the pastoral responsibilities with me at St. John's. I have much appreciated being able to work with Bob Hazel these last six months. He has been a strength and support for me and a real asset to this parish. Although I realize that he is looking for his own parish, I and many others in the parish have asked him to stay on here. He has been much appreciated by many.

I met for two hours with Father Tom Stitts on Friday, May 10th, 1985. It was a good meeting and I hope Tom felt supported by it.



Enjoy the long weekend. I tend to get envious of people with lake places since mine submerged.


The community of St. John's appreciated the Confirmation ceremonies as it was a good evening for us all.







Dear Archbishop Roach,

Over the past five years. I have had the opportunity to come to know Fr. Tom Siitts as pastor and coworker. I have been a parishioner, volunteer, and more recently a pastoral minister on staff.

As a parishioner, I have grown spiritually. Professionally, he has encouraged, supported, and challenged me.

I value and appreciate Fr. Tom's sense of liturgy and community. 





At the request of the parish administrator, I went to a meeting at St. John's in New Brighton on Thursday afternoon. To my surprise when I got there, there were 13 people, including all the support staff of the parish as well as the pastoral staff (including the two associates). The only one not there was Bob Hazel.

They told me the purpose of my being called out there was to help them deal with the anger and frustration with the pastor and their inability to work out any kind of effective way of dealing with his arbitrary and angry behavior.

As our discussion went on, it became obvious that the people in the group who were having the greatest difficulty were his support staff. They have to deal with him every day and it is toward them that he most often vents his anger.

The pastoral staff seemed to be much more comfortable with his leadership. They can go for several days without encountering him at all and when they do, he seems to treat them with a good deal more respect. The only exception to that would be his two associates: Paul Ryan and Steve Prokop. I think one of the reasons why they in particular are so negative toward Tom is that they have to spend so much time with the support staff, trying to bring comfort and understanding to them during those difficult times.

Tom was operated on this past Wednesday morning in Rochester; this is his sixth operation in the last two and one-half years. The procedure this time is what the doctors call "Debulking". Apparently, it means simply taking out the majority of the large tumors in order to bring Tom some comfort. I intend to go down to see Tom on Saturday. Needless to say, I will mention nothing to him about my meeting on Thursday.

It is my feeling that within the next couple of months it might well be time to ask Tom consider resignation

Bob Hazel has agreed to go to Shakopee and will be transferring September 18. We do not have any current replacement for Bob at New Brighton.

I again recommend that we consider Michael Tegeder going there around the 15th of October. In the meantime, Father Tom and the other two priests, Fathers Ryan and Prokop, would be assigned there. I think that the three of them could handle the parish for at least one month.

As I suggested earlier, if you or Bishop Carlson could speak to Father Tom around September 15, giving him enough time to prepare for the change, we could then have the administrator in place by the middle of October.

Father Tom continues to be very weak and very thin. He has no energy but continues to do everything he can to create the impression that he is very much in control of the parish. His physical condition continues to worsen.

I talked with Dr. Bryan Rank at the Hennepin County Medical Center this afternoon (Friday). Dr. Rank is an oncology physician at the hospital and Tom's primary care doctor. He assured me that Tom's recent deterioration is not directly from his cancer. Dr. Rank had seen Tom about six months ago and called the Mayo Clinic at that time to suggest that Tom be fed intravenously; that was not done by Mayo and consequently, Tom's nutrition has been neglected for the past three to six months. He is literally starving to death.

Dr. Rank said further that he would foresee Tom as having the potential to turn completely around but he would see a maximum of one year of life remaining. The cancer has not spread to any other areas of the body, but Tom is unable to absorb food; therefore, he needs to be given nutrition by other means.


The recommendation from Dr. Rank is that he have a short period of time in an intermediate care facility until he gets stronger. Then a determination could be made whether or not he can or should go back to the parish. Dr. Rank feels that the time line for Tom's leaving Hennepin County Medical Center is dependent on how fast the nutrition deficiency turns around and, frankly, how much damage has been done to his body by his not receiving enough calories. Dr. Rank felt it would take probably another two weeks to get his calorie count up where it should be. Presently they are giving him 1600 calories per day and they will increase that to the point of a normal diet.


I think the key issue would be, as Tom begins to feel better, whether he will be open to a placement other than returning to the rectory at St. John's. If he returned, it would be very unfair to the priests living there and there would be a concern as to whether he could care for himself.


Archbishop, it is my recommendation that we look at St. Mary's Extended Care, or a similar facility for Tom for this interim period of time.


Father Tegeder will follow the situation closely. We will attend a care April Mand conference for Tom which is scheduled next week. Dr. Rank said his goal is to give Tom the longest and best life possible and if he can be built up again, they will do another surgery.



I attended the Care Conference for Tom Stitts at Hennepin General Hospital today. Father Mike Tegeder also was there. There were two medical doctors, two nurses, a social worker, Tom's brother, Don, his cousin, Ruth, and Tom himself.

The medical staff gave the prognosis regarding Tom's condition; there were no surprises. Tom could live a very short time or he could possibly live from six months to a year. The doctor indicated that it seemed more likely that it would be only a short time.

The immediate plans call for Tom to be transferred to the Rehab Unit at St. Mary's Hospital. His primary doctor over there will be Dr. William Hedrick, who has been Tom's doctor off and on for the last twenty years. Chuck Ceronsky will also be able to minister to him there and because Chuck belongs to his parish and is on his parish council, they have a very good relationship. Tom's condition and future planning will be put on hold for the first two weeks that he is at the Rehab Center. It is possible that after two or three weeks in that institution, he may be in a position to move on.

The family was quite strong in their feelings that he should be able to go back to the rectory. The social worker also indicated that one should be able to live in one's home. Both Mike Tegeder and I indicated that it was a bit more complicated than that and that other factors have to be taken into account. We said that in view of the fact that his future health is so uncertain, about all we can do right now is simply agree to his going to St. Mary's. There will be ongoing dialogue with his family and with medical staff during the time that he is at St. Mary's.

Tom's brother made one final plea after Tom left the meeting. He said if his going back to the parish is out of the question, please don't tell that to Tom right now. He felt that would be equivalent to asking Tom to die. We agreed that no finalization of plans will be conveyed to Tom at this time and, needless to say, both Father Tegeder and I will do more dialogue with Tom to gently convince him that going back to the rectory is not a good option. We will give Tom some time, however, before we discuss the subject further with him.

Tom will probably be leaving Hennepin General to go to St. Mary's on Friday of this week.

## Chemical health. In today's fast-paced world, the terms "chemical" and "health" may seem incompatible. And under certain conditions, perhaps that's true. But since its inception in 1975, the sole purpose of CREATE has

been to fuse the term "chemical health" into a meaningful—and, more important, functional—style of life.

CREATE provides a unique structure for the creation and study of effective chemical health models. Rather than proposing a set of "do's and donts," CREATE allows individuals to make responsible decisions regarding the consequences of chemicals.

The CREATE continuum is an early intervention continuum. The services range from a one-hour session with a counselor to a two-month intensive program, and can include long-term support groups and individual counselling.

It's a continuum that's been proven effective. Over the years the staff has developed dozens of individualized programs at the request of agencies and communities alike. In 1982, for example, the Hennepin County Adult Corrections Facility commissioned CREATE to develop a multi-modality alternative program to bring understanding of chemical health to inmates.

CREATE works. And most important it makes the terms "chemical health" an important, meaningful term to individuals.

Determining the existence of a problem is probably the most important step toward its resolution. Determining that a problem doesn't exist is equally important. CREATE's assessment does just that in an organized way.

### **Assessment**\*

Assessment uses information gathered from the referral source and concerned others and looks at chemicals and their effect on health and family, on social and spiritual life, on finances and job performance, even on the law.

Once all data is gathered, CREATE works with the individual on each problem, explores the possible connections between the problem and use of chemicals, and helps individuals begin to make responsible chemical health decisions.

Most important, if a problem stems from areas other than chemical health, CREATE quickly recommends treatment from an expert in that area. Only about half of assessment clients go on to other CREATE programs; the rest are referred to other experts.

If the assessment indicates a need for treatment, the method and type of treatment is determined by the client's needs, goals and resources. Problems are restated, solutions are posed, and referral alternatives are discussed.

What's more, CREATE checks on an individual's progress all along the way, to ensure success. Over 95 percent of CREATE's referrals remain with recommended programs. CREATE's assessment is the alternative way to deliver the care an individual deserves.

**Options** 

This two week, seven session extended assessment process can also serve as short-term outpatient counseling. During Options, chemical use behavior is examined in all life areas and Personal Change Contracts are written.

#### C.H.E.C.

Chemical Health Evaluative Counseling is a nineteen session group designed to explore the consequences of chemical use, to aid in the decisions concerning chemical use, and to develop practical chemical health goals.

Assessment, C.H.E.C. and Options are licensed under DWP Rule 43 and thus are eligible for insurance and other third party reimbursement. We can assist clients in submitting insurance forms.


#### Chalk Talks for the Drinking Driver

A drinking driver affects everyone on the road. This program helps individuals find ways to stop drinking and driving through the use of small group exercises.

Not everyone is addicted to chemicals or unable to stop using them, but almost everyone suffers at least one negative consequence of use. CREATE's Options\*, a seven session, short-term outpatient treatment program, helps the individual assess personal consequences of use and determine to what extent behavior must be altered to avoid those consequences.

Through the seven sessions CREATE's staff helps the individual take a unique use assessment profile and, based on the results of that profile, helps decide if abstinence from chemicals, a change in certain behavior patterns, or avoidance of risky situations is the best way that individual can effectively address chemical use behavior problems.

Whatever the individual decides is incorporated into a Personal Change Contract that is prepared in a private session with a counselor following the Options Assessment program. If the contract calls for professional help, resources will be sought that best fit the individual.

An individual who has not had a full assessment, whose previous assessment was some time ago or inconclusive, may need further assessment. In this case, options can serve as an extended and therefore extremely thorough assessment of chemical health.

Options can also serve as a short-term outpatient treatment program. Many people are helped most in the evaluation process and can take the Personal Change Contract made during options and follow their goals without further need for professional care.

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

# C.H.E.C.& C.H.E.C./ ANEW

Chemical Health Evaluative Counseling (C.H.E.C.)\* and its short track, C.H.E.C./ANEW, is a group process designed to help individuals define the problems chemical use has caused, write chemicality goals and begin planning for a chemically healthy future.

A person begins counseling with a written set of goals which they have taken part in developing during the assessment process. Then, in a group setting that spans from 10 sessions for C.H.E.C./ANEW, to 19 sessions for C.H.E.C., members examine their consequences of chemical use, acquire the tools to make responsible decisions, write individual goal plans and form feedback and support systems essential for chemical health. CREATE mixes individual and group therapy with liberal use of homework assignments and self study. The mix depends on individual needs.

CREATE has employed Brief Intervention therapy since 1975 and Relapse Prevention therapy since 1984. Our University-sponsored research proved that working on healthy patterns and developing skills to deal with situations where chemical abuse is possible gives people the edge in staying alert to their Relapse triggers. Few of our clients need to return to treatment once they have the tools to deal with urges and lapses in Chemical Health.

#### Admission and Screening Criteria

Anyone wishing to change destructive chemical use patterns who meets age, level of problem and financial arrangement criteria may attend outpatient treatment at CREATE. A treatment plan is negotiated with each client after information is gathered and studied by staff and psychological consultants. New clients may join the process any day group is held in the location they wish to attend. Both C.H.E.C. and C.H.E.C./ANEW clients are served in the same group.



#### **Chemicality Support Groups**

Informal support groups (Aftercare) are available for people who need to discuss day-to-day chemical health concerns. These groups are not structured, but topic areas are provided. Members are held responsible for the actual content of group. Attendance records and notices of drop or completion status are provided by CREATE staff. There is a nominal fee.



A drinking driver affects everyone on the road. Chalk Talks for the Drinking Driver (C.T.D.D.) is a unique opportunity for individuals to learn the importance of making responsible decisions. Chalk Talks for the for the Drinking Driver is designed for first-time DWI offenders, or persons who could benefit from a learning

experience to prevent chemical use problems. The course, conducted by trained professionals, is an active learning experience in which participants become highly involved through exercises. These exercises allow CREATE to carefully observe each individual. The focus and task of each person in the group centers around determining ways to stop drinking and driving. Issues include Minnesota drinking driver statutes, procedures, and probation conditions; short- and long-term effects of chemical use; present and future costs of the DWI, chemical dependency warning signs, treatment options, written self-protection plans and use alternatives.

Course content evaluation is done on an on-going basis. Each client is tested before and after the course to measure cognitive gains. Call 874-9811 for a supply of referral forms.

Concerned persons are welcome to accompany the participant as a guest of CREATE.

#### ENROLLMENT PROCEDURE

Simply call 874-9811 and ask to be scheduled for C.T.D.D.

Classes are held in three to five convenient Twin Cities locations each month. CREATE offers either a two evening four hours per evening class or a once a month, eight hour Saturday class.

Clients must bring the class fee to the first session in order to be admitted to class. After attending and paying for class, the client receives a completion card for use as validation of attendance.


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

ment funds. At RISK\* is specially designed for such people. They may have had a high B.A.C. when arrested, for example, but are abstaining when assessed. Their lifestyles, however, center on chemical use, making attempts at abstinance only temporary. At RISK\* individuals may have had drug treatment or education, but have either relapsed with no tools to recovery, or abstained without addressing original problem issues.

To address the potential problems of these people the funding system has overlooked, CREATE, Inc.; with the support of the Hennepin County Chemical Health Division, Hennepin County Courts and the Minnesota Department of Public Safety; has developed this Self Intervention Model. It is designed to help At RISK\* persons determine the levels to which their lifesyles center around chemical use and design ways to eliminate this emphasis.

The At RISK\* education process includes companion support and the formulation of a Risk Free Contract.

The Department of Public Safety will accept At RISK\* completion as long as the Court has ordered it and added "follow recommendations" to the sentence of individuals registering at Level 1: Risk Status.
