## Boy in Mirror Jim Bartko with Bob Welch

"By 2019 the number of priests who have sexually abused children had grown to 6,846, according to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. They abused more than 19,000 children—and, of course, these are only the cases that were reported. The National Center for Victims of Crime estimates one in five girls and one in twenty boys has been a victim of child sexual abuse.

This book is for every one of those victims, of which I am one. I've seen the fallout firsthand, lived the shame, watched as my career and marriage fell apart—all because of something rooted decades ago that was not my fault. Even in the best of times, like the evening we honored Phil and Penny Knight, the haunting memories can show up in the mirror."

"So, this is the story of a man in the mirror who, for most of a lifetime, would look in that mirror and see only a wounded little boy looking back at him. A story with the highest of highs and the lowest of lows.


If they're like me, some of these people have paired lives of public success with private misery, trying to live in the "now" but forever dogged by the "then." Others have been swept away in a tsunami of addictions, broken relationships, and failure to hold a job. Still others, unable to reconcile with the hurts of the past, have killed themselves.

For those who remain, the irony is that what ultimately frees us is our willingness to stand up and bear witness to what happened to us—perhaps to family and trusted friends, to the police, to a therapist, and maybe—as I'm doing here—to the public at large. We finally share what our betrayers hoped we would take to our graves, because our silence allows them to continue to prey on those afraid to speak up.

One by one, as if bombing victims in a war not of our making, we wander out of the smoke and rubble, daring to tell our stories.
